aboveground	On or above the surface of the ground. <i>Aboveground nuclear testing.</i>
abroad	In or to a foreign country or countries. <i>Millions of seeds are annually scattered abroad.</i>
absentee	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>An absentee from the match.</i>
absenteeism	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
allow	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>This sealed door won't allow the water come into the basement.</i>
away	An away match or win. <i>He's away right now.</i>
barring	The act of excluding someone by a negative vote or veto.
by	So as to go past. <i>A car flashed by on the other side of the road.</i>
decriminalize	Make legal. <i>A battle to decriminalize cannabis.</i>
defeatist	Demonstrating expectation or acceptance of failure. <i>We have a duty not to be so defeatist.</i>
depart	Leave, especially in order to start a journey. <i>A contingent was departing from Cairo.</i>
ease	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>The boat eased away from the harbour.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>

exception	A person or thing that is excluded from a general statement or does not follow a rule. <i>He always plays top tunes and tonight was no exception.</i>
exclude	Put out or expel from a place. <i>Apply flux to exclude oxygen.</i>
<u>exclusion</u>	An item or eventuality specifically not covered by an insurance policy or other contract. <i>Exclusions can be added to your policy.</i>
exemption	The action of freeing or state of being free from an obligation or liability imposed on others. <i>Additional exemptions are allowed for each dependent.</i>
<u>exhale</u>	Give out (breath or an odor). <i>The jungle exhaled mists of early morning.</i>
facilitate	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>The stimulus facilitates a delayed impulse.</i>
<u>going</u>	An act of leaving a place; a departure. <i>Persuading him was easy going.</i>
home	At or to or in the direction of one's home or family. <i>He was four fences from home.</i>
leave	In snooker croquet and other games the position in which a player leaves the balls for the next player. <i>19 minus 8 leaves 11.</i>
legalize	Make (something that was previously illegal) permissible by law. <i>The Swiss parliament legalized cannabis.</i>
<u>let</u>	Allow to pass in a particular direction. <i>About 50 people were let into the hearing.</i>
offstage	Situated or taking place in the area of a stage not visible to the audience. <i>The offstage lives of celebrities.</i>
<u>omit</u>	Leave undone or leave out. <i>He modestly omits to mention that he was a pole vault champion.</i>
other	Denoting the second of a specified or implied group of two. <i>He asked for other employment.</i>
<u>outside</u>	Functioning outside the boundaries or precincts of an organized unit. <i>An outside pitch.</i>
rent	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>We rented our apartment to friends while we were abroad.</i>
