| bias | Cause to be biased. <i>The bias towards younger people in recruitment.</i> |
| deliberately | In a deliberate unhurried manner. <i>She was working deliberately.</i> |
| error | The occurrence of an incorrect result produced by a computer. <i>The crash was caused by human error.</i> |
| fallacy | Faulty reasoning. <i>The notion that the camera never lies is a fallacy.</i> |
| fallibility | The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the fallibility of memory and perception.</i> |
| fallible | Wanting in moral strength, courage, or will; having the attributes of man as opposed to e.g. divine beings. <i>I m only a fallible human.</i> |
| fault | Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>The continental crust has been thinned and faulted as a result of geological processes.</i> |
| inaccurate | Not accurate. <i>The thermometer is inaccurate.</i> |
| inappropriate | Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i>Put inappropriate pressure on them.</i> |
| misapprehend | Fail to understand (a person or their words) correctly; misinterpret. <i>They seemed not to mind that their more profound utterances were misapprehended as self help maxims.</i> |
| misapprehension | A mistaken belief about or interpretation of something. <i>People tried to exchange the vouchers under the misapprehension that they were book tokens.</i> |
| misconceive | Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding. <i>Some academic latinists did misconceive Pound s poem in that way.</i> |

| <u>misconduct</u> | Behave badly. <i>Smith got a game misconduct for spearing Nick Kypreos.</i> |
| misconstrue | Interpret (a person's words or actions) wrongly. <i>She misconstrued my remarks.</i> |
| miscount | An incorrect reckoning. <i>A miscount necessitates a recount.</i> |
| misdirect | Put a wrong address on. <i>Misdirect the letter.</i> |
| misguide | Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and misguide the general reader.</i> |
| misinform | Give (someone) false or inaccurate information. <i>I m afraid you have been misinformed.</i> |
| misinterpret | Interpret wrongly. <i>I think you re misinterpreting the situation.</i> |
| mislead | Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i> |
| <u>misplaced</u> | (of a feeling or emotion) directed unwisely or to an inappropriate object. <i>He began to wonder if his sympathy was misplaced.</i> |
| misread | Judge or interpret (a situation or a person's manner or behaviour) incorrectly. <i>I misread Hamlet all my life.</i> |
| mistake | To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>He wasn t going to admit his mistake.</i> |
| misunderstand | Fail to interpret or understand the words or actions of (someone) correctly. <i>Don t misunderstand me I m not implying she should be working.</i> |
| <u>misunderstanding</u> | A failure to understand something correctly. <i>A misunderstanding of the government s plans.</i> |
| <u>misunderstood</u> | Wrongly understood. <i>He is one of football s most misunderstood men.</i> |
| overrate | Have a higher opinion of (someone or something) than is deserved. <i>His father greatly overrated his abilities.</i> |
| <u>pervert</u> | Practice sophistry; change the meaning of or be vague about in order to mislead or deceive. <i>He was charged with conspiring to pervert the course of justice.</i> |
