<b>function</b>	Mathematics a mathematical relation such that each element of a given set the domain of the function is associated with an element of another set the range of the function. <i>The <b>function</b> <math>b \times c</math>.</i>
<b>goal</b>	A cage or basket used as a goal in other sports. <i>He achieved his <b>goal</b> of becoming King of England.</i>
<b>grail</b>	The object of any prolonged endeavor. <i>Youth culture became the <b>grail</b> of broadcasting.</i>
<b>holy grail</b>	A sacred place of pilgrimage.
<b>journey</b>	An act of travelling from one place to another. <i>I was excited with my character's <b>journey</b> in the film.</i>

<b>mission station</b>	An organization of missionaries in a foreign land sent to carry on religious work.
<b>missionary organization</b>	Someone sent on a mission—especially a religious or charitable mission to a foreign country.
<b>missionary post</b>	Someone sent on a mission—especially a religious or charitable mission to a foreign country.

<b>missionary station</b>	Someone sent on a mission—especially a religious or charitable mission to a foreign country.
<b>missionary work</b>	Someone who attempts to convert others to a particular doctrine or program.

<b>operation</b>	The performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents. <i>The company's first hotel is now in <b>operation</b>.</i>
<b>purpose</b>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>There was a new sense of <b>purpose</b> in her step as she set off.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	The action of the eye in following a moving object. <i>The culprit started to run and the cop took off in <b>pursuit</b>.</i>
<b><u>quest</u></b>	A search for an alternative that meets cognitive criteria. <i>A <b>quest</b> for diamonds.</i>
<b><u>raid</u></b>	A rapid surprise attack on an enemy by troops, aircraft, or other armed forces. <i>An early morning <b>raid</b> on a bank.</i>
<b>representation</b>	A presentation to the mind in the form of an idea or image. <i>Certain <b>representations</b> were made concerning police brutality.</i>
<b>sortie</b>	A short trip or journey. <i>An early morning <b>sortie</b> into the garden of our hotel.</i>
<b><u>target</u></b>	The location of the target that is to be hit. <i>The <b>target</b> of a manhunt.</i>
<b>task force</b>	A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee.
<b><u>tour</u></b>	A journey for pleasure in which several different places are visited. <i>She joined the Royal Shakespeare Company on <b>tour</b>.</i>
<b>trip</b>	A catch mechanism that acts as a switch. <i>A <b>trip</b> mechanism.</i>



<b>undertaking</b>	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>National transport <b>undertakings</b>.</i>
<b>vocation</b>	A person's employment or main occupation, especially regarded as worthy and requiring dedication. <i>Her <b>vocation</b> as a poet.</i>
<b>voyage</b>	An act of traveling by water. <i>His <b>voyage</b> to America.</i>

<b>accountability</b>	The fact or condition of being accountable; responsibility. <i>Lack of <b>accountability</b> has corroded public respect for business and political leaders.</i>
<b>achieve</b>	Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage. <i>She <b>achieved</b> her goal despite setbacks.</i>
<b>assign</b>	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>His leader <b>assigned</b> him this mission.</i>
<b>assignment</b>	An undertaking that you have been assigned to do (as by an instructor). <i>The effective <b>assignment</b> of tasks.</i>

<b>duty</b>	A government tax on imports or exports. <i>A 6 per cent <b>duty</b> on imports.</i>
<b>entrust</b>	Confer a trust upon. <i>The messenger was <b>entrusted</b> with the general's secret.</i>
<b>homework</b>	Work or study done in preparation for an event or situation. <i>He always helps his daughter with her <b>homework</b>.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	Very difficult to deal with. <i><b>Impossible</b> behavior.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.</i>
<b>improbable</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>This account of events was seen by the jury as most <b>improbable</b>.</i>
<b>inconceivable</b>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>It seemed <b>inconceivable</b> that the president had been unaware of what was going on.</i>

<b>liable</b>	Subject to legal action. <i><b>Liable</b> to criminal charges.</i>
<b>obligation</b>	An act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound; a duty or commitment. <i>He is under an <b>obligation</b> to finish the job.</i>
<b>responsibility</b>	The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force- John. <i>He holds a position of great <b>responsibility</b>.</i>
<b>task</b>	Assign a task to. <i>A new manager was given the <b>task</b> of developing the club s talent.</i>
<b>try</b>	An act of trying something new or different to see if it is suitable effective or pleasant. <i>You are <b>trying</b> my patience.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not adequate to give satisfaction. <i>A word <b>unacceptable</b> in polite society.</i>
<b>unavailable</b>	Not able to be used or obtained; not at someone's disposal. <i>Material which is <b>unavailable</b> to the researcher.</i>
<b>unbelievable</b>	So great or extreme as to be difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i><b>Unbelievable</b> or not it happened.</i>
<b>unbelievably</b>	Not easy to believe. <i>The show went <b>unbelievably</b> well.</i>
<b>undertaking</b>	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>The knowing <b>undertaking</b> of an obligation.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>
