Definitions of "Maybe" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “maybe” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *By chance.*
- *Perhaps; possibly.*



Synonyms of "Maybe" as an adverb (7 Words)

conceivably	Within the realm of possibility. <i>It may conceivably cause liver disease.</i>
for all one knows	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole' is often used informally for `wholly).
mayhap	Perhaps; possibly.
peradventure	Perhaps. <i>Peradventure I m not as wealthy as he is.</i>
perchance	Through chance. <i>To sleep perchance to dream.</i>
perhaps	Used to express uncertainty or possibility. <i>Perhaps I should have been frank with him.</i>
<u>possibly</u>	Perhaps (used to indicate doubt or hesitancy). <i>We may possibly run into them at the concert.</i>



Usage Examples of "Maybe" as an adverb

- *He was standing maybe 20 or 30 feet away.*
- *Maybe I won't go back.*



Associations of "Maybe" (30 Words)

anticipation	Anticipating with confidence of fulfillment. <i>Her eyes sparkled with anticipation.</i>
<u>anticipatory</u>	In anticipation. <i>An anticipatory flash of excitement.</i>
aspirant	An ambitious and aspiring young person. <i>A lofty aspirant.</i>
<u>aspiring</u>	Directing one's hopes or ambitions towards becoming a specified type of person. <i>An aspiring artist.</i>
<u>assume</u>	Put clothing on one's body. <i>They were assumed to be foreign.</i>

assumption	The act of assuming or taking for granted. <i>On the assumption that he has been injured we can infer that he will not play.</i>
<u>conjecture</u>	(in textual criticism) propose (a reading). <i>Many conjectured that the jury could not agree.</i>
eventually	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
<u>expect</u>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>We expect great things of you.</i>
expectation	The feeling that something is about to happen. <i>Reality had not lived up to expectations.</i>
<u>expected</u>	Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive. <i>Write down your expected monthly income and regularly track your expenses.</i>
<u>finally</u>	The item at the end. <i>A referendum followed by local legislative and finally presidential elections.</i>
guess	Put forward of a guess in spite of possible refutation. <i>I am guessing that the price of real estate will rise again.</i>
importantly	In a manner designed to draw attention to one's importance. <i>A non drinking non smoking and importantly non political sportsman.</i>
<u>lastly</u>	The item at the end. <i>Lastly I would like to thank my parents.</i>
lifespan	The length of time for which a person or animal lives or a thing functions. <i>The human lifespan.</i>
perhaps	By chance. <i>Perhaps I should have been frank with him.</i>
preconception	A partiality that prevents objective consideration of an issue or situation. <i>He did not even try to confirm his preconceptions.</i>
<u>predicate</u>	What is predicated of the subject of a proposition the second term in a proposition is predicated of the first term by means of the copula. <i>Aggression is predicated of those who act aggressively.</i>
predict	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>He predicts that the trend will continue.</i>
premise	State or presuppose something as a premise. <i>He premised these remarks so that his readers might understand.</i>

<u>presumably</u>	Used to convey that what is asserted is very likely though not known for certain. <i>Presumably he missed the train.</i>
<u>presume</u>	Take upon oneself; act presumptuously, without permission. <i>The argument presumes that only one person can do the work.</i>
<u>presumption</u>	An assumption that is taken for granted. <i>Underlying presumptions about human nature.</i>
<u>probably</u>	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>She would probably never see him again.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Expect believe or suppose. <i>Suppose we leave this to the police.</i>
<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<u>supposition</u>	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>Their outrage was based on supposition and hearsay.</i>
<u>underestimate</u>	Make too low an estimate of. <i>7 5 million is a considerable underestimate.</i>
<u>whatever</u>	No matter what happens. <i>We told him we d back him whatever.</i>
