
### **Misinformation as a Noun**

#### Definitions of "Misinformation" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "misinformation" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- False or inaccurate information, especially that which is deliberately intended to deceive.
- Information that is incorrect.







#### Synonyms of "Misinformation" as a noun (3 Words)

**deception** A misleading falsehood.

Obtaining property by **deception**.

**disinformation** False information which is intended to mislead, especially propaganda issued by a government organization to a rival power or the media. *A government inspired disinformation campaign.* 

false information A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn.



#### Usage Examples of "Misinformation" as a noun

• Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and misinformation.





## Associations of "Misinformation" (30 Words)

blunder	A stupid or careless mistake. She stopped finally aware of the terrible <b>blunder</b> she had made.
clanger	A conspicuous mistake whose effects seem to reverberate. <i>He dropped a clanger</i> .
<u>culpability</u>	Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame. A level of moral <b>culpability</b> .
defect	Desert (a cause, a country or an army), often in order to join the opposing cause, country, or army. <i>If there are any <b>defect</b>s you should send it back to the manufacturer.</i>
disinformation	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc. <i>A government inspired <b>disinformation</b> campaign.</i>



err	Be mistaken or incorrect; make a mistake. The judge had <b>err</b> ed in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.
<u>erroneous</u>	Containing or characterized by error. Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.
<u>error</u>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. An <b>error</b> of judgement.
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was faulty</i> .
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. The computer game was <b>flaw</b> ed by poor programming.
<u>flawed</u>	(of a person) having a weakness in character. A fatally <b>flawed</b> strategy.
inaccurate	Not exact. A forecast that proved wildly <b>inaccurate</b> .
inadvertence	The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.
<u>incorrect</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. An <b>incorrect</b> transcription.
lapse	A brief or temporary failure of concentration, memory, or judgement. <i>Tracing his lapse into petty crime.</i>
misconceive	Fail to understand (something) correctly. Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.
misconstrue	Interpret in the wrong way. She <b>misconstrue</b> d my remarks.
miscount	An inaccurate count. A <b>miscount</b> necessitates a recount.
<u>misleading</u>	Giving the wrong idea or impression. A <b>misleading</b> similarity.
<u>mistaken</u>	Arising from error. She wondered whether she d been <b>mistaken</b> about his intentions.
mistrial	A trial rendered invalid through an error in the proceedings. The judge dismissed the charge and declared a <b>mistrial</b> .
misunderstanding	Putting the wrong interpretation on. There must have been some kind of <b>misunderstanding</b> .



omission	Something that has been omitted. There are glaring <b>omission</b> s in the report.
oversight	The action of overseeing something. Was the mistake due to <b>oversight</b> .
<u>propaganda</u>	The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy. The party s leaders believed that a long period of education and <b>propaganda</b> would be necessary.
slip	A fielder at slip. My grades are <b>slip</b> ping.
solecism	A socially awkward or tactless act.
spreading	Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.
typo	A typographical error.
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. Said all the <b>wrong</b> things.
