Midnight as a Noun

Definitions of "Midnight" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “midnight” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The middle period of the night.*
- *Twelve o'clock at night.*
- *12 o'clock at night; the middle of the night.*



Synonyms of "Midnight" as a noun (7 Words)

dead of night	A time when coldness (or some other quality associated with death) is intense.
the middle of the night	Time between the beginning and the end of a temporal period.
the witching hour	A special and memorable period.
twelve at night	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
twelve midnight	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
twelve o'clock	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
zero hours	The sight setting that will cause a projectile to hit the center of the target with no wind blowing.



Usage Examples of "Midnight" as a noun

- *Young children should not be allowed to stay up until midnight.*
- *I left at midnight.*
- *The midnight hours.*

afternoon	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I ll be back at three in the afternoon.</i>
auroral	Of or relating to the atmospheric phenomenon auroras. <i>A dim auroral glow.</i>
awaken	Rouse (a feeling). <i>He sighed but did not awaken.</i>
breakfast	Eat breakfast. <i>She breakfasted on fried bread and bacon.</i>
chime	A stroke of the clapper against one or both sides of a scarcely moving bell. <i>The chimes of Big Ben.</i>
crepuscular	Like twilight; dim. <i>The evening s crepuscular charm.</i>
dawn	The first light of day. <i>The dawn of civilization.</i>
daybreak	The first light of day. <i>She set off at daybreak.</i>

daylight	An appreciable distance or difference between one person or thing and another. <i>Their views on education are so close that it s difficult to see daylight between them.</i>
daytime	The time of the day between sunrise and sunset. <i>It is easier to make the repairs in the daytime.</i>
<u>dinner</u>	A party of people assembled to have dinner together. <i>A dinner in honour of his homecoming.</i>
doorbell	A bell in a building which can be rung by visitors outside to signal their arrival. <i>Charlotte rang the doorbell.</i>
<u>dusk</u>	Become dusk. <i>The dusk demesnes of night.</i>
<u>evening</u>	In the evening every evening. <i>It was the evening of the Roman Empire.</i>
lunch	Take someone out for lunch. <i>A light lunch.</i>
lunchtime	The customary or habitual hour for eating lunch. <i>The lunchtime television news.</i>
midday	The middle of the day. <i>The midday sun.</i>
<u>morning</u>	Every morning. <i>I spent the morning running errands.</i>
<u>night</u>	Roman goddess of night daughter of Erebus counterpart of Greek Nyx. <i>He was not allowed to go out on weekday nights.</i>
nightfall	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by nightfall.</i>
noon	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve noon.</i>
o'clock	According to the clock.
sleep	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>I was on the verge of sleep.</i>
sunday	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<u>sunny</u>	(of a person or their temperament) cheery and bright. <i>A sunny day.</i>
<u>sunrise</u>	Atmospheric phenomena accompanying the daily appearance of the sun. <i>A spectacular sunrise over the summit of the mountain.</i>

- sunset** Of a declining industry or technology.
Sunset was still a couple of hours away.
- tonight** The present or immediately coming night.
*Are you doing anything **tonight**.*
- twilight** The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness.
*A **twilight** world of secrecy.*
- weekday** A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday.
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
