### Definitions of "Maybe" as an adverb

- *By chance.*
- *Perhaps; possibly.*



## Synonyms of "Maybe" as an adverb (7 Words)

<b>conceivably</b>	Within the realm of possibility. <i>It may <b>conceivably</b> cause liver disease.</i>
<b>for all one knows</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
<b>mayhap</b>	Perhaps; possibly.
<b>peradventure</b>	Perhaps. <i><b>Peradventure</b> I m not as wealthy as he is.</i>
<b>perchance</b>	Through chance. <i>To sleep <b>perchance</b> to dream.</i>
<b>perhaps</b>	Used to express uncertainty or possibility. <i><b>Perhaps</b> I should have been frank with him.</i>
<b><u>possibly</u></b>	Perhaps (used to indicate doubt or hesitancy). <i>We may <b>possibly</b> run into them at the concert.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Maybe" as an adverb

- *He was standing maybe 20 or 30 feet away.*
- *Maybe I won't go back.*



## Associations of "Maybe" (30 Words)

- anticipation** Anticipating with confidence of fulfillment.  
*Her eyes sparkled with **anticipation**.*
- anticipatory** In anticipation.  
*An **anticipatory** flash of excitement.*
- aspirant** An ambitious and aspiring young person.  
*A lofty **aspirant**.*
- aspiring** Directing one's hopes or ambitions towards becoming a specified type of person.  
*An **aspiring** artist.*
- assume** Put clothing on one's body.  
*They were **assumed** to be foreign.*

<b>assumption</b>	The act of assuming or taking for granted. <i>On the <b>assumption</b> that he has been injured we can infer that he will not play.</i>
<b>conjecture</b>	(in textual criticism) propose (a reading). <i>Many <b>conjectured</b> that the jury could not agree.</i>
<b>eventually</b>	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i><b>Eventually</b> after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
<b>expect</b>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>We <b>expect</b> great things of you.</i>
<b>expectation</b>	The feeling that something is about to happen. <i>Reality had not lived up to <b>expectations</b>.</i>
<b>expected</b>	Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive. <i>Write down your <b>expected</b> monthly income and regularly track your expenses.</i>
<b>finally</b>	The item at the end. <i>A referendum followed by local legislative and <b>finally</b> presidential elections.</i>
<b>guess</b>	Put forward of a guess in spite of possible refutation. <i>I am <b>guessing</b> that the price of real estate will rise again.</i>
<b>importantly</b>	In a manner designed to draw attention to one's importance. <i>A non drinking non smoking and <b>importantly</b> non political sportsman.</i>
<b>lastly</b>	The item at the end. <i><b>Lastly</b> I would like to thank my parents.</i>
<b>lifespan</b>	The length of time for which a person or animal lives or a thing functions. <i>The human <b>lifespan</b>.</i>
<b>perhaps</b>	By chance. <i><b>Perhaps</b> I should have been frank with him.</i>
<b>preconception</b>	A partiality that prevents objective consideration of an issue or situation. <i>He did not even try to confirm his <b>preconceptions</b>.</i>
<b>predicate</b>	What is predicated of the subject of a proposition the second term in a proposition is predicated of the first term by means of the copula. <i>Aggression is <b>predicated</b> of those who act aggressively.</i>
<b>predict</b>	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>He <b>predicts</b> that the trend will continue.</i>
<b>premise</b>	State or presuppose something as a premise. <i>He <b>premised</b> these remarks so that his readers might understand.</i>

<b><u>presumably</u></b>	Used to convey that what is asserted is very likely though not known for certain. <i><b>Presumably</b> he missed the train.</i>
<b><u>presume</u></b>	Take upon oneself; act presumptuously, without permission. <i>The argument <b>presumes</b> that only one person can do the work.</i>
<b><u>presumption</u></b>	An assumption that is taken for granted. <i>Underlying <b>presumptions</b> about human nature.</i>
<b><u>probably</u></b>	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>She would <b>probably</b> never see him again.</i>
<b><u>suppose</u></b>	Expect believe or suppose. <i><b>Suppose</b> we leave this to the police.</i>
<b><u>supposedly</u></b>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues <b>supposedly</b> because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<b><u>supposition</u></b>	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>Their outrage was based on <b>supposition</b> and hearsay.</i>
<b><u>underestimate</u></b>	Make too low an estimate of. <i>75 million is a considerable <b>underestimate</b>.</i>
<b><u>whatever</u></b>	No matter what happens. <i>We told him we'd back him <b>whatever</b>.</i>
