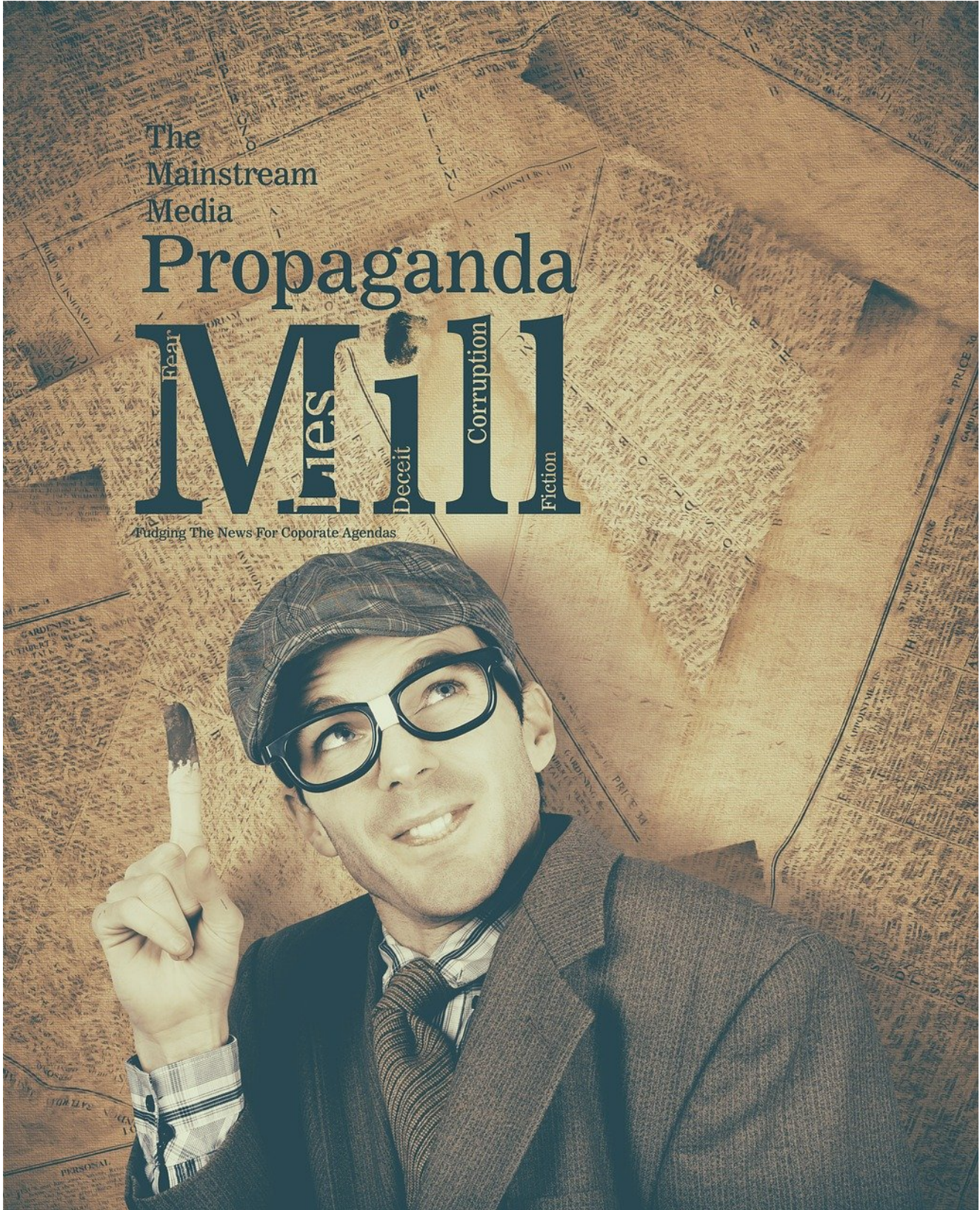

Misinformation as a Noun

Definitions of "Misinformation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “misinformation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *False or inaccurate information, especially that which is deliberately intended to deceive.*
- *Information that is incorrect.*



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Synonyms of "Misinformation" as a noun (3 Words)

- deception** A misleading falsehood.
*Obtaining property by **deception**.*
- disinformation** False information which is intended to mislead, especially propaganda issued by a government organization to a rival power or the media.
*A government inspired **disinformation** campaign.*
- false information** A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn.



Usage Examples of "Misinformation" as a noun

- Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and misinformation.



Associations of "Misinformation" (30 Words)

- blunder** A stupid or careless mistake.
*She stopped finally aware of the terrible **blunder** she had made.*
- clanger** A conspicuous mistake whose effects seem to reverberate.
*He dropped a **clanger**.*
- culpability** Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame.
*A level of moral **culpability**.*
- defect** Desert (a cause, a country or an army), often in order to join the opposing cause, country, or army.
*If there are any **defects** you should send it back to the manufacturer.*
- disinformation** Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc).
*A government inspired **disinformation** campaign.*

err	Be mistaken or incorrect; make a mistake. <i>The judge had erred in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.</i>
<u>erroneous</u>	Containing or characterized by error. <i>Employers sometimes make erroneous assumptions.</i>
<u>error</u>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>An error of judgement.</i>
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was faulty.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>The computer game was flawed by poor programming.</i>
<u>flawed</u>	(of a person) having a weakness in character. <i>A fatally flawed strategy.</i>
inaccurate	Not exact. <i>A forecast that proved wildly inaccurate.</i>
inadvertence	The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.
<u>incorrect</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>An incorrect transcription.</i>
lapse	A brief or temporary failure of concentration, memory, or judgement. <i>Tracing his lapse into petty crime.</i>
misconceive	Fail to understand (something) correctly. <i>Some academic latinists did misconceive Pound s poem in that way.</i>
misconstrue	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>She misconstrued my remarks.</i>
miscount	An inaccurate count. <i>A miscount necessitates a recount.</i>
<u>misleading</u>	Giving the wrong idea or impression. <i>A misleading similarity.</i>
<u>mistaken</u>	Arising from error. <i>She wondered whether she d been mistaken about his intentions.</i>
mistrial	A trial rendered invalid through an error in the proceedings. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a mistrial.</i>
<u>misunderstanding</u>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>There must have been some kind of misunderstanding.</i>

<u>omission</u>	Something that has been omitted. <i>There are glaring omissions in the report.</i>
oversight	The action of overseeing something. <i>Was the mistake due to oversight.</i>
<u>propaganda</u>	The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy. <i>The party's leaders believed that a long period of education and propaganda would be necessary.</i>
slip	A fielder at slip. <i>My grades are slipping.</i>
solecism	A socially awkward or tactless act.
spreading	Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.
typo	A typographical error.
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>Said all the wrong things.</i>
