- *Become one.*
- *Mix together different elements.*
- *Join or combine.*
- *Absorb (a title or estate) in another.*

<b><u>coalesce</u></b>	Fuse or cause to grow together. <i>His idea served to <b>coalesce</b> all that happened into one connected whole.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>A new product which <b>combines</b> the benefits of a hairspray and a gel.</i>
<b>commingle</b>	Mix; blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses <b>commingle</b>.</i>
<b><u>compound</u></b>	Make (something bad) worse; intensify the negative aspects of. <b>Compound</b> the ingredients.
<b><u>conflate</u></b>	Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one. <i>The urban crisis <b>conflates</b> a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
<b>conglomerate</b>	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>Atoms which <b>conglomerate</b> at the centre.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Form into a solid mass or whole. <b>Consolidate</b> one's hold on first place.
<b>converge</b>	Move or draw together at a certain location. <i>Convoys from America and the UK traversed thousands of miles to <b>converge</b> in the Atlantic.</i>
<b>emulsify</b>	Make into or become an emulsion. <i>Mustard helps to <b>emulsify</b> a vinaigrette.</i>
<b>fade into one another</b>	Lose freshness, vigor, or vitality.
<b>federate</b>	Enter into a league for a common purpose. <i>The republics <b>federated</b> to become the Soviet Union.</i>
<b><u>flux</u></b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
<b><u>fuse</u></b>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>The storm <b>fused</b> the electric mains.</i>
<b>homogenize</b>	Break up the fat globules of. <b>Homogenize</b> the main ingredients.
<b>immix</b>	Mix together different elements.
<b>incorporate</b>	Make into a whole or make part of a whole. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The stone will blend with the environment and <b>integrate</b> into the landscape.</i>

<b>intermingle</b>	Mix or mingle together. <i>Daisies <b>intermingled</b> with huge expanses of gorse and foxgloves.</i>
<b>intermix</b>	Mix together. <i>The ore had to be handled so that it was not inadvertently <b>intermixed</b> with other material.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two roads <b>join</b> here.</i>
<b>join forces</b>	Make contact or come together.
<b>join together</b>	Become part of; become a member of a group or organization.
<b>knit</b>	Make textiles by knitting. <i>The experience <b>knitted</b> the men together.</i>
<b>league</b>	Unite to form a league. <i>Oscar had <b>leagued</b> with other construction firms.</i>
<b>link</b>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>A network of routes <b>linking</b> towns and villages.</i>
<b>link up</b>	Link with or as with a yoke.
<b>lump</b>	Group or chunk together in a certain order or place side by side. <i><b>Lump</b> together all the applicants.</i>
<b>lump together</b>	Put together indiscriminately.
<b>mass</b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Crowds were <b>massing</b> outside the palace.</i>
<b>meld</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The nylon bristles shrivel and <b>meld</b> together.</i>
<b>melt into one another</b>	Reduce or cause to be reduced from a solid to a liquid state, usually by heating.
<b>mingle</b>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>The sound of voices <b>mingled</b> with a scraping of chairs.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>Up to eight tracks can be <b>mixed</b> simultaneously.</i>
<b>pool</b>	Join or form a pool of people. <i>Sweat <b>pooled</b> in the hollow of my back.</i>
<b>run into one another</b>	Change from one state to another.
<b>team up</b>	Form a team.

**yoke**

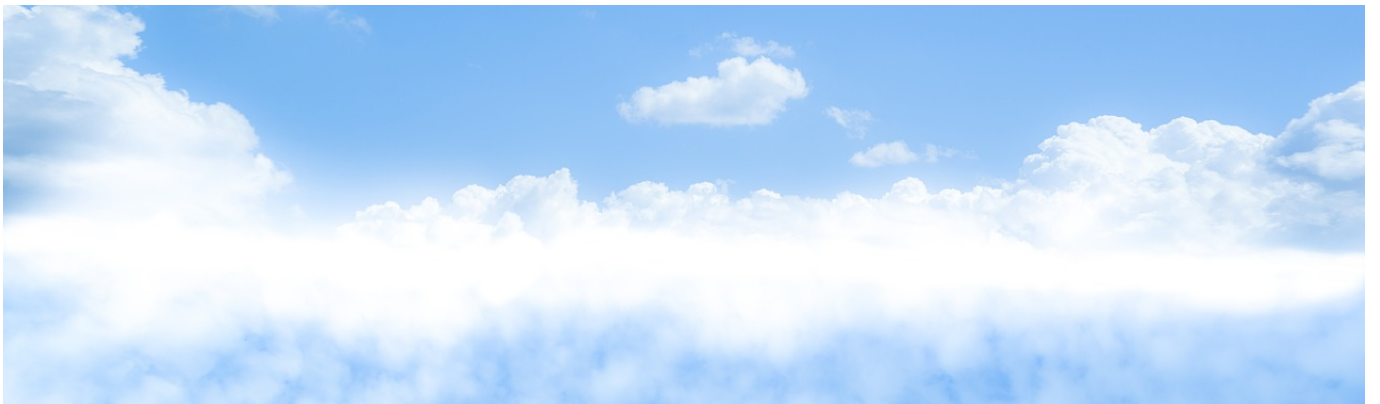
Put a yoke on a pair of animals couple or attach with or to a yoke.

<b>consolidate</b>	Form into a solid mass or whole. <i>The town and county schools are being <b>consolidated</b>.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The action or process of combining a number of financial accounts or funds into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>After their <b>consolidation</b> the two bills were passed unanimously.</i>
<b>converge</b>	(of a series) approximate in the sum of its terms towards a definite limit. <i>The lines <b>converge</b> at this point.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i><b>Federate</b> armies.</i>
<b>flux</b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The <b>flux</b> following the death of the emperor.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Having a bodily form; embodied. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>

<b>incorporation</b>	Consolidating two or more things; union in (or into) one body. <i>The City Council opposed all new <b>incorporations</b>.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The stone will blend with the environment and <b>integrate</b> into the landscape.</i>
<b>integration</b>	An operation used in the calculus whereby the integral of a function is determined. <i>Visuomotor <b>integration</b>.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i><b>Join</b> up the points in a different colour.</i>
<b><u>meld</u></b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A <b>meld</b> of many contributions.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	The process of producing a chemical compound (usually by the union of simpler chemical compounds). <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</i>
