## Midnight as a Noun

### Definitions of "Midnight" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “midnight” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The middle period of the night.*
- *Twelve o'clock at night.*
- *12 o'clock at night; the middle of the night.*



## Synonyms of "Midnight" as a noun (7 Words)

<b>dead of night</b>	A time when coldness (or some other quality associated with death) is intense.
<b>the middle of the night</b>	Time between the beginning and the end of a temporal period.
<b>the witching hour</b>	A special and memorable period.
<b>twelve at night</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
<b>twelve midnight</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
<b>twelve o'clock</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
<b>zero hours</b>	The sight setting that will cause a projectile to hit the center of the target with no wind blowing.

- *Young children should not be allowed to stay up until midnight.*
- *I left at midnight.*
- *The midnight hours.*

<b>afternoon</b>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I ll be back at three in the <b>afternoon</b>.</i>
<b>auroral</b>	Of or relating to the atmospheric phenomenon auroras. <i>A dim <b>auroral</b> glow.</i>
<b>awaken</b>	Rouse (a feeling). <i>He sighed but did not <b>awaken</b>.</i>
<b>breakfast</b>	Eat breakfast. <i>She <b>breakfasted</b> on fried bread and bacon.</i>
<b>chime</b>	A stroke of the clapper against one or both sides of a scarcely moving bell. <i>The <b>chimes</b> of Big Ben.</i>
<b>crepuscular</b>	Like twilight; dim. <i>The evening s <b>crepuscular</b> charm.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	The first light of day. <i>The <b>dawn</b> of civilization.</i>
<b>daybreak</b>	The first light of day. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>

<b>daylight</b>	An appreciable distance or difference between one person or thing and another. <i>Their views on education are so close that it s difficult to see <b>daylight</b> between them.</i>
<b>daytime</b>	The time of the day between sunrise and sunset. <i>It is easier to make the repairs in the <b>daytime</b>.</i>
<u><b>dinner</b></u>	A party of people assembled to have dinner together. <i>A <b>dinner</b> in honour of his homecoming.</i>
<b>doorbell</b>	A bell in a building which can be rung by visitors outside to signal their arrival. <i>Charlotte rang the <b>doorbell</b>.</i>
<u><b>dusk</b></u>	Become dusk. <i>The <b>dusk</b> demesnes of night.</i>
<u><b>evening</b></u>	In the evening every evening. <i>It was the <b>evening</b> of the Roman Empire.</i>
<b>lunch</b>	Take someone out for lunch. <i>A light <b>lunch</b>.</i>
<b>lunchtime</b>	The customary or habitual hour for eating lunch. <i>The <b>lunchtime</b> television news.</i>
<b>midday</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The <b>midday</b> sun.</i>
<u><b>morning</b></u>	Every morning. <i>I spent the <b>morning</b> running errands.</i>
<u><b>night</b></u>	Roman goddess of night daughter of Erebus counterpart of Greek Nyx. <i>He was not allowed to go out on weekday <b>nights</b>.</i>
<b>nightfall</b>	The time of day immediately following sunset. <i>We had to get back by <b>nightfall</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>sleep</b>	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>I was on the verge of <b>sleep</b>.</i>
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<u><b>sunny</b></u>	(of a person or their temperament) cheery and bright. <i>A <b>sunny</b> day.</i>
<u><b>sunrise</b></u>	Atmospheric phenomena accompanying the daily appearance of the sun. <i>A spectacular <b>sunrise</b> over the summit of the mountain.</i>

- sunset** Of a declining industry or technology.  
*Sunset was still a couple of hours away.*
- tonight** The present or immediately coming night.  
*Are you doing anything **tonight**.*
- twilight** The period of the evening when twilight is visible between daylight and darkness.  
*A **twilight** world of secrecy.*
- weekday** A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday.  
*The **weekday** rush hour.*
