<b><u>mechanism</u></b>	The doctrine that all natural phenomena, including life and thought, can be explained with reference to mechanical or chemical processes. <i>The immune system s <b>mechanism</b> for detecting pathogens.</i>
<b>method</b>	The quality of being well organized and systematic in thought or action. <i>A <b>method</b> for software maintenance.</i>
<b>methodological analysis</b>	The system of methods followed in a particular discipline.
<b>mo</b>	An indefinitely short time. <i>Hang on a <b>mo</b>.</i>
<b>modus operandi</b>	An unvarying or habitual method or procedure.
<b>operation</b>	Psychology the performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents. <i>Her smooth <b>operation</b> of the vehicle gave us a surprisingly comfortable ride.</i>
<b>plan</b>	A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>A street <b>plan</b>.</i>
<b>plan of action</b>	A series of steps to be carried out or goals to be accomplished.

<b>policy</b>	A line of argument rationalizing the course of action of a government. <i>You should have read the small print on your <b>policy</b>.</i>
<b>proceeding</b>	(law) the institution of a sequence of steps by which legal judgments are invoked.
<b>process</b>	A mental process that you are not directly aware of. <i>It was a <b>process</b> of trial and error.</i>
<b>series of steps</b>	A serialized set of programs.
<b>sop</b>	A piece of bread dipped in gravy, soup, or sauce. <i>My agent telephones as a <b>sop</b> but never finds me work.</i>
<b>standard operating procedure</b>	Any distinctive flag.
<b>stratagem</b>	A maneuver in a game or conversation. <i>A series of devious <b>stratagems</b>.</i>
<b>strategy</b>	A plan for directing overall military operations and movements. <i>Time to develop a coherent economic <b>strategy</b>.</i>
<b>system</b>	Organized planning or behaviour; orderliness. <i>Exercise helped him get the alcohol out of his <b>system</b>.</i>
<b>technique</b>	Skill or ability in a particular field. <i>He has excellent <b>technique</b>.</i>
<b>way</b>	A general category of things used in the expression in the way of. <i>The dinghy lost <b>way</b> and drifted towards the shore.</i>

<b>analytical</b>	Relating to or using analysis or logical reasoning. <i><b>Analytical</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>axiomatic</b>	Self-evident or unquestionable. <i>It is <b>axiomatic</b> that dividends have to be financed.</i>
<b>befitting</b>	Appropriate to the occasion. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a <b>befitting</b> manner.</i>
<b>capillarity</b>	The tendency of a liquid in a capillary tube or absorbent material to rise or fall as a result of surface tension.
<b>courtly</b>	Refined or imposing in manner or appearance; befitting a royal court. <i>He gave a <b>courtly</b> bow.</i>
<b>deducible</b>	Capable of being deduced.

<b>deductive</b>	Relating to logical deduction. <i><b>Deductive</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>dialectical</b>	Of or relating to or employing dialectic. <i>The <b>dialectical</b> method.</i>
<b>epistemology</b>	The philosophical theory of knowledge.
<b>formal</b>	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e.g. of formal dress. <i>The paper was written in <b>formal</b> English.</i>
<b>generalize</b>	Make a general or broad statement by inferring from specific cases. <i>It is not easy to <b>generalize</b> about the poor.</i>
<b>genetical</b>	Of or relating to or produced by or being a gene.
<b>hypothesis</b>	A proposition made as a basis for reasoning, without any assumption of its truth. <i>A scientific <b>hypothesis</b> that survives experimental testing becomes a scientific theory.</i>
<a href="#"><u>hypothesize</u></a>	To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds. <i>He <b>hypothesized</b> that the black market would naturally die out.</i>
<b>incontrovertible</b>	Not able to be denied or disputed. <i><b>Incontrovertible</b> proof of the defendant's innocence.</i>
<b>inimitable</b>	So good or unusual as to be impossible to copy; unique. <i>An <b>inimitable</b> style.</i>
<b>logic</b>	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>Aristotelian <b>logic</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>logical</u></a>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Rain was a <b>logical</b> expectation given the time of year.</i>
<b>manner</b>	Social behaviour or habits. <i>Her dignified <b>manner</b>.</i>
<b>means</b>	Considerable capital (wealth or income). <i>Resolving disputes by peaceful <b>means</b>.</i>
<b>method</b>	The quality of being well organized and systematic in thought or action. <i>Labour intensive production <b>methods</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>pejorative</u></a>	Expressing disapproval. <i>Most of what he said was inflammatory and filled with <b>pejoratives</b>.</i>
<b>philology</b>	Literary or classical scholarship.

<b>postmodern</b>	Relating to or characterized by postmodernism especially in being self referential. <i><b>Postmodern</b> deconstructionist theories.</i>
<b>procedural</b>	Relating to an established or official way of doing something. <i>A <b>procedural</b> drama set in a Rome police station.</i>
<u>reasoning</u>	Thinking that is coherent and logical. <i>He explained the <b>reasoning</b> behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
<b>relativity</b>	The dependence of various physical phenomena on relative motion of the observer and the observed objects, especially regarding the nature and behaviour of light, space, time, and gravity. <i>Moral <b>relativity</b>.</i>
<b>syllogism</b>	An instance of a form of reasoning in which a conclusion is drawn from two given or assumed propositions (premises); a common or middle term is present in the two premises but not in the conclusion, which may be invalid (e.g. all dogs are animals; all animals have four legs; therefore all dogs have four legs). <i>This school of epistemology is highly advanced in <b>syllogism</b> and logical reasoning.</i>
<b>teleology</b>	The explanation of phenomena in terms of the purpose they serve rather than of the cause by which they arise. <i>His theory of class consciousness is predicated on a <b>teleology</b>.</i>
<u>theory</u>	A tentative insight into the natural world; a concept that is not yet verified but that if true would explain certain facts or phenomena. <i>Music <b>theory</b>.</i>
