Synonyms of "Mastery" as a noun (30 Words)

ability	Possession of the qualities (especially mental qualities) required to do something or get something done. <i>A man of exceptional ability.</i>
adroitness	Cleverness or skill. <i>He lacks political adroitness.</i>
ascendancy	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The ascendancy of good over evil.</i>
authority	A person with extensive or specialized knowledge about a subject; an expert. <i>He was an authority on the stock market.</i>
capability	The extent of someone's or something's ability. <i>The company's capability to increase productivity.</i>

command	The power or authority to command. <i>He had a brilliant command of English.</i>
control	The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc. <i>Growing controls on local spending.</i>
deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<u>dexterity</u>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain dexterity in politics.</i>
<u>dominion</u>	One of the self-governing nations in the British Commonwealth. <i>Man s attempt to establish dominion over nature.</i>
expertise	Expert skill or knowledge in a particular field. <i>Technical expertise.</i>
finesse	Impressive delicacy and skill. <i>Orchestral playing of great finesse.</i>
<u>government</u>	Government the system or form by which a community or other political unit is governed. <i>Rules for the government of the infirmary.</i>
jurisdiction	The extent of the power to make legal decisions and judgements. <i>Several different tax jurisdictions.</i>
power	One possessing or exercising power or influence or authority. <i>A surge of power from the engine.</i>
proficiency	The quality of having great facility and competence. <i>He demonstrated his proficiency in Chinese.</i>
<u>proWess</u>	Bravery in battle. <i>The hereditary nobility had no monopoly of skill and proWess in war.</i>
rule	A rule or law concerning a natural phenomenon or the function of a complex system. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the rule.</i>
skill	A particular ability. <i>Difficult work taking great skill.</i>
sovereignty	The authority of a state to govern itself or another state. <i>The sovereignty of Parliament.</i>
subordination	A word that is more specific than a given word. <i>The subordination of medicine to political expediency.</i>
<u>superiority</u>	The state of being superior. <i>The allies have achieved air superiority.</i>

<u>supremacy</u>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i>The supremacy of the king.</i>
<u>sway</u>	Controlling influence. <i>The country was under the sway of rival warlords.</i>
the upper hand	A central nervous system stimulant that increases energy and decreases appetite; used to treat narcolepsy and some forms of depression.
the whip hand	An instrument with a handle and a flexible lash that is used for whipping.
<u>triumph</u>	A highly successful example of something. <i>A garden built to celebrate Napoleon s many triumphs.</i>
<u>victory</u>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>A narrow victory.</i>
virtuosity	Technical skill or fluency or style exhibited by a virtuoso. <i>A performance of considerable virtuosity.</i>

Associations of "Mastery" (30 Words)

- administrate** Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of.
The person administrating the database system has left the company.
- aileron** A hinged surface in the trailing edge of an aircraft wing, used to control roll around the longitudinal axis.
- ascendancy** Occupation of a position of dominant power or influence.
*The poor have a moral **ascendancy** over the rich.*

ascendant	(of a planet, zodiacal degree, or sign) on or close to the intersection of the ecliptic with the eastern horizon. <i>The newly ascendant liberal party.</i>
authority	An authoritative written work. <i>He had absolute authority over his subordinates.</i>
<u>blimp</u>	Any elderly pompous reactionary ultranationalistic person (after the cartoon character created by Sir David Low). <i>I could work out four hours a day and still end up a blimp.</i>
centralize	Make central. <i>The Russian government centralized the distribution of food.</i>
<u>charismatic</u>	An adherent of the charismatic movement. <i>A charismatic leader.</i>
control	The activity of managing or exerting control over something. <i>He had lost control of his sphincters.</i>
coordinator	A person whose job is to organize events or activities and to negotiate with others in order to ensure they work together effectively. <i>A full time coordinator was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<u>dominance</u>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>Some plants produce structures to outcompete other species for dominance in a given habitat.</i>
dominated	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.
expertise	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge. <i>Technical expertise.</i>
govern	Control, influence, or regulate (a person, action, or course of events). <i>He was incapable of governing the country.</i>
<u>governing</u>	The act of governing exercising authority. <i>The governing coalition.</i>
grasshopper	A cocktail made of creme de menthe and cream (sometimes with creme de cacao).
<u>hegemony</u>	The dominance or leadership of one social group or nation over others. <i>Germany was united under Prussian hegemony after 1871.</i>
<u>manageable</u>	Capable of being managed or controlled. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
potentate	A monarch or ruler, especially an autocratic one.
proficiency	A high degree of skill; expertise. <i>He demonstrated his proficiency in Chinese.</i>

- reign** Have sovereign power.
*He was helpless under the **reign** of his egotism.*
- repression** The action of subduing someone or something by force.
*The **repression** of anger can be positively harmful.*
- rudder** Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft.
*A small amount of extra **rudder**.*
- sensorimotor** Of or relating to the sensory and motor coordination of an organism or to the controlling nerves.
- subjugate** Make someone or something subordinate to.
*The invaders had soon **subjugated** most of the population.*
- subjugation** The act of conquering.
*The colonial **subjugation** of a country by means of brute military force.*
- supremacy** Power to dominate or defeat.
*The **supremacy** of the king.*
- thermostat** Control the temperature with a thermostat.
- tiller** Grow shoots in the form of stools or tillers.
