Synonyms of "Memorize" as a verb (14 Words)

become word-perfect in	Undergo a change or development.
commit to memory	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.
con	Deprive of by deceit. <i>She was jailed for conning her aunt out of 500 000.</i>
get by heart	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action.
get down pat	Reach by calculation.
impress on the memory	Produce or try to produce a vivid impression of.
learn	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>She learned dancing from her sister.</i>
learn by heart	Commit to memory learn by heart.
learn by rote	Be a student of a certain subject.
learn off	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
memorise	Commit to memory; learn by heart.
remember	Exercise, or have the power of, memory. <i>Some remember better than others.</i>
retain	Not abolish or alter; maintain. <i>I retained a few French words and phrases.</i>
study	Apply oneself to study. <i>With no husband to study housekeeping is mere play.</i>

- *He memorized thousands of verses.*

Associations of "Memorize" (30 Words)

acquaint	Make someone aware of or familiar with. <i>She was already well acquainted with his work.</i>
aloud	Loudly. <i>Please read the passage aloud.</i>
articulate	Pronounce (something) clearly and distinctly. <i>An articulate account of their experiences.</i>

biblical	Resembling the language or style of the Bible. <i>There is a biblical cadence in the last words he utters.</i>
con	An argument opposed to a proposal. <i>I conned him into giving me your home number.</i>
declamatory	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long declamatory speech.</i>
elocution	An expert manner of speaking involving control of voice and gesture. <i>A Rileyesque elocution.</i>
erudition	Profound scholarly knowledge. <i>He was known for his wit erudition and teaching skills.</i>
experience	Undergo or live through a difficult experience. <i>Experience is the best teacher.</i>
interpretation	A mental representation of the meaning or significance of something. <i>His unique interpretation of the Liszt tudes.</i>
learn	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>We ll have to learn you to milk cows.</i>
learning	The acquisition of knowledge or skills through study, experience, or being taught. <i>These children experienced difficulties in learning.</i>
monologue	A (usually long) dramatic speech by a single actor. <i>He was reciting some of the great monologues of Shakespeare.</i>
narrate	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is narrated by the heroine.</i>
oratory	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
prophecy	A prediction of what will happen in the future. <i>The gift of prophecy.</i>
read	Of a piece of writing convey a specified impression to the reader. <i>I ll read to you if you like.</i>
reading	The action or skill of reading. <i>On that reading it was an insult.</i>
recitation	A regularly scheduled session as part of a course of study. <i>The recitation of traditional poems.</i>
recite	Recite in elocution. <i>The doctor recited the list of possible side effects of the drug.</i>

<u>recount</u>	An additional (usually a second) count; especially of the votes in a close election. <i>He recounts how they often talked of politics.</i>
report	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>Dozens of incidents of wife beatings are reported daily in this city.</i>
rote	Memorization by repetition. <i>Rote learning.</i>
savvy	Get the meaning of something. <i>Many of us pride ourselves on being savvy enough to spot a fake.</i>
scriptural	From or relating to the Bible. <i>Scriptural quotations from Genesis.</i>
<u>sing</u>	A meeting for amateur singing. <i>A stinging slap that made my ear sing.</i>
<u>soliloquy</u>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>Edmund ends the scene as he had begun it with a soliloquy.</i>
understanding	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>An understanding friend.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Charlotte stared at her in utter amazement.</i>
<u>verbalize</u>	Speak, especially at length and with little real content. <i>This depressed patient does not verbalize.</i>
