- spectacle** A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself.

*He observed the intricacy of the ironwork with the **wonder** of a child.*

Definitions of "Marvel" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "marvel" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Express astonishment or surprise about something.*
- *Be amazed at.*
- *Be filled with wonder or astonishment.*



Synonyms of "Marvel" as a verb (15 Words)

be amazed	Have life, be alive.
be astonished	Be identical or equivalent to.
be awed	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be dumbfounded	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
be filled with amazement	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
be full of wonder	Represent, as of a character on stage.
be surprised	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
gape	Stare with one's mouth open wide in amazement or wonder. <i>He gaped at Sharp in silence.</i>
goggle	Look with wide open eyes, typically in amazement. <i>I goggled at them in total disbelief.</i>
not believe one's ears	Follow a credo; have a faith; be a believer.
not believe one's eyes	Credit with veracity.

not know what to say

Be able to distinguish, recognize as being different.

stand in awe

Hold one's ground; maintain a position; be steadfast or upright.

stare

Look at with fixed eyes.

*The students **stared** at the teacher with amazement.*

wonder

Feel admiration and amazement; marvel.

*He **wondered** who had built this beautiful church.*



Usage Examples of "Marvel" as a verb

- *She marvelled at Jeffrey's composure.*
- *'It looks huge,' marvelled Clare.*
- *We marvelled at the child's linguistic abilities.*

attachment	A computer file appended to an email. <i>The processor comes complete with a blender attachment.</i>
avocation	A hobby or minor occupation. <i>They are basically doctors and negotiators by avocation.</i>
<u>beloved</u>	A beloved person used as terms of endearment. <i>His beloved son.</i>
bonanza	A large amount of something desirable. <i>A natural gas bonanza for Britain.</i>
<u>bystander</u>	A person who is present at an event or incident but does not take part. <i>Water cannons were turned on marchers and innocent bystanders alike.</i>
curiosity	An unusual or interesting object or fact. <i>Filled with curiosity she peered through the window.</i>
curious	Expressing curiosity. <i>Traffic was slowed by curious rubberneckers.</i>

egocentric	An egocentric person. <i>Egocentric spatial perception.</i>
entertainment	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>A theatrical entertainment.</i>
fun	A source of fun. <i>People watching is great fun.</i>
hobby	An auxiliary activity. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
ingenuity	The power of creative imagination. <i>Considerable ingenuity must be employed in writing software.</i>
inquire	Inquire about. <i>I inquired about their special today.</i>
inquiring	Showing an interest in learning new things. <i>An inquiring mind.</i>
inquisitive	Inquiring or appearing to inquire. <i>His poems reveal an intensely inquisitive mind.</i>
interest	The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i> Holders of voting rights must disclose their interests.</i>
interested	Involved in or affected by or having a claim to or share in. <i> Seeking views from all interested parties.</i>
interrogative	Relating to verbs in the so called interrogative mood. <i>Interrogatives are not likely to crop up very often in the speech of a person who is being interviewed.</i>
interrogatory	Formal systematic questioning. <i>She abandoned her interrogatory monologue.</i>
intrigue	Form intrigues for in an underhand manner. <i> Within the region's borders is a wealth of interest and intrigue.</i>
nosy	Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>He flipped through my letters in his nosy way.</i>
originality	The ability to think and act independently. <i>She's a writer of great originality.</i>
pastime	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly). <i>Sailing is her favorite pastime.</i>
pursuit	An activity of a specified kind, especially a recreational or sporting one. <i>Those whose business is the pursuit of knowledge.</i>

recreation	Activity that refreshes and recreates; activity that renews your health and spirits by enjoyment and relaxation. <i>Days of joyous recreation with his friends.</i>
talent	People possessing natural aptitude or skill. <i>He possesses more talent than any other player.</i>
topic	Some situation or event that is thought about. <i>It was a very sensitive topic.</i>
wit	A witty amusing person who makes jokes. <i>His caustic wit cuts through the humbug.</i>
wonder	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>Athens was a place of wonder and beauty.</i>
wondering	Showing curiosity. <i>Unsure where she was leading to I cast her a wondering look.</i>
