### Synonyms of "Menial" as a noun (5 Words)

<b><u>domestic</u></b>	A person who is paid to help with cleaning and other menial tasks in a person’s home. <i>They are often called to sort out a <b>domestic</b>.</i>
<b>domestic servant</b>	A servant who is paid to perform menial tasks around the household.
<b>drudge</b>	A laborer who is obliged to do menial work. <i>I felt like a household <b>drudge</b>.</i>

**maid of all work** An unmarried girl (especially a virgin.  
**servant** In a subordinate position.  
A *government servant*.

## Menial as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Menial" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "menial" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- (of work) *not requiring much skill and lacking prestige.*
- (of a servant) *domestic.*
- *Used of unskilled work (especially domestic work).*

### Synonyms of "Menial" as an adjective (8 Words)

**boring** Not interesting; tedious.  
*A **boring** evening with uninteresting people.*

**dull** Not keenly felt.  
*The voice of a teacher talking to a rather **dull** child.*

**humble** Of low social, administrative, or political rank.  
*She came from a **humble** unprivileged background.*

**humdrum** Lacking excitement or variety; boringly monotonous.  
***Humdrum** routine work.*

**low-grade** Of inferior quality.

**lowly** Low or inferior in station or quality.  
*A **lowly** parish priest.*

**routine** Found in the ordinary course of events.  
*It was a **routine** day.*

**unskilled** Lacking professional skill or expertise.  
*Workers in **unskilled** occupations are finding fewer and fewer job opportunities.*

<b>chore</b>	A tedious but necessary task. <i>The farmer s morning <b>chores</b>.</i>
<b>condescendingly</b>	With condescension; in a patronizing manner. <i>He treats his secretary <b>condescendingly</b>.</i>
<b>decent</b>	Decently clothed. <i>From a <b>decent</b> family.</i>
<b>frivolous</b>	(of a person) carefree and superficial. <i><b>Frivolous</b> ribbons and lacy frills.</i>
<b>humble</b>	Decisively defeat (a sporting opponent previously thought to be superior). <i>Of <b>humble</b> or lowly birth.</i>
<b>humility</b>	A humble feeling. <i>He needs the <b>humility</b> to accept that their way may be better.</i>
<b>inconsequential</b>	Not following logically as a consequence. <i>His work seems trivial and <b>inconsequential</b>.</i>
<b>infinitesimal</b>	(mathematics) a variable that has zero as its limit. <i>An <b>infinitesimal</b> pause.</i>
<b>insignificant</b>	Signifying nothing. <i><b>Insignificant</b> yet enchanting phrases.</i>
<b>insubstantial</b>	Not having physical existence. <i><b>Insubstantial</b> evidence.</i>
<b>jack</b>	Used in names of animals that are smaller than similar kinds e g jack snipe. <i><b>Jack</b> up the car so you can change the tire.</i>
<b>lowly</b>	Used of unskilled work (especially domestic work). <i>A <b>lowly</b> parish priest.</i>
<b>meanness</b>	Aggressive character; viciousness. <i>The <b>meanness</b> of that existence.</i>
<b>mini</b>	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A <b>mini</b> dress.</i>
<b>minor</b>	Of an interval characteristic of a minor scale and less by a semitone than the equivalent major interval. <i>A <b>minor</b> in American Indian studies.</i>
<b>moderate</b>	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i><b>Moderate</b> your alcohol intake.</i>

<b><u>modest</u></b>	Free from pomp or affectation. <i>A <b>modest</b> salary.</i>
<b>pettiness</b>	The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous. <i>These awesome moments lift us above the <b>pettiness</b> of the world.</i>
<b>petty</b>	Larceny of property having a value less than some amount (the amount varies by locale). <i><b>Petty</b> theft.</i>
<b>picayune</b>	A small coin of little value, especially a 5-cent piece. <i>The <b>picayune</b> squabbling of party politicians.</i>
<b>puerile</b>	Displaying or suggesting a lack of maturity. <i>A <b>puerile</b> argument.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Pay no attention to, disrespect. <i>A <b>slight</b> romantic comedy.</i>
<b><u>tenuous</u></b>	Lacking substance or significance. <i>A <b>tenuous</b> argument.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	Unimportant or trivial. <i>A <b>trifling</b> matter.</i>
<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Huge fines were imposed for <b>trivial</b> offences.</i>
<b><u>unassuming</u></b>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i>He was an <b>unassuming</b> and kindly man.</i>
<b>unbelievably</b>	Used to introduce a statement that is hard to believe. <i>The show went <b>unbelievably</b> well.</i>
<b>undersized</b>	Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The <b>undersized</b> cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
<b><u>unimportant</u></b>	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>The question seems <b>unimportant</b>.</i>
<b><u>unskilled</u></b>	Not having or showing or requiring special skill or proficiency. <i><b>Unskilled</b> manual workers.</i>
