## Associations of "Misconceptions" (30 Words)

<b>bias</b>	Cause to be biased. <i>The <b>bias</b> towards younger people in recruitment.</i>
<b>deliberately</b>	In a deliberate unhurried manner. <i>She was working <b>deliberately</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">error</a></b>	The occurrence of an incorrect result produced by a computer. <i>The crash was caused by human <b>error</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">fallacy</a></b>	Faulty reasoning. <i>The notion that the camera never lies is a <b>fallacy</b>.</i>
<b>fallibility</b>	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the <b>fallibility</b> of memory and perception.</i>
<b>fallible</b>	Wanting in moral strength, courage, or will; having the attributes of man as opposed to e.g. divine beings. <i>I m only a <b>fallible</b> human.</i>
<b><a href="#">fault</a></b>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>The continental crust has been thinned and <b>faulted</b> as a result of geological processes.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not accurate. <i>The thermometer is <b>inaccurate</b>.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i>Put <b>inappropriate</b> pressure on them.</i>
<b>misapprehend</b>	Fail to understand (a person or their words) correctly; misinterpret. <i>They seemed not to mind that their more profound utterances were <b>misapprehended</b> as self help maxims.</i>
<b>misapprehension</b>	A mistaken belief about or interpretation of something. <i>People tried to exchange the vouchers under the <b>misapprehension</b> that they were book tokens.</i>
<b>misconceive</b>	Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding. <i>Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.</i>

<b><u>misconduct</u></b>	Behave badly. <i>Smith got a game <b>misconduct</b> for spearing Nick Kypreos.</i>
<b>misconstrue</b>	Interpret (a person's words or actions) wrongly. <i>She <b>misconstrued</b> my remarks.</i>
<b>miscount</b>	An incorrect reckoning. <i>A <b>miscount</b> necessitates a recount.</i>
<b>misdirect</b>	Put a wrong address on. <i><b>Misdirect</b> the letter.</i>
<b>misguide</b>	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<b>misinform</b>	Give (someone) false or inaccurate information. <i>I m afraid you have been <b>misinformed</b>.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret wrongly. <i>I think you re <b>misinterpreting</b> the situation.</i>
<b>mislead</b>	Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i>
<b><u>misplaced</u></b>	(of a feeling or emotion) directed unwisely or to an inappropriate object. <i>He began to wonder if his sympathy was <b>misplaced</b>.</i>
<b>misread</b>	Judge or interpret (a situation or a person's manner or behaviour) incorrectly. <i>I <b>misread</b> Hamlet all my life.</i>
<b>mistake</b>	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>He wasn t going to admit his <b>mistake</b>.</i>
<b>misunderstand</b>	Fail to interpret or understand the words or actions of (someone) correctly. <i>Don t <b>misunderstand</b> me I m not implying she should be working.</i>
<b><u>misunderstanding</u></b>	A failure to understand something correctly. <i>A <b>misunderstanding</b> of the government s plans.</i>
<b><u>misunderstood</u></b>	Wrongly understood. <i>He is one of football s most <b>misunderstood</b> men.</i>
<b>overrate</b>	Have a higher opinion of (someone or something) than is deserved. <i>His father greatly <b>overrated</b> his abilities.</i>
<b><u>pervert</u></b>	Practice sophistry; change the meaning of or be vague about in order to mislead or deceive. <i>He was charged with conspiring to <b>pervert</b> the course of justice.</i>
