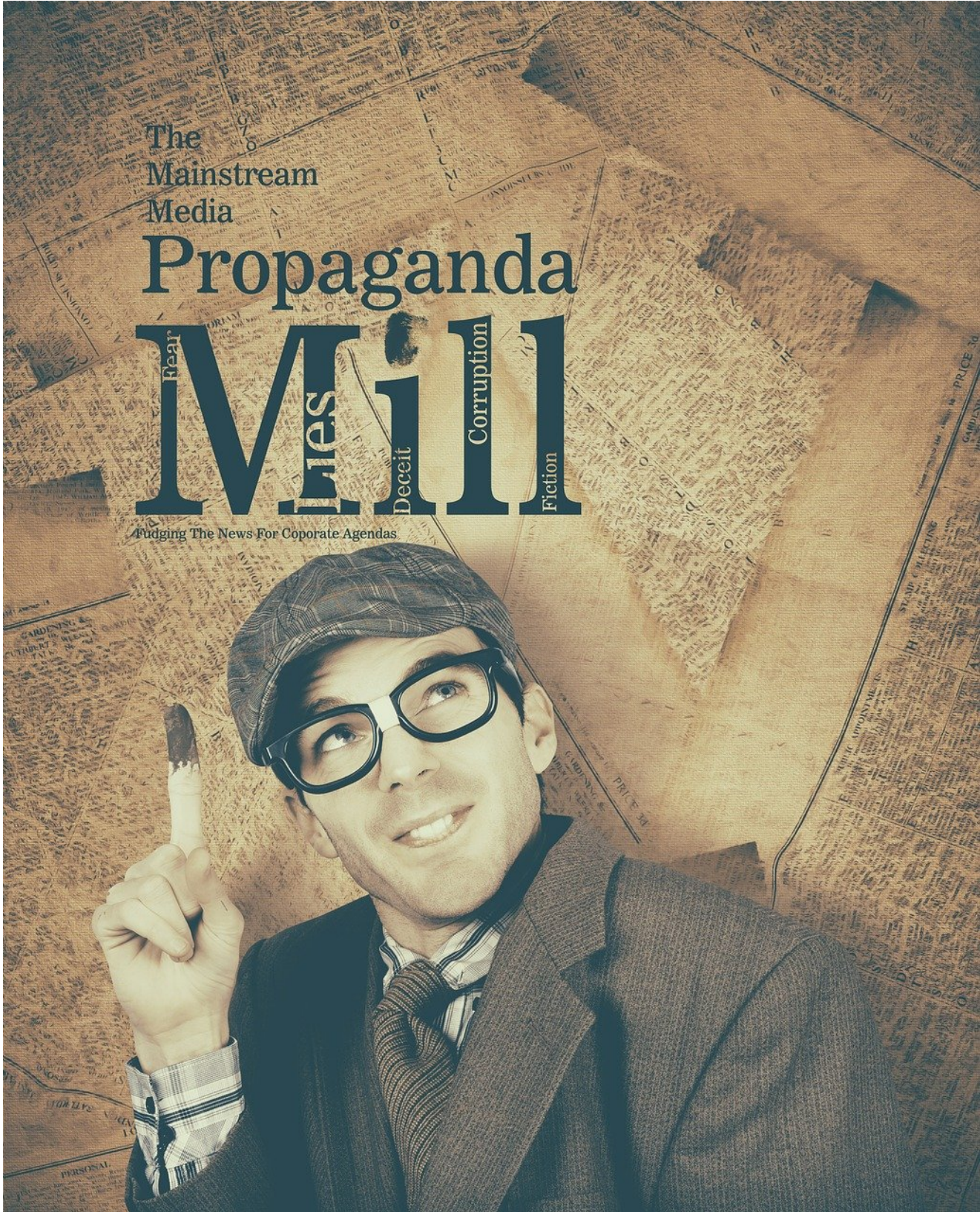
## Misinformation as a Noun

### Definitions of "Misinformation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “misinformation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *False or inaccurate information, especially that which is deliberately intended to deceive.*
- *Information that is incorrect.*







## Synonyms of "Misinformation" as a noun (3 Words)

- deception** A misleading falsehood.  
*Obtaining property by **deception**.*
- disinformation** False information which is intended to mislead, especially propaganda issued by a government organization to a rival power or the media.  
*A government inspired **disinformation** campaign.*
- false information** A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn.



## Usage Examples of "Misinformation" as a noun

- Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and misinformation.



## Associations of "Misinformation" (30 Words)

- blunder** A stupid or careless mistake.  
*She stopped finally aware of the terrible **blunder** she had made.*
- clanger** A conspicuous mistake whose effects seem to reverberate.  
*He dropped a **clanger**.*
- culpability** Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame.  
*A level of moral **culpability**.*
- defect** Desert (a cause, a country or an army), often in order to join the opposing cause, country, or army.  
*If there are any **defects** you should send it back to the manufacturer.*
- disinformation** Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc).  
*A government inspired **disinformation** campaign.*

<b>err</b>	Be mistaken or incorrect; make a mistake. <i>The judge had <b>erred</b> in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.</i>
<b><u>erroneous</u></b>	Containing or characterized by error. <i>Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.</i>
<b><u>error</u></b>	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>An <b>error</b> of judgement.</i>
<b><u>faulty</u></b>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was <b>faulty</b>.</i>
<b>flaw</b>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>The computer game was <b>flawed</b> by poor programming.</i>
<b><u>flawed</u></b>	(of a person) having a weakness in character. <i>A fatally <b>flawed</b> strategy.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not exact. <i>A forecast that proved wildly <b>inaccurate</b>.</i>
<b>inadvertence</b>	The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.
<b><u>incorrect</u></b>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>An <b>incorrect</b> transcription.</i>
<b>lapse</b>	A brief or temporary failure of concentration, memory, or judgement. <i>Tracing his <b>lapse</b> into petty crime.</i>
<b>misconceive</b>	Fail to understand (something) correctly. <i>Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.</i>
<b>misconstrue</b>	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>She <b>misconstrued</b> my remarks.</i>
<b>miscount</b>	An inaccurate count. <i>A <b>miscount</b> necessitates a recount.</i>
<b><u>misleading</u></b>	Giving the wrong idea or impression. <i>A <b>misleading</b> similarity.</i>
<b><u>mistaken</u></b>	Arising from error. <i>She wondered whether she d been <b>mistaken</b> about his intentions.</i>
<b>mistrial</b>	A trial rendered invalid through an error in the proceedings. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a <b>mistrial</b>.</i>
<b><u>misunderstanding</u></b>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>There must have been some kind of <b>misunderstanding</b>.</i>



<b><u>omission</u></b>	Something that has been omitted. <i>There are glaring <b>omissions</b> in the report.</i>
<b>oversight</b>	The action of overseeing something. <i>Was the mistake due to <b>oversight</b>.</i>
<b><u>propaganda</u></b>	The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy. <i>The party's leaders believed that a long period of education and <b>propaganda</b> would be necessary.</i>
<b>slip</b>	A fielder at slip. <i>My grades are <b>slipping</b>.</i>
<b>solecism</b>	A socially awkward or tactless act.
<b>spreading</b>	Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.
<b>typo</b>	A typographical error.
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>Said all the <b>wrong</b> things.</i>
