addle	Become rotten. <i>Being in love must have addled your brain.</i>
bedlam	A state of extreme confusion and disorder. <i>There was bedlam in the courtroom.</i>
chaos	The first created being, from which came the primeval deities Gaia, Tartarus, Erebus, and Nyx. <i>Snow caused chaos in the region.</i>
chaotic	Of or relating to a sensitive dependence on initial conditions. <i>The political situation was chaotic.</i>
clutter	A collection of things lying about in an untidy state. <i>The room was in a clutter of smelly untidiness.</i>
confuse	Be confusing or perplexing to; cause to be unable to think clearly. <i>Her remarks confused the debate.</i>
confusion	An act causing a disorderly combination of elements with identities lost and distinctions blended. <i>The confusion of tongues at the Tower of Babel.</i>
crowding	A situation in which people or things are crowded together. <i>He didn't like the crowding on the beach.</i>
disheveled	In disarray; extremely disorderly- Al Spiers. <i>Her clothing was disheveled.</i>
disorder	Bring disorder to. <i>They are disordering the political landscape.</i>
distracted	Unable to concentrate because one is preoccupied by something worrying or unpleasant. <i>Charlotte seemed too distracted to give him much attention.</i>
disturbance	A disorderly outburst or tumult. <i>There was too much anger and disturbance.</i>

hash	Make meat or other food into a hash. <i>A hash of raw tomatoes chillies and coriander.</i>
<u>hodgepodge</u>	A motley assortment of things. <i>Rob s living room was a hodgepodge of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
jumble	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A drawer full of letters jumbled together.</i>
lousy	Very poor or bad. <i>Lousy weather.</i>
<u>mayhem</u>	The willful and unlawful crippling or mutilation of another person. <i>Complete mayhem broke out.</i>
<u>messy</u>	Generating or involving mess. <i>A messy divorce.</i>
<u>mingle</u>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>Resourcefully he mingled music and dance.</i>
muddle	An untidy and disorganized state or collection. <i>Paul was hopelessly muddled by the rates of exchange.</i>
pandemonium	A state of extreme confusion and disorder. <i>There was complete pandemonium everyone just panicked.</i>
perturbation	A minor deviation in the course of a celestial body, caused by the attraction of a neighbouring body. <i>The term distress connotes some degree of perturbation and emotional upset.</i>
rumple	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>She left her clothes in a rumple on the floor.</i>
<u>smother</u>	Suppress (a feeling or action). <i>Othello smothered Desdemona with a pillow.</i>
tumult	A state of commotion and noise and confusion. <i>The whole neighbourhood was in a state of fear and tumult.</i>
<u>turbulence</u>	A state of conflict or confusion. <i>The industrial revolution was a period of great turbulence.</i>
<u>turmoil</u>	A state of great disturbance, confusion, or uncertainty. <i>The country was in turmoil.</i>
unkempt	Not neatly combed. <i>Native vistas and unkempt rambling paths.</i>
untidy	Not neat and tidy. <i>The place was dreadfully untidy.</i>
