## Mimic as a Verb

### Definitions of "Mimic" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "mimic" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of an animal or plant) resemble or imitate (another animal or plant) to deter predators or for camouflage.*
- *(of a drug) replicate the physiological effects of (another substance).*
- *Imitate (a person or manner), especially for satirical effect.*
- *Imitate (someone or their actions or words), especially in order to entertain or ridicule.*
- *(of a disease) exhibit symptoms that bear a deceptive resemblance to those of (another disease).*

<b><u>caricature</u></b>	Make or give a caricature of. <i>He was famous enough to be <b>caricatured</b> by Private Eye.</i>
<b>copy</b>	Send someone a copy of an email that is addressed to a third party. <i><b>Copy</b> the genetic information.</i>
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>I was speeding <b>doing</b> seventy five.</i>

<b><u>echo</u></b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>A blue suit that <b>echoed</b> the colour of her eyes.</i>
<b>have on the appearance of</b>	Go through (mental or physical states or experiences).

<b>imitate</b>	Reproduce someone's behavior or looks. <i>She <b>imitated</b> my Scots accent.</i>
<b>impersonate</b>	Represent another person with comic intentions. <i>She <b>impersonates</b> Madonna.</i>
<b>lampoon</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The actor was <b>lampooned</b> by the press.</i>
<b>look like</b>	Accord in appearance with.
<b>make fun of</b>	Institute, enact, or establish.
<b>mime</b>	Convey or represent (an action, idea, or emotion) by using only gesture and movement. <i>They've even <b>mimed</b> in a restaurant hall.</i>
<b>mirror</b>	Reflect as if in a mirror. <i>The smallest pond at night <b>mirrors</b> the firmament above.</i>
<b><u>mock</u></b>	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>He ought to find out who used his name <b>mocked</b> his voice and aped a few of his guitar lines.</i>
<b><u>parody</u></b>	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was <b>parodying</b> schoolgirl fiction.</i>
<b><u>resemble</u></b>	Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to. <i>Some people <b>resemble</b> their dogs.</i>
<b>satirize</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The movie <b>satirized</b> the notion of national superiority.</i>
<b>simulate</b>	Produce a computer model of. <i>It was impossible to force a smile to <b>simulate</b> pleasure.</i>
<b>take off</b>	Require (time or space).
<b>take on the appearance of</b>	Be designed to hold or take.
<b><u>travesty</u></b>	Make a travesty of. <i>Michael has betrayed the family by <b>travesty</b>ing them in his plays.</i>

<b><u>emulate</u></b>	Imitate the function of (another system), as by modifying the hardware or the software. <i>This artist's drawings cannot <b>emulate</b> his water colors.</i>
<b>facsimile</b>	Send something via a facsimile machine. <i><b>Facsimile</b> editions.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Make a reproduction or copy of. <i>The mime <b>imitated</b> the passers by.</i>
<b><u>imitation</u></b>	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>Decorated with <b>imitation</b> palm leaves.</i>
<b>imitator</b>	Someone who (fraudulently) assumes the appearance of another. <i>The show's success has sparked off many <b>imitators</b>.</i>
<b>iterate</b>	Run or be performed again. <i>The bird's call is a monotonously <b>iterated</b> single note.</i>
<b>mime</b>	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>He performed a brief <b>mime</b> of someone fencing.</i>
<b>mimesis</b>	The deliberate imitation of the behaviour of one group of people by another group as a factor in social change. <i>Barth has always detached his use of plot from <b>mimesis</b>.</i>
<b>mimetic</b>	Exhibiting mimicry. <i>A <b>mimetic</b> dance.</i>
<b>pantomime</b>	Express or represent by exaggerated mime. <i>He is currently appearing in <b>pantomime</b> in Manchester.</i>
<b>parrot</b>	Repeat mechanically. <i>The students <b>parroted</b> the teacher's words.</i>
<b><u>replica</u></b>	An exact copy or model of something, especially one on a smaller scale. <i>It is a <b>replica</b> of an antique plaque.</i>
<b><u>replicate</u></b>	(of genetic material or a living organism) reproduce or give rise to a copy of itself. <i><b>Replicate</b> the cell.</i>
<b>replication</b>	Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied. <i>DNA <b>replication</b>.</i>
<b>reproduce</b>	(of an organism) produce offspring by a sexual or asexual process. <i>He <b>reproduced</b> the feeling of sadness in the portrait.</i>
<b><u>resemble</u></b>	Have a similar appearance to or qualities in common with (someone or something); look or seem like. <i>Some people <b>resemble</b> their dogs.</i>

- resonance** Having the character of a loud deep sound; the quality of being resonant.  
*The concepts lose their emotional **resonance**.*
- reverberation** Prolongation of a sound; resonance.  
*Electronic effects have been added such as echo and **reverberation**.*
- silently** Without speaking.  
*She sobbed **silently** in the corner.*
- simulate** Imitate the appearance or character of.  
*Future population changes were **simulated** by computer.*
- triplicate** A thing which is part of a set of three copies or corresponding parts.  
***Triplicate** measurements.*
