- *(of a drug) replicate the physiological effects of (another substance).*
- *Imitate (a person or manner), especially for satirical effect.*
- *Imitate (someone or their actions or words), especially in order to entertain or ridicule.*
- *(of a disease) exhibit symptoms that bear a deceptive resemblance to those of (another disease).*

<u>emulate</u>	Imitate the function of (another system), as by modifying the hardware or the software. <i>This artist s drawings cannot emulate his water colors.</i>
facsimile	Send something via a facsimile machine. <i>Facsimile editions.</i>
imitate	Make a reproduction or copy of. <i>The mime imitated the passers by.</i>
<u>imitation</u>	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>Decorated with imitation palm leaves.</i>

parrot	Repeat mechanically. <i>The students parroted the teacher s words.</i>
<u>replica</u>	An exact copy or model of something, especially one on a smaller scale. <i>It is a replica of an antique plaque.</i>
<u>replicate</u>	(of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself. <i>Replicate the cell.</i>
replication	Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied. <i>DNA replication.</i>
reproduce	(of an organism) produce offspring by a sexual or asexual process. <i>He reproduced the feeling of sadness in the portrait.</i>
<u>resemble</u>	Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like. <i>Some people resemble their dogs.</i>

- reverberation** Prolongation of a sound; resonance.
*Electronic effects have been added such as echo and **reverberation**.*
- silently** Without speaking.
*She sobbed **silently** in the corner.*
- simulate** Imitate the appearance or character of.
*Future population changes were **simulated** by computer.*
- triplicate** A thing which is part of a set of three copies or corresponding parts.
***Triplicate** measurements.*
