## Associations of "Messaging" (30 Words)

<a href="#">acquaint</a>	Know someone slightly. <i>She was already well <b>acquainted</b> with his work.</i>
<b>address</b>	Put an address on an envelope. <i>Our officers called at the <b>address</b>.</i>
<a href="#">admonish</a>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>He <b>admonished</b> the people against the evil of such practices.</i>
<a href="#">bulletin</a>	Make public by bulletin.
<b>congratulatory</b>	Expressive of sympathetic pleasure or joy on account of someone's success or good fortune. <i>A <b>congratulatory</b> handshake to mark four years of community success.</i>
<a href="#">convey</a>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>She <b>conveyed</b> the message to me.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	An item or items delivered on a particular occasion. <i>Allow up to 28 days for <b>delivery</b>.</i>
<b>eloquence</b>	Powerful and effective language. <i>A preacher of great power and <b>eloquence</b>.</i>
<b>email</b>	Send a message by email. <i>Reading <b>email</b> has become the first task of the morning.</i>
<b>gambit</b>	A maneuver in a game or conversation. <i>His resignation was a tactical <b>gambit</b>.</i>
<b>inform</b>	Act as an informer. <i>He wrote to her <b>informing</b> her of the situation.</i>
<b>informing</b>	To furnish incriminating evidence to an officer of the law (usually in return for favors).

<b>letter</b>	Be awarded an emblem in the shape of the initial letter of the name of one's school or university for achievement in sport. <i>The officer in the incident got in trouble for following the <b>letter</b> of the law.</i>
<b>mail</b>	Email. <i>In England they call <b>mail</b> the post.</i>
<b>mailing</b>	The transmission of a letter. <i>The candidate sent out three large <b>mailings</b>.</i>
<b>medley</b>	Make a medley of intermix. <i>A <b>medley</b> range of vague and variable impressions.</i>
<b>notify</b>	Inform (somebody) of something. <i>Births and deaths are required by law to be notified to the Registrar.</i>
<b>orate</b>	Talk pompously. <i>Lend me your ears Fred <b>orated</b>.</i>
<b>postage</b>	The charge for mailing something. <i>The prices include <b>postage</b> and packing.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b>relay</b>	Control or operate by relay. <i>Please <b>relay</b> the news to the villagers.</i>
<b>report</b>	Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism. <i>The <b>report</b> of his speech.</i>
<b>rhetorician</b>	A speaker whose words are primarily intended to impress or persuade. <i>They're ready to listen to any smooth tongued <b>rhetorician</b>.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> me your latest results.</i>
<b>sender</b>	A person who sends or transmits a message, letter, email, etc. <i><b>Senders</b> of unwanted emails.</i>
<b>spoken</b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>The <b>spoken</b> language.</i>
<b>telegram</b>	A message sent by telegraph and then delivered in written or printed form, used in the UK only for international messages since 1981.
<b>tidings</b>	News; information. <i>The bearer of glad <b>tidings</b>.</i>

**warn**

Inform someone in advance of a possible danger, problem, or other unpleasant situation.

*The doctor **warned** me about the dangers of smoking.*

**written**

Written as for a film or play or broadcast.

**Written** laws.
