<u><b>magical</b></u>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>A <b>magical</b> spell.</i>
<b>marvellous</b>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>These <b>marvellous</b> technological toys are fun to play with.</i>
<u><b>marvelous</b></u>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.</i>
<u><b>phenomenal</b></u>	Of or relating to a phenomenon. <i><b>Phenomenal</b> feats of memory.</i>
<b>preternatural</b>	Beyond what is normal or natural. <i>Autumn had arrived with <b>preternatural</b> speed.</i>
<b>prodigious</b>	Of momentous or ominous significance- Herman Melville. <i>Rumours of <b>prodigious</b> happenings such as monstrous births.</i>
<b>providential</b>	Relating to or characteristic of providence- M.R.Cohen. <i>His appearance had seemed more than just <b>providential</b>.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of notice. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> sight.</i>
<u><b>sensational</b></u>	Causing intense interest, curiosity, or emotion. <i>A <b>sensational</b> view.</i>
<b>superhuman</b>	Above or beyond the human or demanding more than human power or endurance. <i><b>Superhuman</b> beings.</i>
<b>supernatural</b>	Not existing in nature or subject to explanation according to natural laws; not physical or material. <i>A woman of <b>supernatural</b> beauty.</i>
<b>unaccountable</b>	(of a person, organization, or institution) not required or expected to justify actions or decisions; not responsible for results or consequences. <i>Perceptible only as <b>unaccountable</b> influences that hinder progress.</i>
<u><b>unbelievable</b></u>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i><b>Unbelievable</b> or not it happened.</i>

<b>incredible</b>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>An almost <b>incredible</b> tale of triumph and tragedy.</i>
<b>lucky</b>	Having, bringing, or resulting from good luck. <i>Three s my <b>lucky</b> number.</i>
<b>magical</b>	Beautiful or delightful in a way that seems removed from everyday life. <i>It was a <b>magical</b> evening of pure nostalgia.</i>
<b>marvelous</b>	Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers. <i>A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.</i>
<b>mystic</b>	Relating to or resembling mysticism. <i>The poetry of the 16th century Spanish <b>mystic</b> St John of the Cross.</i>

<b>providential</b>	Relating to or characteristic of providence- M.R.Cohen. <i>They took it for granted that the order of the world reflects a designing <b>providential</b> hand.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of attention; striking. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> coincidence.</i>
<b>rosy</b>	Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>The memory had the power to make her cheeks turn <b>rosy</b>.</i>
<b>supernatural</b>	Supernatural forces and events and beings collectively. <i>A <b>supernatural</b> being.</i>
<b>surprisingly</b>	Used to express surprise at an event or situation. <i>The finale ends <b>surprisingly</b>.</i>
<b>unbelievable</b>	So great or extreme as to be difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>Your audacity is <b>unbelievable</b>.</i>
<b>uncanny</b>	Suggesting the operation of supernatural influences- John Galsworthy. <i>An <b>uncanny</b> feeling that she was being watched.</i>

<b>unearthly</b>	Unreasonably early or inconvenient. <i><b>Unearthly</b> quiet.</i>
<b>want</b>	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>We <b>want</b> to go to the beach.</i>
<b>wish</b>	A thing that is or has been wished for. <i>He wouldn't <b>wish</b> Arthur on anyone.</i>
<b>wonderful</b>	Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers. <i>The climate was <b>wonderful</b> all the year round.</i>
