## Misplaced as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Misplaced" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “misplaced” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Lost temporarily; as especially put in an unaccustomed or forgotten place.*
- *Not appropriate or correct in the circumstances.*
- *Incorrectly positioned.*
- *Put in the wrong place or position.*
- *Temporarily lost.*
- *(of a feeling or emotion) directed unwisely or to an inappropriate object.*



## Synonyms of "Misplaced" as an adjective (9 Words)

- ill-advised** Without careful prior deliberation or counsel.
- ill-considered** Not given careful consideration.
- ill-judged** Not given careful consideration.
- lost** Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity.  
*Lost friends.*
- misconceived** Wrongly or badly planned or judged, typically because of faulty understanding.  
*Parents often have **misconceived** notions about choking.*
- misguided** Poorly conceived or thought out.  
*Their **misguided** belief that they were defending the honour of their country.*
- mislaid** Lost temporarily; as especially put in an unaccustomed or forgotten place.  
*The **mislaid** hat turned up eventually.*

**missing**

(of a person) absent from a place, especially their home, and of unknown whereabouts.

A **missing** person.

**unwise**

Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom.

**Unwise** policy decisions.



## Usage Examples of "Misplaced" as an adjective

- *She was penalized for a spelling mistake or a misplaced accent.*
- *A million dollars had been lost because of a misplaced comma.*
- *Her misplaced keys.*
- *He began to wonder if his sympathy was misplaced.*
- *A telling sign of misplaced priorities.*
- *Misplaced tickets.*

## Associations of "Misplaced" (30 Words)

<b>disqualify</b>	(of a feature or characteristic) make (someone) unsuitable for an office or activity. <i>A heart murmur disqualified him for military service.</i>
<b>fallacy</b>	A mistaken belief, especially one based on unsound arguments. <i>The notion that the camera never lies is a <b>fallacy</b>.</i>
<b>improper</b>	Not suitable or right or appropriate. <i>The <b>improper</b> use of public funds.</i>
<b>improperly</b>	In a manner not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i>The young woman is <b>improperly</b> attired with a sleeveless low necked dress.</i>
<b>impropriety</b>	An indecent or improper act. <i>She was scandalized at the <b>impropriety</b> of the question.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not exact. <i>The thermometer is <b>inaccurate</b>.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Put <b>inappropriate</b> pressure on them.</i>
<b>inapt</b>	Not suitable or appropriate in the circumstances. <i>A more <b>inapt</b> name I cannot imagine.</i>
<b>incongruent</b>	Incongruous; incompatible.
<b>indecorous</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>A pub crawl with sundry <b>indecorous</b> adventures.</i>
<b>indelicate</b>	Having or showing a lack of sensitive understanding or tact. <i>An earthy often <b>indelicate</b> sense of humour.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>These awards remain an <b>iniquitous</b> system.</i>
<b>lost</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>His <b>lost</b> honor.</i>
<b>misapprehend</b>	Fail to understand (a person or their words) correctly; misinterpret. <i>They seemed not to mind that their more profound utterances were <b>misapprehended</b> as self help maxims.</i>

<b><u>misconception</u></b>	A view or opinion that is incorrect because based on faulty thinking or understanding. <i>Public <b>misconceptions</b> about antibiotic use.</i>
<b>misdirect</b>	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>The appeal court was satisfied that the trial judge had <b>misdirected</b> the jury.</i>
<b>misguide</b>	Give bad advice to. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret falsely. <i>Soanes claimed his remarks had been <b>misinterpreted</b>.</i>
<b>mislead</b>	Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i>
<b>misread</b>	Judge or interpret (a situation or a person's manner or behaviour) incorrectly. <i>He withdrew an allegation based on his <b>misreading</b> of a newspaper article.</i>
<b>misunderstand</b>	Fail to interpret or understand the words or actions of (someone) correctly. <i>Don't <b>misunderstand</b> me I'm not implying she should be working.</i>
<b><u>unbecoming</u></b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An <b>unbecoming</b> striped sundress.</i>
<b><u>undesirable</u></b>	One whose presence is undesirable. <i>The drug's <b>undesirable</b> side effects.</i>
<b><u>unfit</u></b>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>Certified as <b>unfit</b> for army service.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Violating principles of justice. <i>An <b>unjust</b> judge.</i>
<b><u>unsound</u></b>	Physically unsound or diseased. <i>Activities deemed to be environmentally <b>unsound</b>.</i>
<b>unsuitability</b>	The quality of having the wrong properties for a specific purpose.
<b><u>unsuitable</u></b>	Not conducive to good moral development. <i>The display is <b>unsuitable</b> for young children.</i>
<b>unsuited</b>	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>I have done you a great <b>wrong</b>.</i>
