<u>quest</u>	A search for an alternative that meets cognitive criteria. <i>A quest for diamonds.</i>
<u>raid</u>	A rapid surprise attack on an enemy by troops, aircraft, or other armed forces. <i>An early morning raid on a bank.</i>
representation	A presentation to the mind in the form of an idea or image. <i>Certain representations were made concerning police brutality.</i>
sortie	A short trip or journey. <i>An early morning sortie into the garden of our hotel.</i>
<u>target</u>	The location of the target that is to be hit. <i>The target of a manhunt.</i>
task force	A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee.
<u>tour</u>	A journey for pleasure in which several different places are visited. <i>She joined the Royal Shakespeare Company on tour.</i>
trip	A catch mechanism that acts as a switch. <i>A trip mechanism.</i>

undertaking	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>National transport undertakings.</i>
vocation	A person's employment or main occupation, especially regarded as worthy and requiring dedication. <i>Her vocation as a poet.</i>
voyage	An act of traveling by water. <i>His voyage to America.</i>

accountability	The fact or condition of being accountable; responsibility. <i>Lack of accountability has corroded public respect for business and political leaders.</i>
achieve	Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage. <i>She achieved her goal despite setbacks.</i>
assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>His leader assigned him this mission.</i>

<u>impossible</u>	Very difficult to deal with. <i>Impossible behavior.</i>
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was impracticable to widen the road here.</i>
improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>This account of events was seen by the jury as most improbable.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>It seemed inconceivable that the president had been unaware of what was going on.</i>

liable	Subject to legal action. <i>Liable to criminal charges.</i>
obligation	An act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound; a duty or commitment. <i>He is under an obligation to finish the job.</i>
responsibility	The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force- John. <i>He holds a position of great responsibility.</i>
task	Assign a task to. <i>A new manager was given the task of developing the club s talent.</i>
try	An act of trying something new or different to see if it is suitable effective or pleasant. <i>You are trying my patience.</i>
unacceptable	Not adequate to give satisfaction. <i>A word unacceptable in polite society.</i>
unavailable	Not able to be used or obtained; not at someone's disposal. <i>Material which is unavailable to the researcher.</i>
unbelievable	So great or extreme as to be difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>Unbelievable or not it happened.</i>
unbelievably	Not easy to believe. <i>The show went unbelievably well.</i>
undertaking	The action of undertaking to do something. <i>The knowing undertaking of an obligation.</i>
unimaginable	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
unlikely	Not likely to happen, be done, or be true; improbable. <i>It is unlikely that they will ever be used.</i>
unreasonable	Not guided by or based on good sense. <i>Unreasonable demands.</i>
unthinkable	(of a situation or event) too unlikely or undesirable to be considered a possibility. <i>The unthinkable happened I spoke up.</i>
