### **Definitions of "Minorities" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “minorities” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A group of people who differ racially or politically from a larger group of which it is a part.*
- *Any age prior to the legal age.*
- *Being or relating to the smaller in number of two parts.*



## Synonyms of "Minorities" as a noun (1 Word)

**nonage** Any age prior to the legal age.

- *He held a minority position.*



## Associations of "Minorities" (30 Words)

- abstruse** Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge.  
*The professor's lectures were so **abstruse** that students tended to avoid them.*
- arcane** Requiring secret or mysterious knowledge.  
*The **arcane** science of dowsing.*
- attritional** Relating to or caused by attrition.
- clique** An exclusive circle of people with a common purpose.  
*His flat became a haven for a **clique** of young men of similar tastes.*
- convoluted** Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious.  
*Convoluted reasoning.*
- diminished** Of an organ or body part diminished in size or strength as a result of disease or injury or lack of use.  
*A **diminished** fifth.*

<b>esoteric</b>	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. <i>A compilation of <b>esoteric</b> philosophical theories.</i>
<b>jack</b>	A steeplejack. <i>You don't know <b>jack</b>.</i>
<b><u>less</u></b>	(usually preceded by 'no') lower in quality. <i>Cut out <b>less</b> important material.</i>
<b>lilliputian</b>	(informal) small and of little importance. <i>Our worries are <b>lilliputian</b> compared with those of countries that are at war.</i>
<b>little</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e.g little grebe. <i>Filthy <b>little</b> tricks.</i>
<b>mini</b>	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A <b>mini</b> camera.</i>
<b><u>minor</u></b>	Of a key or mode based on a minor scale and tending to produce a sad or pensive effect. <i>Jones <b>minor</b>.</i>
<b><u>obscure</u></b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The <b>obscure</b> light of dawn.</i>
<b>pettiness</b>	Lack of importance or worth; triviality. <i>These awesome moments lift us above the <b>pettiness</b> of the world.</i>
<b>pinprick</b>	A prick caused by a pin. <i>Compared with the indignities he had so far endured this was a mere <b>pinprick</b>.</i>
<b>puny</b>	Inferior in strength or significance. <i><b>Puny</b> excuses.</i>
<b><u>puzzle</u></b>	A jigsaw puzzle. <i>She was <b>puzzled</b> by the doctor's manner.</i>
<b>rarefied</b>	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. <i><b>Rarefied</b> scholarly pursuits.</i>
<b>recondite</b>	(of a subject or knowledge) little known; abstruse. <i>The book is full of <b>recondite</b> information.</i>
<b>reducible</b>	(of a subject or problem) capable of being simplified in presentation or analysis. <i>Shakespeare's major soliloquies are not <b>reducible</b> to categories.</i>
<b><u>secretive</u></b>	(of a person's expression or manner) having an enigmatic or conspiratorial quality. <i>A <b>secretive</b> smile.</i>

<b>shrinkage</b>	Process or result of becoming less or smaller. <i>Give long curtains good hems to allow for shrinkage.</i>
<b>shrinking</b>	Becoming smaller in size or amount. <i>The shrinking market has provoked a massive price war.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>She was slight and delicate looking.</i>
<b>small</b>	Have fine or very small constituent particles. <i>Her comments made me feel small.</i>
<b>tiny</b>	A very young child. <i>A tiny hummingbird.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working. <i>A trifling sum.</i>
<b><u>trivia</u></b>	Something of small importance. <i>We fill our days with meaningless trivia.</i>
<b>undersized</b>	Of less than the usual size. <i>The undersized cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
