- *Humble in spirit or manner; suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness.*
- *(of weather) moderately warm, especially less cold than expected.*
- *Moderate in type or degree or effect or force; far from extreme.*
- *(of food, drink, or tobacco) not sharp, hot, or strong in flavour.*
- *(of a feeling) not intense or extreme.*
- *Gentle and not easily provoked.*
- *Not severe, serious, or harsh.*
- *Mild and pleasant.*

<b>equable</b>	Not varying. <i>An <b>equable</b> temper.</i>
<b><u>faint</u></b>	Indistinctly understood or felt or perceived. <i>A <b>faint</b> aroma.</i>
<b>favourable</b>	Giving an advantage. <i>A <b>favourable</b> prognosis.</i>
<b><u>feeble</u></b>	Lacking strength. <i>I know it s <b>feeble</b> but I ve never been one to stand up for myself.</i>
<b>flavourless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i>He delivers his <b>flavourless</b> dialogue in a listless deadpan.</i>
<b><u>genial</u></b>	(especially of air or climate) pleasantly mild and warm. <i>A <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b><u>gentle</u></b>	Moderate in action, effect, or degree; not strong or violent. <i>A <b>gentle</b> old horse docile and obedient.</i>
<b>good-natured</b>	Having an easygoing and cheerful disposition.
<b>half-hearted</b>	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm.
<b>imperceptible</b>	So slight, gradual, or subtle as not to be perceived. <i>His head moved in an almost <b>imperceptible</b> nod.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Fairly poor to not very good. <i>He gave an <b>indifferent</b> shrug.</i>
<b>insipid</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i>Mugs of <b>insipid</b> coffee.</i>
<b><u>lenient</u></b>	Tolerant or lenient. <i><b>Lenient</b> rules.</i>
<b>light</b>	Psychologically light especially free from sadness or troubles. <i>A <b>lightsome</b> buoyant step.</i>
<b>meagre</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>A <b>meagre</b> diet of bread and beans.</i>
<b><u>meek</u></b>	Quiet, gentle, and easily imposed on; submissive. <i>A fine fiery blast against <b>meek</b> conformity.</i>
<b>mellow</b>	Softened through age or experience. <i>Slow cooking gives the dish a sweet <b>mellow</b> flavour.</i>

<b><u>minimal</u></b>	Characterized by simplicity and lack of adornment or decoration. <i>Needed to enforce <b>minimal</b> standards.</i>
<b>moderate</b>	Average in amount, intensity, quality, or degree. <i>We walked at a <b>moderate</b> pace.</i>
<b><u>modest</u></b>	Free from pomp or affectation. <i>The <b>modest</b> women wear long sleeved dresses and all but cover their faces.</i>
<b>nominal</b>	Existing in name only. <i>The <b>nominal</b> GDP.</i>
<b>pacific</b>	Promoting peace. <i>The <b>pacific</b> temper seeks to settle disputes on grounds of justice rather than by force.</i>
<b>paltry</b>	(of an amount) very small or meagre. <i>A <b>paltry</b> wage.</i>
<b>peaceable</b>	Inclined to avoid conflict or dissent. <i>A quiet and <b>peaceable</b> person.</i>
<b>peaceful</b>	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i><b>Peaceful</b> times.</i>
<b><u>placid</u></b>	Calm and peaceful, with little movement or activity. <i>The <b>placid</b> waters of a small lake.</i>
<b>savourless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang.
<b><u>sensitive</u></b>	Quick to detect or respond to slight changes, signals, or influences. <i>A mimosa s leaves are <b>sensitive</b> to touch.</i>
<b><u>serene</u></b>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very <b>serene</b>.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>She was <b>slight</b> and delicate looking.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music soft in a quiet subdued tone. <i><b>Soft</b> margarine.</i>
<b><u>superficial</u></b>	Of, affecting, or being on or near the surface. <i>The building suffered only <b>superficial</b> damage.</i>
<b><u>sympathetic</u></b>	Of or relating to the sympathetic nervous system. <i><b>Sympathetic</b> stimulation.</i>
<b><u>tasteless</u></b>	Lacking flavour. <i>A <b>tasteless</b> joke.</i>



