
Definitions of "Mesh" as a noun

- The spacing between the individual strands that form mesh.
- The topology of a network whose components are all connected directly to every other component.
- Used with reference to a complex or constricting situation.
- An interlaced structure.
- A type of netting of plastic or organic material that may be implanted to support various tissues or organs.
- A representation of a given shape or form, consisting of an arrangement of a finite set of geometric components.



- An open fabric of string or rope or wire woven together at regular intervals.
- Material made of a network of wire or thread.
- The number of openings per linear inch of a screen; measures size of particles.
- A computer network in which each computer or processor is connected to a number of others, especially so as to form a multidimensional lattice.
- The act of interlocking or meshing.

<u>tangle</u>	A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. They carved their way through the tangle of vines.
tracery	Ornamental stone openwork, typically in the upper part of a Gothic window. <i>The rose designs were divided by tracery.</i>
<u>trap</u>	A device to hurl clay pigeons into the air for trapshooters. They fell into the trap of relying too little on equity finance.
<u>web</u>	The flattened weblike part of a feather consisting of a series of barbs on either side of the shaft. Material downloaded from the web .

entrap	Catch in or as if in a trap. Discarded fishing lines can entrap wildlife.
fit together	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
go together	Be in the right place or situation.
harmonize	Bring (several things) into consonance or relate harmoniously. <i>Harmonize</i> the different interests.
interlock	Lock or join (things) together. Their fingers interlock ed.
lock	Hold in a locking position. The phone is lock ed to T mobile.
match	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. The big names were match ed against nobodies.
mate	Engage in sexual intercourse. Successful males may mate with many females.
net	Catch or land a fish or other animal with a net. This sale net ted me 1 million.
operate	Be in effect. Do not operate machinery after imbibing alcohol.
