<b>catchy</b>	(of a tune or phrase) instantly appealing and memorable. <i>A <b>catchy</b> title for a movie.</i>
<b>haunting</b>	Poignant; evocative. <i>From two handsome and talented young men to two <b>haunting</b> horrors of disintegration.</i>
<b>indelible</b>	(of ink or a pen) making marks that cannot be removed. <i>An <b>indelible</b> marker pen.</i>
<b>signal</b>	Notably out of the ordinary. <i>The year saw one <b>signal</b> triumph for the Labour party.</i>
<b>special</b>	For a special service or occasion. <i>Put on <b>special</b> buses for the big game.</i>
<b>unforgettable</b>	Impossible to forget; very memorable. <i>That <b>unforgettable</b> first kiss.</i>

## Associations of "Memorable" (30 Words)

<b>achievement</b>	A representation of a coat of arms with all the adjuncts to which a bearer of arms is entitled. <i>To reach this stage is a great <b>achievement</b>.</i>
<b>awesome</b>	Extremely impressive or daunting; inspiring awe. <i>My yearly review went <b>awesome</b>.</i>
<b>celebrity</b>	A widely known person. <i>He was a baseball <b>celebrity</b>.</i>
<b>conspicuous</b>	Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <i>A tower <b>conspicuous</b> at a great distance.</i>
<b>distinguished</b>	(used of persons) standing above others in character or attainment or reputation. <i>His <b>distinguished</b> bearing.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A slight projection from the surface of the body. <i>Her <b>eminence</b> in cinematography.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>One of the world's most <b>eminent</b> statisticians.</i>

<b>excellent</b>	Extremely good; outstanding. <i>Their results are <b>excellent</b>.</i>
<b>feat</b>	A notable achievement. <i>He performed a great <b>feat</b>.</i>
<b>illustrious</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>An <b>illustrious</b> achievement.</i>
<b>indelible</b>	(of ink or a pen) making marks that cannot be removed. <i>An <b>indelible</b> marker pen.</i>
<b>ineradicable</b>	Not able to be destroyed or rooted out. <i><b>Ineradicable</b> hostility.</i>
<b>lasting</b>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A long <b>lasting</b> friendship.</i>
<b>luminary</b>	A celebrity who is an inspiration to others. <i>One of the luminaries of child psychiatry.</i>
<b>notable</b>	Worthy of attention or notice; remarkable. <i>The gardens are <b>notable</b> for their collection of magnolias and camellias.</i>
<b>noted</b>	Well known; famous. <i>The restaurant is <b>noted</b> for its high standards of cuisine.</i>
<b>noteworthy</b>	Worth paying attention to; interesting or significant. <i>It is <b>noteworthy</b> that no one at the Bank has accepted responsibility for the failure.</i>
<b>noticeable</b>	Undesirably noticeable. <i><b>Noticeable</b> shadows under her eyes.</i>
<b>obtrusive</b>	Noticeable or prominent in an unwelcome or intrusive way. <i>Equally <b>obtrusive</b> was the graffiti.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Of major significance or importance. <i>Works of <b>outstanding</b> banality.</i>
<b>personage</b>	A character in a play or other work. <i>The key explains who all the <b>personages</b> in the paintings are.</i>
<b>phenomenal</b>	Perceptible by the senses or through immediate experience. <i><b>Phenomenal</b> feats of memory.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	A stream of incandescent gas projecting above the sun's chromosphere. <i>He stood on the rocky <b>prominence</b>.</i>
<b>prominent</b>	A stout drab-coloured moth with tufts on the forewings which stick up while at rest, the caterpillars of which typically have fleshy growths on the back. <i>A man with big <b>prominent</b> eyes like a lobster s.</i>

<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of attention; striking. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> achievement.</i>
<b>reminder</b>	Someone who gives a warning so that a mistake can be avoided. <i>One man was threatened with court action for not paying his water rates when he did not receive a <b>reminder</b>.</i>
<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>renowned</b>	Known or talked about by many people; famous. <i>A <b>renowned</b> author.</i>
<b>significant</b>	Having a particular meaning; indicative of something. <i>She gave him a <b>significant</b> look.</i>
<b>uncanny</b>	Surpassing the ordinary or normal. <i>Stumps had <b>uncanny</b> shapes as of monstrous creatures.</i>
