Definitions of "Mesmerizing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mesmerizing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Capturing one's complete attention as if by magic.*
- *Attracting and holding interest as if by a spell.*



Synonyms of "Mesmerizing" as an adjective (3 Words)

- hypnotic** Of or relating to hypnosis.
*A **hypnotic** state.*
- mesmeric** Attracting and holding interest as if by a spell.
*She had a warm **mesmeric** charm.*
- spellbinding** Holding one's attention completely as though by magic; fascinating.
*A place of **spellbinding** beauty.*



Usage Examples of "Mesmerizing" as an adjective

- *The sheer force of his presence was mesmerizing.*
- *A mesmerizing stare.*



Associations of "Mesmerizing" (30 Words)

admittance	The act of admitting someone to enter. <i>People were unable to gain admittance to the hall.</i>
allure	Dispose or incline or entice to. <i>Will sponsors really be allured by such opportunities.</i>
appeal	A shout of 'How's that?' or a similar call by a bowler or fielder to an umpire to declare a batsman out. <i>He said he would appeal against the conviction.</i>
attract	Be attractive to. <i>I am not attracted to him at all.</i>
attraction	The quality of arousing interest; being attractive or something that attracts. <i>The church is the town's main tourist attraction.</i>
beguile	Help (time) pass pleasantly. <i>They were beguiled into signing a peace treaty.</i>

<u>cachet</u>	A flat capsule enclosing a dose of unpleasant-tasting medicine. <i>No other shipping company had quite the cachet of Cunard.</i>
<u>captivate</u>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was captivated by her beauty.</i>
<u>charisma</u>	A personal attractiveness or interestingness that enables you to influence others. <i>He has tremendous charisma and stage presence.</i>
<u>charm</u>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>She charmed him into giving her all his money.</i>
<u>enchant</u>	Put (someone or something) under a spell; bewitch. <i>The scenery began to enchant her.</i>
<u>engage</u>	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>Tank and infantry units engaged the enemy.</i>
<u>enthrall</u>	Hold spellbound.
<u>entrance</u>	An opening, such as a door, passage, or gate, that allows access to a place. <i>The southern entrance of the palace.</i>
<u>fascinate</u>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>The serpent fascinates its prey.</i>
<u>gate</u>	A device resembling a gate in structure or function. <i>A logic gate.</i>
<u>gateway</u>	A means of achieving a state or condition. <i>We turned into a gateway leading to a cottage.</i>
<u>hypnotist</u>	A person who carries out hypnosis, either for medical reasons or for entertainment. <i>An expert clinician and skilled hypnotist.</i>
<u>hypnotize</u>	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>She gazed down hypnotized by the swirling tide.</i>
<u>inviting</u>	Attractive and tempting. <i>An inviting offer.</i>
<u>magician</u>	Someone who performs magic tricks to amuse an audience. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i>
<u>paralyzed</u>	Affected with paralysis.
<u>portal</u>	A site that the owner positions as an entrance to other sites on the internet. <i>The portals of success.</i>
<u>seduction</u>	Enticing someone astray from right behavior. <i>She was planning a seduction.</i>

spell

Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of.
*Journals have a house style about how to **spell**.*

spellbind

Attract strongly, as if with a magnet.
The singer held the audience spellbound.

tempt

Persuade (someone) to do something.
*How is it that ye have agreed together to **tempt** the Spirit of the Lord.*

trance

Put into a trance.
*In the Hades Warehouse there s the finest in **trance** and techno.*

wile

Lure; entice.
*She could be neither driven nor **wiled** into the parish kirk.*
