intelligence quotient	Secret information about an enemy (or potential enemy).
iq	A measure of a person's intelligence as indicated by an intelligence test; the ratio of a person's mental age to their chronological age (multiplied by 100).
learning ability	The cognitive process of acquiring skill or knowledge.
mind	An opinion formed by judging something. <i>She changed her mind.</i>
mind set	An opinion formed by judging something.
mind-set	A habitual or characteristic mental attitude that determines how you will interpret and respond to situations.
mindset	A habitual or characteristic mental attitude that determines how you will interpret and respond to situations. <i>The region seems stuck in a medieval mindset.</i>
<u>outlook</u>	The prospect for the future. <i>The outlook for tomorrow is dry and cold.</i>
perception	The representation of what is perceived; basic component in the formation of a concept. <i>Luther had a new perception of the Bible.</i>
powers of reasoning	Holding an office means being in power.
<u>psychology</u>	The mental characteristics or attitude of a person or group. <i>The psychology of interpersonal relationships.</i>
rationality	The quality of being endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>Like any phobia rationality plays only a small role.</i>

<u>reasoning</u>	The action of thinking about something in a logical, sensible way. <i>He explained the reasoning behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
sense	Relating to or denoting a coding sequence of nucleotides complementary to an antisense sequence. <i>The bear has a keen sense of smell which enables it to hunt at dusk.</i>
turn of mind	A short theatrical performance that is part of a longer program. Sympathetic awareness or tolerance.
understanding	<i>He had only been allowed to come on the understanding that he would be on his best behaviour.</i>
way of thinking	Doing as one pleases or chooses.
way someone's mind works	A portion of something divided into shares. An Apocryphal book consisting mainly of a meditation on wisdom although ascribed to Solomon it was probably written in the first century BC. <i>Some questioned the wisdom of building the dam so close to an active volcano.</i>
wisdom	A witty amusing person who makes jokes. <i>He needed all his wits to figure out the way back.</i>
<u>wit</u>	The basic human power of intelligent thought and perception. <i>He used his wits to get ahead.</i>

prospect	A person regarded as likely to succeed or as a potential customer, client, etc. <i>Prospect a job.</i>

suasion	Persuasion as opposed to force or compulsion. <i>The clearing banks found the use of both moral suasion and direct controls particularly irksome.</i>
tableau	A group of models or motionless figures representing a scene from a story or from history a tableau vivant. <i>In the first act the action is presented in a series of tableaux.</i>
tactician	A person who is skilled at planning tactics. <i>A brilliant political tactician.</i>
