## Synonyms of "Mastery" as a noun (30 Words)

<b>ability</b>	Possession of the qualities (especially mental qualities) required to do something or get something done. <i>A man of exceptional <b>ability</b>.</i>
<b>adroitness</b>	Cleverness or skill. <i>He lacks political <b>adroitness</b>.</i>
<b>ascendancy</b>	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The <b>ascendancy</b> of good over evil.</i>
<b>authority</b>	A person with extensive or specialized knowledge about a subject; an expert. <i>He was an <b>authority</b> on the stock market.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The extent of someone's or something's ability. <i>The company's <b>capability</b> to increase productivity.</i>

<b>command</b>	The power or authority to command. <i>He had a brilliant <b>command</b> of English.</i>
<b>control</b>	The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc. <i>Growing <b>controls</b> on local spending.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<u><b>dexterity</b></u>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain <b>dexterity</b> in politics.</i>
<u><b>dominion</b></u>	One of the self-governing nations in the British Commonwealth. <i>Man s attempt to establish <b>dominion</b> over nature.</i>
<b>expertise</b>	Expert skill or knowledge in a particular field. <i>Technical <b>expertise</b>.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Impressive delicacy and skill. <i>Orchestral playing of great <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<u><b>government</b></u>	Government the system or form by which a community or other political unit is governed. <i>Rules for the <b>government</b> of the infirmary.</i>
<b>jurisdiction</b>	The extent of the power to make legal decisions and judgements. <i>Several different tax <b>jurisdictions</b>.</i>
<b>power</b>	One possessing or exercising power or influence or authority. <i>A surge of <b>power</b> from the engine.</i>
<b>proficiency</b>	The quality of having great facility and competence. <i>He demonstrated his <b>proficiency</b> in Chinese.</i>
<u><b>proWess</b></u>	Bravery in battle. <i>The hereditary nobility had no monopoly of skill and <b>proWess</b> in war.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A rule or law concerning a natural phenomenon or the function of a complex system. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the <b>rule</b>.</i>
<b>skill</b>	A particular ability. <i>Difficult work taking great <b>skill</b>.</i>
<b>sovereignty</b>	The authority of a state to govern itself or another state. <i>The <b>sovereignty</b> of Parliament.</i>
<b>subordination</b>	A word that is more specific than a given word. <i>The <b>subordination</b> of medicine to political expediency.</i>
<u><b>superiority</b></u>	The state of being superior. <i>The allies have achieved air <b>superiority</b>.</i>

<b>supremacy</b>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<b>sway</b>	Controlling influence. <i>The country was under the <b>sway</b> of rival warlords.</i>
<b>the upper hand</b>	A central nervous system stimulant that increases energy and decreases appetite; used to treat narcolepsy and some forms of depression.
<b>the whip hand</b>	An instrument with a handle and a flexible lash that is used for whipping.
<b>triumph</b>	A highly successful example of something. <i>A garden built to celebrate Napoleon's many <b>triumphs</b>.</i>
<b>victory</b>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>A narrow <b>victory</b>.</i>
<b>virtuosity</b>	Technical skill or fluency or style exhibited by a virtuoso. <i>A performance of considerable <b>virtuosity</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Mastery" (30 Words)

- administrate** Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of.  
*The person administrating the database system has left the company.*
- aileron** A hinged surface in the trailing edge of an aircraft wing, used to control roll around the longitudinal axis.
- ascendancy** Occupation of a position of dominant power or influence.  
*The poor have a moral **ascendancy** over the rich.*

<b>ascendant</b>	(of a planet, zodiacal degree, or sign) on or close to the intersection of the ecliptic with the eastern horizon. <i>The newly <b>ascendant</b> liberal party.</i>
<b>authority</b>	An authoritative written work. <i>He had absolute <b>authority</b> over his subordinates.</i>
<b><u>blimp</u></b>	Any elderly pompous reactionary ultranationalistic person (after the cartoon character created by Sir David Low). <i>I could work out four hours a day and still end up a <b>blimp</b>.</i>
<b>centralize</b>	Make central. <i>The Russian government <b>centralized</b> the distribution of food.</i>
<b><u>charismatic</u></b>	An adherent of the charismatic movement. <i>A <b>charismatic</b> leader.</i>
<b>control</b>	The activity of managing or exerting control over something. <i>He had lost <b>control</b> of his sphincters.</i>
<b>coordinator</b>	A person whose job is to organize events or activities and to negotiate with others in order to ensure they work together effectively. <i>A full time <b>coordinator</b> was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<b><u>dominance</u></b>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>Some plants produce structures to outcompete other species for <b>dominance</b> in a given habitat.</i>
<b>dominated</b>	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.
<b>expertise</b>	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge. <i>Technical <b>expertise</b>.</i>
<b>govern</b>	Control, influence, or regulate (a person, action, or course of events). <i>He was incapable of <b>governing</b> the country.</i>
<b><u>governing</u></b>	The act of governing exercising authority. <i>The <b>governing</b> coalition.</i>
<b>grasshopper</b>	A cocktail made of creme de menthe and cream (sometimes with creme de cacao).
<b><u>hegemony</u></b>	The dominance or leadership of one social group or nation over others. <i>Germany was united under Prussian <b>hegemony</b> after 1871.</i>
<b><u>manageable</u></b>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b>potentate</b>	A monarch or ruler, especially an autocratic one.
<b>proficiency</b>	A high degree of skill; expertise. <i>He demonstrated his <b>proficiency</b> in Chinese.</i>



- reign** Have sovereign power.  
*He was helpless under the **reign** of his egotism.*
- repression** The action of subduing someone or something by force.  
*The **repression** of anger can be positively harmful.*
- rudder** Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft.  
*A small amount of extra **rudder**.*
- sensorimotor** Of or relating to the sensory and motor coordination of an organism or to the controlling nerves.
- subjugate** Make someone or something subordinate to.  
*The invaders had soon **subjugated** most of the population.*
- subjugation** The act of conquering.  
*The colonial **subjugation** of a country by means of brute military force.*
- supremacy** Power to dominate or defeat.  
*The **supremacy** of the king.*
- thermostat** Control the temperature with a thermostat.
- tiller** Grow shoots in the form of stools or tillers.
