extremity	That part of a limb that is farthest from the torso. <i>The extremity of despair.</i>

level best	Indicator that establishes the horizontal when a bubble is centered in a tube of liquid.
limit	A speed limit. <i>There are limits on the amount you can bet.</i>
<u>peak</u>	The narrow part of a ship's hold at the bow or stern. <i>The peak halyard.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	A high, pointed piece of rock. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the pinnacle of fame.</i>
<u>summit</u>	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>The dramas are considered to form one of the summits of world literature.</i>
top	The top or extreme point of something usually a mountain or hill. <i>The bus shelter at the top of the road.</i>
upper limit	A central nervous system stimulant that increases energy and decreases appetite; used to treat narcolepsy and some forms of depression.
utmost	The greatest or most extreme extent or amount. <i>He tried his utmost.</i>
uttermost	The greatest possible degree. <i>We will defend ourselves to the uttermost.</i>
vertex	The crown of the head.
<u>zenith</u>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the zenith.</i>

largest	Ostentatiously lofty in style.
maximal	Of or constituting a maximum; as great or as large as possible. <i>The maximal speed.</i>

- supreme** Highest in excellence or achievement.

*We watched a squirrel negotiate the **topmost** branches of a nearby tree.*
- utmost** Highest in extent or degree.
*The **utmost** tip of the peninsula.*

apex	The top or highest part of something, especially one forming a point. <i>The apex of the roof.</i>
best	The supreme effort one can make. <i>It s best if we both go.</i>
bombast	Pompous or pretentious talk or writing. <i>The bombast of gung ho militarism.</i>
bragging	Excessively proud and boastful talk about one's achievements or possessions. <i>She interrupted their endless bragging.</i>
climactic	Consisting of or causing a climax. <i>The film s climactic scenes.</i>
crest	The curling foamy top of a wave. <i>She reached the crest of the hill.</i>
culminate	Bring to a head or to the highest point. <i>Weeks of violence culminated in the brutal murder of a magistrate.</i>
exaggeration	The action of making exaggerations. <i>It would be an exaggeration to say I had morning sickness but I did feel queasy.</i>
fustian	Thick, hard-wearing twilled cloth with a short nap, usually dyed in dark colours. <i>The coarse fustian of prison clothing.</i>
heyday	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its heyday in 1964.</i>
hyperbole	Exaggerated statements or claims not meant to be taken literally. <i>He vowed revenge with oaths and hyperboles.</i>
impressionism	A school of late 19th century French painters who pictured appearances by strokes of unmixed colors to give the impression of reflected light.
limiting	Strictly limiting the reference of a modified word or phrase. <i>A limiting factor.</i>
lofty	Of imposing height. <i>The elegant square was shaded by lofty palms.</i>
magnification	The act of expanding something in apparent size. <i>At this magnification the pixels making up the image become visible.</i>
overstatement	Making to seem more important than it really is. <i>A classic piece of overstatement.</i>

<u>peak</u>	Referring to the point at which the specified thing is at its highest level of popularity. <i>At the peak of the pyramid.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	Set on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i>
<u>proliferation</u>	Rapid increase in the number or amount of something. <i>A continuing threat of nuclear proliferation.</i>
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>The dramas are considered to form one of the summits of world literature.</i>
superlative	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>A superlative piece of skill.</i>
top	Be at the top of or constitute the top or highest point. <i>The springy turf of the clifftop.</i>
<u>unsurpassed</u>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i>
<u>upper</u>	Piece of leather or synthetic material that forms the part of a shoe or boot above the sole that encases the foot. <i>The upper half of the class.</i>
utmost	Highest in extent or degree. <i>A plot that stretches credulity to the utmost.</i>
<u>zenith</u>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>In 1977 punk was at its zenith.</i>
