Definitions of "Misrepresentation" as a noun

- *A misleading falsehood.*
- *The action or offence of giving a false or misleading account of the nature of something.*



Synonyms of "Misrepresentation" as a noun (3 Words)

deceit	The act of deceiving. <i>Hypocrisy and deceit were anathema to her.</i>
deception	A thing that deceives. <i>Obtaining property by deception.</i>
falsification	Any evidence that helps to establish the falsity of something. <i>An investigation into fraud and the falsification of records.</i>

- *A gross misrepresentation of the situation.*
- *She is seeking damages on allegations of misrepresentation.*

Associations of "Misrepresentation" (30 Words)

adverse	Preventing success or development; harmful; unfavourable. <i>Adverse circumstances.</i>
belie	Fail to fulfil or justify (a claim or expectation). <i>His lively alert manner belied his years.</i>
contradict	Be in contradiction with. <i>The existing layout of the city contradicted the logic of the new centre.</i>
damaging	Having a detrimental effect on someone or something. <i>New cars are less damaging to the environment.</i>
default	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>The default is fifty lines.</i>
deny	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>The servants are ordered to deny him.</i>
deprecation	A prayer to avert or remove some evil or disaster. A state of unhappiness and low spirits.
despond	<i>The supporters of the Presidential candidate desponded when they learned the early results of the election.</i>
disavow	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>Her husband disavowed her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
displease	Make (someone) feel annoyed or dissatisfied. <i>The tone of the letter displeased him.</i>

disprove	Prove to be false. <i>He has given the Department of Transport two months to disprove the allegation.</i>
dissenter	A member of a non-established Church; a Nonconformist.
error	(computer science) the occurrence of an incorrect result produced by a computer. <i>The decisions of the appeal committee disclosed no error of law.</i>
exaggerate	Represent (something) as being larger, better, or worse than it really is. <i>Claims of turmoil within the firm are greatly exaggerated.</i>
inappropriate	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>There are penalties for inappropriate behaviour.</i>
misinterpret	Interpret (something or someone) wrongly. <i>Don't misinterpret my comments as criticism.</i>
negate	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>This action will negate the effect of my efforts.</i>
neutralize	Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions. <i>120 bombs were neutralized.</i>
no	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions 7 isotopes are known. <i>He was no heavier than a child.</i>
nullify	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.</i>
objection	The speech act of objecting. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
opposed	In conflict with or hostile to. <i>Parties opposed to the ruling party.</i>
peccadillo	A relatively minor fault or sin. <i>The sexual peccadilloes of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i>
prejudicial	Harmful to someone or something; detrimental. <i>The reporter's coverage resulted in prejudicial publicity for the defendant.</i>
rebuttal	(law) a pleading by the defendant in reply to a plaintiff's surrejoinder.
rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
skeptic	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
undesirable	One whose presence is undesirable. <i>Undesirable impurities in steel.</i>

veto

Exercise a veto against a decision or proposal.

*His **veto** on our drinking after the meal was annoying.*

wrong

Treat unjustly do wrong to.

*It is **wrong** to lie.*
