## Synonyms of "Meld" as a noun (26 Words)

### **alloy**

A mixture containing two or more metallic elements or metallic and nonmetallic elements usually fused together or dissolving into each other when molten.

***Alloy** wheels.*

### **amalgam**

An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams.

*His theory is an **amalgam** of earlier ideas.*

### **amalgamation**

The combination of two or more commercial companies.

*The threat of **amalgamation** with another college.*

### **basket rummy**

A container that is usually woven and has handles.

<b>canasta</b>	A meld of seven cards in canasta.
<b>coalescence</b>	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>A sophisticated <b>coalescence</b> of melodies and harmonies.</i>
<b><u>coalition</u></b>	A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government. <i>A <b>coalition</b> between Liberals and Conservatives.</i>
<b><u>composite</u></b>	A composite constructional material. <i>The next decade may well see the introduction of more designer polymers and <b>composites</b>.</i>
<b><u>composition</u></b>	The action of putting things together; formation or construction. <i>The technical aspects of <b>composition</b>.</i>
<b><u>compound</u></b>	(chemistry) a substance formed by chemical union of two or more elements or ingredients in definite proportion by weight. <i>The air smelled like a <b>compound</b> of diesel and petrol fumes.</i>
<b><u>concoction</u></b>	Any foodstuff made by combining different ingredients. <i>She wore a skin tight <b>concoction</b> of bugle heads and sequins.</i>
<b><u>conjunction</u></b>	The grammatical relation between linguistic units words or phrases or clauses that are connected by a conjunction. <i>The planet reached <b>conjunction</b> with the sun.</i>
<b>fusing</b>	An electrical device that can interrupt the flow of electrical current when it is overloaded.
<b><u>fusion</u></b>	The merging of adjacent sounds or syllables or words. <i>The film showed a perfect <b>fusion</b> of image and sound.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	The inclusion of something as part of a whole. <i>A law allowing <b>incorporation</b> as a company.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The action or process of integrating. <i><b>Integration</b> is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
<b>marriage</b>	A close and intimate union. <i>The children from his first <b>marriage</b>.</i>
<b>merger</b>	A combination of two things, especially companies, into one. <i><b>Merger</b> can be applied for when the freehold and leasehold estates become vested in the same person.</i>
<b>mingling</b>	The action of people mingling and coming into contact. <i>All the random <b>mingling</b> and idle talk made him hate literary parties.</i>

<b>mix</b>	The act of mixing together. <i>The decor is a fascinating <b>mix</b> of antique and modern.</i>
<b><u>mixture</u></b>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>Form the <b>mixture</b> into a manageable dough.</i>
<b>pooling</b>	The combined stakes of the betters.
<b>synthesis</b>	The tendency in a language to use inflected forms rather than word order to express grammatical structure. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>He was opposed to closer political or economic <b>union</b> with Europe.</i>
<b><u>weave</u></b>	A particular style or manner in which something is woven. <i>Trailers show him with dyed blond hair and in one scene a flowing blond <b>weave</b>.</i>

<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>intermingle</b>	Combine into one. <i>We don't <b>intermingle</b> much.</i>
<b>intermix</b>	Mix together. <i>The ore had to be handled so that it was not inadvertently <b>intermixed</b> with other material.</i>
<b>melt</b>	Lose its distinct outline or shape; blend gradually. <i>Add 400g sugar and boil until the sugar <b>melts</b>.</i>
<b>merge</b>	Become one. <i>The merchant bank <b>merged</b> with another broker.</i>
<b>mingle</b>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>Resourcefully he <b>mingled</b> music and dance.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>Music was blaring and there was a DJ in the corner <b>mixing</b> and scratching.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>His work <b>unites</b> theory and practice.</i>

<b>incorporation</b>	The process of constituting a company, city, or other organization as a legal corporation. <i>The software facilitates the <b>incorporation</b> of active learning in the course.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The coordination of processes in the nervous system, including diverse sensory information and motor impulses. <i>Economic and political <b>integration</b>.</i>

<b><u>unify</u></b>	Bring together for a common purpose or action or ideology or in a shared situation. <i>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Lady Midlothian <b>united</b> herself to a man of bad character.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Characterized by unity; being or joined into a single entity. <i>Women acting together in a <b>united</b> way.</i>
