- *Mix or cause to mix together.*
- *To bring or combine together or with something else.*

Synonyms of "Mingle" as a verb (28 Words)

amalgamate	Combine or unite to form one organization or structure. <i>Amalgamated</i> zinc.
associate with others	Keep company with; hang out with.
blend	Blend or harmonize. <i>Blend</i> the cornflour with a tablespoon of water.

circulate	Send copies of a letter or leaflet to (a group of people). <i>Rumours of his arrest circulated.</i>
coalesce	Fuse or cause to grow together. <i>The puddles had coalesced into shallow streams.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>An ideal place to combine shopping and sightseeing.</i>
commingle	Mix or blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses commingle.</i>
commix	Mix; mingle. <i>Beat them till they be thoroughly commixed.</i>
compound	Reckon (interest) on previously accumulated interest. <i>A dialect compounded of Spanish and Dutch.</i>
consort with others	Keep company with; hang out with. Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
fraternize	
fuse	Provide a circuit or electrical appliance with a fuse. <i>Powdered glass was fused to a metal base.</i>
get together	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).
interlace	Cross or be crossed intricately together; interweave. <i>Jane interlaced her fingers to form a cup.</i>
intermingle	Mix or mingle together. <i>We don't intermingle much.</i>
intermix	Combine into one. <i>The ore had to be handled so that it was not inadvertently intermixed with other material.</i>
interweave	Weave or become woven together. <i>The rugs are made by tightly interweaving the strands.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>She joined the department last year.</i>
jumble	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>His words jumbled.</i>
marry	Splice (rope ends) together without increasing their girth. <i>Eric asked me to marry him.</i>
meld	Lose its distinct outline or shape; blend gradually. <i>The nylon bristles shrivel and meld together.</i>

<u>merge</u>	Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity. <i>The cells merge.</i>
<u>mesh</u>	Entangle or catch in or as if in a mesh. <i>One gear meshes with the input gear.</i>
mix	Mix together different elements. <i>Peppercorns are sometimes mixed with other spices.</i>
rub shoulders	Move over something with pressure.
socialize	Participate in social activities; mix socially with others. <i>Health care should be socialized.</i>
<u>unify</u>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The two Germanys officially united.</i>

- *Resourcefully he mingled music and dance.*

amalgam	An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams. <i>Amalgam fillings.</i>
amalgamate	Combine or unite to form one organization or structure. <i>Numerous small British railway companies amalgamated.</i>
blend	Blend or harmonize. <i>The tea is blended using leaves from estates in Sri Lanka Kenya India and Indonesia.</i>
blending	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Clever cultural blendings.</i>
<u>coalesce</u>	Come together to form one mass or whole. <i>His idea served to coalesce all that happened into one connected whole.</i>

combination	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>A good uppercut hook combination.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not combine at room temperatures.</i>
commingle	Mix together different elements. <i>The part of the brain where the senses commingle.</i>
compound	Composed of more than one part <i>compound flower heads.</i> Compound flower heads.
conflate	Mix together different elements. <i>The urban crisis conflates a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
conjugate	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i>E coli only conjugate when one of the cells possesses fertility genes.</i>
hodgepodge	A confused mixture; a hotchpotch. <i>Rob s living room was a hodgepodge of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>Transport planning should be integrated with energy policy.</i>
intermingle	Mix or mingle together. <i>Riesling grapes were always intermingled with other varieties.</i>
intermix	Mix together. <i>Along its southern edge low trees intermix with the shrubs.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Our paths joined.</i>
jumble	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>We are collecting jumble for charity.</i>
melange	A varied mixture. <i>A melange of tender vegetables and herbs.</i>
meld	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>The nylon bristles shrivel and meld together.</i>
merge	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>He agreed to merge his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</i>
mess	Have one s meals with a particular person especially as a member of an armed forces mess. <i>They had some problems with dogs messing in the store.</i>

mix	A version of a recording in which the component tracks are mixed in a different way from the original. <i>He continues to mix an off hand sense of humour with a sharp insight.</i>
<u>mixture</u>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>The old town is a mixture of narrow medieval streets and 18th century architecture.</i>
muddle	Informal terms for a difficult situation. <i>The finances were in a muddle.</i>
patchwork	Sewing consisting of pieces of different materials sewn together in a pattern. <i>A patchwork bedspread.</i>
synthesis	The combination of components or elements to form a connected whole. <i>The synthesis of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Become one. <i>Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The two Germanys officially united.</i>
<u>united</u>	Joined together politically, for a common purpose, or by common feelings. <i>Presented a united front.</i>
weld	Forge an article by welding. <i>Her gratitude welded her to him.</i>
