Definitions of "Melted" as an adjective

- *Changed from a solid to a liquid state.*
- *Having become liquefied by heating.*



Synonyms of "Melted" as an adjective (2 Words)

liquid

Having ready cash or liquid assets.
*Looking into those **liquid** dark eyes.*

liquified Changed from a solid to a liquid state.



Usage Examples of "Melted" as an adjective

- *Asparagus with melted butter.*
- *Rivers filled to overflowing by melted snow.*



Associations of "Melted" (30 Words)

alcohol	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i>He has not taken alcohol in twenty five years.</i>
beer	A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops. <i>A beer bottle.</i>
beverage	Any liquid suitable for drinking. <i>May I take your beverage order.</i>
butter	Spread butter on. <i>Lily buttered a slice of toast.</i>
carouse	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>They danced and caroused until the drink ran out.</i>
coaster	A small mat for a bottle or glass. <i>A West coaster.</i>
cocktail	A short mixed drink. <i>A cocktail of drugs with severe side effects.</i>
coffee	Any of several small trees and shrubs native to the tropical Old World yielding coffee beans. <i>We went out for a coffee.</i>
drink	Drink excessive amounts of alcohol be an alcoholic. <i>The seedlings apparently drink much more water than we had realized.</i>
fusible	Able to be fused or melted easily.

gulp	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>The men gulped down their beers.</i>
guzzle	Eat or drink (something) greedily. <i>The boys guzzled the cheap vodka.</i>
imbibe	Place (seeds) in water in order for them to absorb it. <i>If one does not imbibe the culture one cannot succeed.</i>
lemonade	A drink made from lemon juice and water sweetened with sugar. <i>The butler served her a lemonade.</i>
licensee	The holder of a licence, especially to sell alcoholic drinks.
liqueur	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. <i>A box of liqueurs.</i>
liquor	Liquid in which something has been steeped or cooked. <i>Waste liquors.</i>
mead	United States philosopher of pragmatism (1863-1931). <i>The tavern stocks beer cider perry and mead.</i>
nip	A small sharp bite or snip. <i>A strong beak which can deliver a serious nip.</i>
potable	Suitable for drinking. <i>There is no supply of potable water available.</i>
quaff	Drink (something, especially an alcoholic drink) heartily. <i>He quaffed pint after pint of good Berkshire ale.</i>
revelry	Unrestrained merrymaking. <i>Sounds of revelry issued into the night.</i>
sip	Drink in sips. <i>I sat sipping coffee.</i>
slurp	Eat noisily. <i>She drank it down with a loud slurp.</i>
sober	Make or become sober after drinking alcohol. <i>His expression became sober.</i>
sup	A small amount of liquid food. <i>The latest sup from those blokes at the brewery.</i>
swallow	An amount of something swallowed in one action. <i>She had swallowed his story hook line and sinker.</i>
tea	A tropical evergreen shrub or small tree extensively cultivated in e.g. China and Japan and India source of tea leaves. <i>Tea bags containing teas from selected estates.</i>
vino	Fermented juice (of grapes especially).
