## Migrate as a Verb

### Definitions of "Migrate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “migrate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Transfer (programs or hardware) from one system to another.*
- *Move from one part of something to another.*
- *Move periodically or seasonally.*
- *(of a person) move to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions.*
- *Move from one country or region to another and settle there.*
- *(of an animal, typically a bird or fish) move from one region or habitat to another according to the seasons.*
- *Change or cause to change from one system to another.*



## Synonyms of "Migrate" as a verb (16 Words)

- drift** Drive slowly and far afield for grazing.  
*The laborers **drift** from one town to the next.*
- hike** Pull or lift up (something, especially clothing).  
*The government **hiked** up the price of milk by 40 per cent.*
- itinerate** Travel from place to place, as for work.  
*Regular use of itinerating magistrates was made.*
- journey** Undertake a journey or trip.  
*They **journeyed** south.*
- move** Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion.  
*The basketball player **moved** from one team to another.*
- move house** Go or proceed from one point to another.
- relocate** Move or establish in a new location.  
*Our company **relocated** to the Midwest.*

<b>resettle</b>	Settle in a new place. <i>The immigrants had to <b>resettle</b>.</i>
<b>roam</b>	Use a mobile phone on another operator's network, typically while abroad. <i>He let his mind <b>roam</b> as he walked.</i>
<b>rove</b>	Travel constantly without a fixed destination; wander. <i>The policeman s eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b>transmigrate</b>	Migrate. <i>His spirit would <b>transmigrate</b> into another being.</i>
<b>travel</b>	Change location move travel or proceed also metaphorically. <i>He <b>travelled</b> for a wholesale wine firm and had samples of numerous South Tyrolean wines in his case.</i>
<b>travel around</b>	Travel from place to place, as for the purpose of finding work, preaching, or acting as a judge.
<b>trek</b>	Fish using a trek net. <i>We <b>trekked</b> through the jungle.</i>
<b>voyage</b>	Go on a voyage. <i>He spent part of his life voyaging along the South African coast.</i>
<b>wander</b>	Move slowly away from a fixed point or place. <i>Please don t <b>wander</b> off again.</i>

- *As autumn arrives, the birds migrate south.*
- *Many Germans migrated to South America in the mid-19th century.*
- *Save time by efficiently migrating data to secondary storage systems.*

<b>ambulatory</b>	(of a patient) able to walk about; ambulant. <i>It has an <b>ambulatory</b> and seven chapels.</i>
<b>ballooning</b>	The sport or pastime of flying in a balloon. <i>A <b>ballooning</b> accident.</i>

<b>embark</b>	Put or take on board a ship or aircraft. <i>She <b>embarked</b> upon a new career.</i>
<b>gallivant</b>	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>go</b>	Go through in search of something search through someone's belongings in an unauthorized way. <i>I'd like to see my grandchildren before I <b>go</b>.</i>
<b>international</b>	A player who has taken part in an international game or contest. <i><b>International</b> waters.</i>
<b>itinerate</b>	Travel from place to place, as for work. <i>Regular use of <b>itinerating</b> magistrates was made.</i>
<b>maneuverable</b>	Capable of maneuvering or changing position. <i>A highly <b>maneuverable</b> ship.</i>
<b>migration</b>	Seasonal movement of animals from one region to another. <i>This butterfly's annual <b>migration</b> across North America.</i>
<b>migratory</b>	Used of animals that move seasonally. <i><b>Migratory</b> birds.</i>
<b>mobile</b>	A mobile phone. <i>Brightly coloured <b>mobiles</b> rotated from the ceiling.</i>
<b>mobility</b>	The quality of moving freely. <i>Industrialization would open up increasing chances of social <b>mobility</b>.</i>
<b>move</b>	Change location move travel or proceed also metaphorically. <i>His deep love of music <b>moved</b> him to take lessons with Dr Hill.</i>
<b>navigation</b>	Ship traffic. <i>Columbus corrected his westward course by celestial <b>navigation</b>.</i>
<b>nomadic</b>	Migratory. <i>The <b>nomadic</b> habits of the Bedouins.</i>
<b>roam</b>	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>Did you get to explore the city or have a <b>roam</b> around Bath.</i>
<b>roving</b>	(of a person in relation to their job) travelling or required to travel to different locations. <i>He trained as a <b>roving</b> reporter.</i>

<b>transferable</b>	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. <i>Balances are not <b>transferable</b> by cheque.</i>
<b>transit</b>	Revolve the telescope of a surveying transit about its horizontal transverse axis in order to reverse its direction. <i>The comet will <b>transit</b> on September 11.</i>
<b>transnational</b>	A multinational company. <i><b>Transnational</b> terrorist networks.</i>
<b>travel</b>	The action of travelling. <i>Two proximity switches detect when the valve has reached the end of its <b>travel</b>.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>I m not sure if she really liked me or if I was just part of her power <b>trip</b>.</i>
<b>wandering</b>	Having no fixed course. <i>She followed him in his <b>wanderings</b> and looked after him.</i>
