<b>fantastic</b>	Ludicrously odd. <i>Gaudi s <b>fantastic</b> architecture.</i>
<b>grand</b>	Magnificent and imposing in appearance, size, or style. <i>This was opera on a <b>grand</b> scale.</i>
<b>howling</b>	Filled with or characterized by howling. <i>A <b>howling</b> success.</i>
<b>improbable</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>An <b>improbable</b> event.</i>
<b>marvellous</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>These <b>marvellous</b> technological toys are fun to play with.</i>
<b><u>miraculous</u></b>	Remarkable and bringing very welcome consequences. <i>I felt amazed and grateful for our <b>miraculous</b> escape.</i>
<b>rattling</b>	Making a series of knocking sounds. <i>Had a <b>rattling</b> conversation about politics.</i>

<b>tall</b>	Great in vertical dimension; high in stature. <i>Tall people.</i>
<b>terrific</b>	Causing terror. <i>A <b>terrific</b> noise.</i>
<b>tremendous</b>	Inspiring awe or dread. <i>A plane took off with a <b>tremendous</b> noise.</i>
<b>wonderful</b>	Inspiring delight, pleasure, or admiration; extremely good; marvellous. <i>The climate was <b>wonderful</b> all the year round.</i>
<b>wondrous</b>	Inspiring a feeling of wonder or delight; marvellous. <i>This <b>wondrous</b> city.</i>

<b><u>amaze</u></b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>She <b>amazed</b> doctors by fighting back when her deteriorating condition caused her to suffer heart failure.</i>
<b>amazing</b>	Surprising greatly. <i>She makes the most <b>amazing</b> cakes.</i>
<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b><u>astonishing</u></b>	Extremely surprising or impressive; amazing. <i>The dog was capable of <b>astonishing</b> tricks.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>

<b>enormous</b>	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>An <b>enormous</b> boulder.</i>
<b>exceeding</b>	Extremely exceedingly. <i>A night of <b>exceeding</b> darkness.</i>
<b>excellent</b>	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an <b>excellent</b> speech.</i>
<b>exceptional</b>	Deviating widely from a norm of physical or mental ability; used especially of children below normal in intelligence. <i>A child of <b>exceptional</b> ability.</i>
<b>fantastic</b>	Fanciful and unrealistic; foolish. <i>She had spent a <b>fantastic</b> amount of cash.</i>
<b>incredible</b>	Difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>I was mesmerized she looked so <b>incredible</b>.</i>
<b>magnificent</b>	Characterized by grandeur. <i><b>Magnificent</b> cathedrals.</i>
<b>miraculous</b>	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention. <i>I felt amazed and grateful for our <b>miraculous</b> escape.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Exceptionally good. <i>An <b>outstanding</b> fact of our time is that nations poisoned by anti semitism proved less fortunate in regard to their own freedom.</i>
<b>prodigious</b>	Remarkably or impressively great in extent, size, or degree. <i>Rumours of <b>prodigious</b> happenings such as monstrous births.</i>
<b>profound</b>	Profound quality. <i>A <b>profound</b> sigh.</i>
<b>redoubtable</b>	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>A tougher and more <b>redoubtable</b> adversary than the heel clicking jackbooted fanatic.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of notice. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> achievement.</i>
<b>shattering</b>	Very shocking or upsetting. <i><b>Shattering</b> rain striking the windowpanes.</i>
<b>smashing</b>	The act of breaking something into small pieces. <i>You look simply <b>smashing</b>.</i>
<b>staggering</b>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>Suffered a <b>staggering</b> defeat.</i>

- surprisingly** In a surprising manner.  
*Perhaps **surprisingly** all survived.*

*A slightly bizarre and **unconvincing** fusion of musical forces.*
- unexpectedly** Without advance planning.  
*He died **unexpectedly** of a heart attack.*
- unimaginable** Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend.  
*Lives of almost **unimaginable** deprivation.*
- wonderful** Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers.  
*The climate was **wonderful** all the year round.*
