- spectacle** A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself.

- wonder** A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder.  
*He observed the intricacy of the ironwork with the **wonder** of a child.*

## Marvel as a Verb

### Definitions of "Marvel" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "marvel" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Express astonishment or surprise about something.*
- *Be amazed at.*
- *Be filled with wonder or astonishment.*



## Synonyms of "Marvel" as a verb (15 Words)

<b>be amazed</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be astonished</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>be awed</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be dumbfounded</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>be filled with amazement</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be full of wonder</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be surprised</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>gape</b>	Stare with one's mouth open wide in amazement or wonder. <i>He <b>gaped</b> at Sharp in silence.</i>
<b>goggle</b>	Look with wide open eyes, typically in amazement. <i>I <b>goggled</b> at them in total disbelief.</i>
<b>not believe one's ears</b>	Follow a credo; have a faith; be a believer.
<b>not believe one's eyes</b>	Credit with veracity.

**not know what to say**

Be able to distinguish, recognize as being different.

**stand in awe**

Hold one's ground; maintain a position; be steadfast or upright.

**stare**

Look at with fixed eyes.

*The students **stared** at the teacher with amazement.*

**wonder**

Feel admiration and amazement; marvel.

*He **wondered** who had built this beautiful church.*



### Usage Examples of "Marvel" as a verb

- *She marvelled at Jeffrey's composure.*
- *'It looks huge,' marvelled Clare.*
- *We marvelled at the child's linguistic abilities.*

- attachment** A computer file appended to an email.  
*The processor comes complete with a blender **attachment**.*
- avocation** A hobby or minor occupation.  
*They are basically doctors and negotiators by **avocation**.*
- beloved** A beloved person used as terms of endearment.  
*His **beloved** son.*
- bonanza** A large amount of something desirable.  
*A natural gas **bonanza** for Britain.*
- bystander** A person who is present at an event or incident but does not take part.  
*Water cannons were turned on marchers and innocent **bystanders** alike.*
- curiosity** An unusual or interesting object or fact.  
*Filled with **curiosity** she peered through the window.*
- curious** Expressing curiosity.  
*Traffic was slowed by **curious** rubberneckers.*

<b>egocentric</b>	An egocentric person. <i><b>Egocentric</b> spatial perception.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>A theatrical <b>entertainment</b>.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>People watching is great <b>fun</b>.</i>
<b>hobby</b>	An auxiliary activity. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
<b>ingenuity</b>	The power of creative imagination. <i>Considerable <b>ingenuity</b> must be employed in writing software.</i>
<b>inquire</b>	Inquire about. <i>I <b>inquired</b> about their special today.</i>
<b>inquiring</b>	Showing an interest in learning new things. <i>An <b>inquiring</b> mind.</i>
<b>inquisitive</b>	Inquiring or appearing to inquire. <i>His poems reveal an intensely <b>inquisitive</b> mind.</i>
<b>interest</b>	The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i>Holders of voting rights must disclose their <b>interests</b>.</i>
<b>interested</b>	Involved in or affected by or having a claim to or share in. <i>Seeking views from all <b>interested</b> parties.</i>
<b>interrogative</b>	Relating to verbs in the so called interrogative mood. <i><b>Interrogatives</b> are not likely to crop up very often in the speech of a person who is being interviewed.</i>
<b>interrogatory</b>	Formal systematic questioning. <i>She abandoned her <b>interrogatory</b> monologue.</i>
<b>intrigue</b>	Form intrigues for in an underhand manner. <i>Within the region's borders is a wealth of interest and <b>intrigue</b>.</i>
<b>nosy</b>	Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>He flipped through my letters in his <b>nosy</b> way.</i>
<b>originality</b>	The ability to think and act independently. <i>She's a writer of great <b>originality</b>.</i>
<b>pastime</b>	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly). <i>Sailing is her favorite <b>pastime</b>.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	An activity of a specified kind, especially a recreational or sporting one. <i>Those whose business is the <b>pursuit</b> of knowledge.</i>



<b>recreation</b>	Activity that refreshes and recreates; activity that renews your health and spirits by enjoyment and relaxation. <i>Days of joyous <b>recreation</b> with his friends.</i>
<b>talent</b>	People possessing natural aptitude or skill. <i>He possesses more <b>talent</b> than any other player.</i>
<b>topic</b>	Some situation or event that is thought about. <i>It was a very sensitive <b>topic</b>.</i>
<b>wit</b>	A witty amusing person who makes jokes. <i>His caustic <b>wit</b> cuts through the humbug.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>Athens was a place of <b>wonder</b> and beauty.</i>
<b>wondering</b>	Showing curiosity. <i>Unsure where she was leading to I cast her a <b>wondering</b> look.</i>
