## Synonyms of "Memorize" as a verb (14 Words)

<b>become word-perfect in</b>	Undergo a change or development.
<b>commit to memory</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.
<b>con</b>	Deprive of by deceit. <i>She was jailed for <b>conning</b> her aunt out of 500 000.</i>
<b>get by heart</b>	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action.
<b>get down pat</b>	Reach by calculation.
<b>impress on the memory</b>	Produce or try to produce a vivid impression of.
<b>learn</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>She <b>learned</b> dancing from her sister.</i>
<b>learn by heart</b>	Commit to memory learn by heart.
<b>learn by rote</b>	Be a student of a certain subject.
<b>learn off</b>	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
<b>memorise</b>	Commit to memory; learn by heart.
<b>remember</b>	Exercise, or have the power of, memory. <i>Some <b>remember</b> better than others.</i>
<b>retain</b>	Not abolish or alter; maintain. <i>I <b>retained</b> a few French words and phrases.</i>
<b>study</b>	Apply oneself to study. <i>With no husband to <b>study</b> housekeeping is mere play.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Memorize" as a verb

- *He memorized thousands of verses.*

## Associations of "Memorize" (30 Words)

<b>acquaint</b>	Make someone aware of or familiar with. <i>She was already well <b>acquainted</b> with his work.</i>
<b>aloud</b>	Loudly. <i>Please read the passage <b>aloud</b>.</i>
<b>articulate</b>	Pronounce (something) clearly and distinctly. <i>An <b>articulate</b> account of their experiences.</i>

<b>biblical</b>	Resembling the language or style of the Bible. <i>There is a <b>biblical</b> cadence in the last words he utters.</i>
<b>con</b>	An argument opposed to a proposal. <i>I <b>conned</b> him into giving me your home number.</i>
<b>declamatory</b>	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long <b>declamatory</b> speech.</i>
<b>elocution</b>	An expert manner of speaking involving control of voice and gesture. <i>A Rileyesque <b>elocution</b>.</i>
<b>erudition</b>	Profound scholarly knowledge. <i>He was known for his wit <b>erudition</b> and teaching skills.</i>
<b>experience</b>	Undergo or live through a difficult experience. <i><b>Experience</b> is the best teacher.</i>
<b>interpretation</b>	A mental representation of the meaning or significance of something. <i>His unique <b>interpretation</b> of the Liszt tudes.</i>
<b>learn</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>We ll have to <b>learn</b> you to milk cows.</i>
<b>learning</b>	The acquisition of knowledge or skills through study, experience, or being taught. <i>These children experienced difficulties in <b>learning</b>.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A (usually long) dramatic speech by a single actor. <i>He was reciting some of the great <b>monologues</b> of Shakespeare.</i>
<b>narrate</b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	A prediction of what will happen in the future. <i>The gift of <b>prophecy</b>.</i>
<b>read</b>	Of a piece of writing convey a specified impression to the reader. <i>I ll <b>read</b> to you if you like.</i>
<b>reading</b>	The action or skill of reading. <i>On that <b>reading</b> it was an insult.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	A regularly scheduled session as part of a course of study. <i>The <b>recitation</b> of traditional poems.</i>
<b>recite</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>The doctor <b>recited</b> the list of possible side effects of the drug.</i>

<u>recount</u>	An additional (usually a second) count; especially of the votes in a close election. <i>He <b>recounts</b> how they often talked of politics.</i>
<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>Dozens of incidents of wife beatings are <b>reported</b> daily in this city.</i>
<b>rote</b>	Memorization by repetition. <i><b>Rote</b> learning.</i>
<b>savvy</b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>Many of us pride ourselves on being <b>savvy</b> enough to spot a fake.</i>
<b>scriptural</b>	From or relating to the Bible. <i><b>Scriptural</b> quotations from Genesis.</i>
<u>sing</u>	A meeting for amateur singing. <i>A stinging slap that made my ear <b>sing</b>.</i>
<u>soliloquy</u>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>Edmund ends the scene as he had begun it with a <b>soliloquy</b>.</i>
<b>understanding</b>	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>An <b>understanding</b> friend.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Charlotte stared at her in <b>utter</b> amazement.</i>
<u>verbalize</u>	Speak, especially at length and with little real content. <i>This depressed patient does not <b>verbalize</b>.</i>