<b>temperate</b>	Free from extremes; mild; or characteristic of such weather or climate. <i>Charles was <b>temperate</b> in his consumption of both food and drink.</i>
<b>tender</b>	Not hardy; easily killed by adverse growing condition. <i><b>Tender</b> green beans.</i>
<b>token</b>	Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. <i>The patronizing treatment of the <b>token</b> Middle Eastern character.</i>
<b>tranquil</b>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>A lake of <b>tranquil</b> blue water reflecting a <b>tranquil</b> blue sky.</i>
<b>unassuming</b>	Not pretentious or arrogant; modest. <i>He was an <b>unassuming</b> and kindly man.</i>
<b>vague</b>	Not clearly understood or expressed-Anatole Broyard- P.A.So. <i><b>Vague</b> forms of speech have so long passed for mysteries of science.</i>
<b>warm</b>	Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>A <b>warm</b> welcome.</i>

<u><b>docile</b></u>	Willing to be taught or led or supervised or directed. <i>A cheap and <b>docile</b> workforce.</i>

<u><b>genial</b></u>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>Our <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>gentility</b>	Elegance by virtue of fineness of manner and expression. <i>Her grandmother s pretensions to <b>gentility</b>.</i>
<u><b>gentle</b></u>	Make or become gentle. <i>A <b>gentle</b> reprimand.</i>
<b>gently</b>	With lightness of action or effect; softly. <i>He talked <b>gently</b> to the injured animal.</i>
<u><b>gracious</b></u>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. <i>I am saved by God s <b>gracious</b> intervention on my behalf.</i>
<u><b>humane</b></u>	(of a branch of learning) intended to have a civilizing effect on people. <i>Regulations ensuring the <b>humane</b> treatment of animals.</i>
<b>humble</b>	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>My <b>humble</b> apologies.</i>
<u><b>lenient</b></u>	Tolerant or lenient. <i><b>Lenient</b> magistrates.</i>
<u><b>lightly</b></u>	With little weight or force. <i>She kissed him <b>lightly</b> on the forehead.</i>
<u><b>meek</b></u>	Very docile- Langston Hughes. <i>She looked <b>meek</b> but had the heart of a lion.</i>
<b>merciful</b>	Gracious (used conventionally of royalty and high nobility). <i>Sought <b>merciful</b> treatment for the captives.</i>
<u><b>mildly</b></u>	In a gentle manner. <i>He kept his voice <b>mildly</b> curious.</i>

<b><u>mosaic</u></b>	Decorate with a mosaic. <i>He <b>mosaicked</b> the walls ceilings and floors.</i>
<b>restrained</b>	(of colour, decoration, etc.) not excessively showy or ornate; understated. <i>The drawings with their <b>restrained</b> colours give a feeling of peace and contemplation.</i>
<b>sedation</b>	A state of reduced excitement or anxiety that is induced by the administrative of a sedative agent. <i>He was distraught with grief and under <b>sedation</b>.</i>
<b>sedative</b>	A drug that reduces excitability and calms a person. <i>Took a hot drink with <b>sedative</b> properties before going to bed.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i><b>Soft</b> hands.</i>
<b><u>softly</u></b>	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively softly. <i>The TV was murmuring <b>softly</b>.</i>
<b>subtropical</b>	Relating to or characteristic of the regions adjacent to or bordering on the tropics. <i>Dense <b>subtropical</b> forest.</i>
<b>tapping</b>	The action of striking against something with a quick light blow or blows, or a sound made in this way. <i>He heard the <b>tapping</b> of the man s cane.</i>
<b>temperate</b>	Not extreme in behavior. <i><b>Temperate</b> plants.</i>
<b>tranquilizer</b>	A drug used to reduce stress or tension without reducing mental clarity.
