#### Definitions of "Mischief" as a noun

- Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.
- The quality or nature of being harmful or evil.
- Playfulness that is intended to tease or create trouble.
- A person responsible for harm or annoyance.
- Playful misbehaviour, especially on the part of children.
- A wrong or hardship that a statute is designed to remove or for which the common law affords a remedy.
- Harm or trouble caused by someone or something.

an injury bad behaviour	An act that causes someone or something to receive physical damage. That which is below standard or expectations as of ethics or decency.
<u>badness</u>	Poor quality or low standard. The <b>badness</b> of the writing is astonishing.
balefulness	The quality or nature of being harmful or evil.
devilment	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others. <i>His eyes were blazing with <b>devilment</b>.</i>
devilry	Wicked activity. Some <b>devilry</b> was afoot.



deviltry	Wicked and cruel behavior.
<u>disobedience</u>	Failure or refusal to obey rules or someone in authority. <b>Disobedience</b> to law is sometimes justified.
funny business	An account of an amusing incident (usually with a punch line.
<u>harm</u>	Actual or potential ill effects or danger. I didn t mean to cause him any <b>harm</b> .
hurt	A damage or loss. Rolling properly into a fall minimizes <b>hurt</b> .
impishness	The trait of behaving like an imp.
larks	North American songbirds having a yellow breast.
maleficence	Doing or causing evil.
misbehaviour	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>He had denied all sexual <b>misbehaviour</b>.</i>
mischief-making	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.
mischievousness	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.
<u>misconduct</u>	A penalty assessed against a player for unsportsmanlike conduct. She was found guilty of professional <b>misconduct</b> by a disciplinary tribunal and dismissed.
misdemeanour	A minor wrongdoing. The player can expect a suspension for his latest <b>misdemeanour</b> .
naughtiness	An attribute of mischievous children.
<u>nonsense</u>	A message that seems to convey no meaning. <i>The law is a <b>nonsense</b></i> .
perversity	The quality of being contrary to accepted standards or practice; unreasonableness. The <b>perversity</b> of being able to carry a gun but not purchase a drink.
pranks	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
rascality	Mischievous or dishonest behaviour or activity. The convicts ascribe their <b>rascality</b> to alcohol.
roguery	Conduct characteristic of a rogue, especially acts of dishonesty or playful mischief. There has always been <b>roguery</b> associated with horse dealing.
roguishness	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.



shenanigan	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.
tricks	(card games) in a single round, the sequence of cards played by all the players; the high card is the winner. <i>He played a trick on me.</i>



#### Usage Examples of "Mischief" as a noun

- The statute was passed to prevent a mischief in respect of which the defendant was already under a duty at common law.
- Her eyes twinkled with irrepressible mischief.
- She was bent on making mischief.
- She'll make sure Danny doesn't get into mischief.

<u>avenge</u>	Inflict harm in return for an injury or wrong on behalf of (oneself or another. <i>We must avenge our dead.</i>
baneful	Deadly or sinister. The <b>baneful</b> effects of envy and jealousy.
devilry	Reckless mischief. Some spirit of <b>devilry</b> made me go on teasing her.
deviltry	Reckless or malicious behavior that causes discomfort or annoyance in others.
diabolic	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. The cold calculation and <b>diabolic</b> art of some statesmen.



<u>enmity</u>	The feeling of a hostile person. Decades of <b>enmity</b> between the two countries.
evil	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. We were driven out of the house by an <b>evil</b> spirit.
grudge	Bear a grudge harbor ill feelings. I ve never been one to hold a <b>grudge</b> .
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. These pills won t <b>harm</b> your system.
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. You know I care he said in a <b>hurt</b> voice.
libellous	Containing or constituting a libel. A <b>libellous</b> newspaper story.
maleficent	Causing harm or destruction, especially by supernatural means. <i>He did not act with any <b>maleficent</b> motivation</i> .
malevolence	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with <b>malevolence</b></i> .
malevolent	Having or exerting a malignant influence. Failure made him <b>malevolent</b> toward those who were successful.
malice	Wrongful intention, especially as increasing the guilt of certain offences. <i>I bear no malice towards anybody.</i>
maliciousness	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
malign	Of a disease malignant. Believed in witches and <b>malign</b> spirits.
neurotoxin	Any toxin that affects neural tissues.
rancor	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
revenge	Inflict revenge on behalf of someone else. It was difficult not to be overwhelmed with feelings of hate and <b>revenge</b> .
<u>slander</u>	The action or crime of making a false spoken statement damaging to a person's reputation. <i>He is suing the TV company for slander.</i>
<u>spite</u>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. <i>He put the house up for sale to <b>spite</b> his family.</i>
traduce	Speak unfavorably about. It was regarded as respectable political tactics to <b>traduce</b> him.
<u>unkind</u>	Deficient in humane and kindly feelings. <i>The <b>unkind</b>est cut of all.</i>



<u>vengeance</u>	The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next life. For <b>vengeance</b> I would do nothing This nation is too great to look for mere revenge.
venom	Toxin secreted by animals; secreted by certain snakes and poisonous insects (e.g., spiders and scorpions. <i>His voice was full of <b>venom</b></i> .
vicious	Having the nature of vice. Every soul on earth virtuous or <b>vicious</b> shall perish.
virulent	(of a disease or poison) extremely severe or harmful in its effects. A <b>virulent</b> attack on liberalism.
wickedness	The quality of being disgusting to the senses or emotions. The <b>wickedness</b> of the regime.
wreak	Cause (a large amount of damage or harm. Grant me some knight to <b>wreak</b> me for my son.
