## Definitions of "Middle" as an adjective

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "middle" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- (of a language) of the period between the old and modern forms.
- Being neither at the beginning nor at the end in a series.
- Denoting a voice of verbs in some languages, such as Greek, which expresses reciprocal or reflexive action.
- At an equal distance from the extremities of something; central.
- Equally distant from the extremes.
- Of a stage in the development of a language or literature between earlier and later stages.
- Between an earlier and a later period of time.



- Denoting a transitive verb in English which does not have an equivalent passive, e.g. had in he had an idea.
- (of a member of a group or sequence) placed so as to have the same number of members on each side.
- Intermediate in rank, quality, or ability.
