<u>compound</u>	Make (something bad) worse; intensify the negative aspects of. <i>Compound the ingredients.</i>
<u>conflate</u>	Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one. <i>The urban crisis conflates a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
conglomerate	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>Atoms which conglomerate at the centre.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Form into a solid mass or whole. <i>Consolidate one's hold on first place.</i>
converge	Move or draw together at a certain location. <i>Convoys from America and the UK traversed thousands of miles to converge in the Atlantic.</i>
emulsify	Make into or become an emulsion. <i>Mustard helps to emulsify a vinaigrette.</i>
fade into one another	Lose freshness, vigor, or vitality.
federate	Enter into a league for a common purpose. <i>The republics federated to become the Soviet Union.</i>
<u>flux</u>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
<u>fuse</u>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>The storm fused the electric mains.</i>
homogenize	Break up the fat globules of. <i>Homogenize the main ingredients.</i>
immix	Mix together different elements.
incorporate	Make into a whole or make part of a whole. <i>He has incorporated in his proposals a number of measures.</i>

intermingle	Mix or mingle together. <i>Daisies intermingled with huge expanses of gorse and foxgloves.</i>

<u>meld</u>	Mix together different elements. <i>The nylon bristles shrivel and meld together.</i>
melt into one another	Reduce or cause to be reduced from a solid to a liquid state, usually by heating.
<u>mingle</u>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>The sound of voices mingled with a scraping of chairs.</i>
mix	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>Up to eight tracks can be mixed simultaneously.</i>

yoke

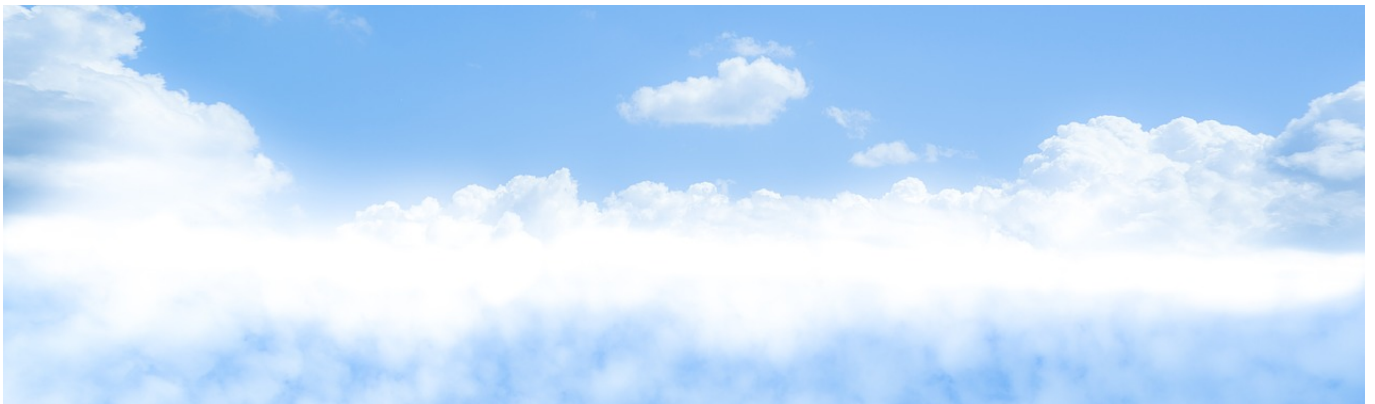
Put a yoke on a pair of animals couple or attach with or to a yoke.

incorporation	Consolidating two or more things; union in (or into) one body. <i>The City Council opposed all new incorporations.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>The stone will blend with the environment and integrate into the landscape.</i>
integration	An operation used in the calculus whereby the integral of a function is determined. <i>Visuomotor integration.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Join up the points in a different colour.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A meld of many contributions.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
