<b>snare</b>	Strings stretched across the lower head of a snare drum they make a rattling sound when the drum is hit. <i>Seducers laid their <b>snares</b> for innocent provincials.</i>
<b>tangle</b>	A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. <i>They carved their way through the <b>tangle</b> of vines.</i>
<b>tracery</b>	Ornamental stone openwork, typically in the upper part of a Gothic window. <i>The rose designs were divided by <b>tracery</b>.</i>
<b>trap</b>	A device to hurl clay pigeons into the air for trapshooters. <i>They fell into the <b>trap</b> of relying too little on equity finance.</i>
<b>web</b>	The flattened weblike part of a feather consisting of a series of barbs on either side of the shaft. <i>Material downloaded from the <b>web</b>.</i>

**connect**

Make a logical or causal connection.

*The batter **connected** for a home run.*

**coordinate**

Form a coordinate bond to an atom or molecule.

*The stud fastenings are coloured to **coordinate** with the shirt.*

**dovetail**

Join together by means of a dovetail.

*Plan to enable parents to **dovetail** their career and family commitments.*

<b>engage</b>	Keep engaged. <i>Organizations <b>engage</b> in a variety of activities.</i>
<b>enmesh</b>	Entangle or catch in (or as if in) a mesh. <i>He is <b>enmeshed</b> in an adulterous affair.</i>
<b>ensnare</b>	Catch in or as if in a trap. <i>They were <b>ensnared</b> in city centre traffic.</i>
<b>ensnarl</b>	Cause to become caught up in complex difficulties or problems.
<b>entangle</b>	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. <i>They were suspicious of becoming <b>entangled</b> in a civil war.</i>
<b>entrap</b>	Catch in or as if in a trap. <i>Discarded fishing lines can <b>entrap</b> wildlife.</i>
<b>fit together</b>	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
<b>go together</b>	Be in the right place or situation.
<b>harmonize</b>	Bring (several things) into consonance or relate harmoniously. <i><b>Harmonize</b> the different interests.</i>
<b>interlock</b>	Lock or join (things) together. <i>Their fingers <b>interlocked</b>.</i>
<b>lock</b>	Hold in a locking position. <i>The phone is <b>locked</b> to T mobile.</i>
<b>match</b>	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>The big names were <b>matched</b> against nobodies.</i>

<b>hosiery</b>	Stockings, socks, and tights collectively.
<b>interface</b>	Connect with another computer or piece of equipment by an interface. <i>The <b>interface</b> between accountancy and the law.</i>
<b>interlock</b>	A fabric knitted with closely interlocking stitches allowing it to stretch. <i>Car thieves know how to bypass the ignition <b>interlock</b>.</i>

<b>net</b>	Fish with nets in a river. <i>They were <b>netting</b> the River Naver.</i>
<b>network</b>	Broadcast a programme on a network. <i>The railway <b>network</b>.</i>

<b>nylon</b>	Fabric or yarn made from nylon fibres. <i>The tent is made of blue <b>nylon</b>.</i>
<b>online</b>	(of an activity or service) available on or performed using the internet or other computer network. <i><b>Online</b> banking.</i>
<b>outage</b>	The amount of something (as whiskey or oil) lost in storage or transportation. <i>Frequent power <b>outages</b>.</i>
<b>server</b>	(court games) the player who serves to start a point. <i>The software runs on a variety of Unix <b>servers</b>.</i>
<b>telecommunication</b>	A message sent by telecommunication. <i>The field of <b>telecommunications</b>.</i>
<b>thread</b>	Pluck hairs from the eyebrows or another part of the body using a twisted cotton thread. <i><b>Thread</b> the buttons on to a length of cotton.</i>
