## Mist as a Noun

### Definitions of "Mist" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mist” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A haze or film over the eyes, especially caused by tears, and resulting in blurred vision.*
- *A cloud of tiny water droplets suspended in the atmosphere at or near the earth's surface that limits visibility (to a lesser extent than fog; strictly, with visibility remaining above 1 km.*
- *Used in reference to something that blurs one's perceptions or memory.*
- *A thin fog with condensation near the ground.*
- *A condensed vapour settling in fine droplets on a surface.*



## Synonyms of "Mist" as a noun (12 Words)

- cloud** A large number of insects or birds moving together.  
*The only **cloud** on the horizon was the possibility of dissent by the French.*
- cloudiness** The quality of being cloudy.
- drizzle** Light rain falling in very fine drops.  
*A steady **drizzle** has been falling since 3 a m.*
- fog** A state or cause of perplexity or confusion.  
*The collision occurred in thick **fog**.*
- haar** A cold sea fog on the east coast of England or Scotland.
- haze** A state of mental confusion.  
*The cold air has no pollution and very little **haze**.*
- mistiness** Cloudiness resulting from haze or mist or vapor.
- murk** Darkness or thick mist that makes it difficult to see.  
*My eyes were straining to see through the **murk** of the rainy evening.*

**scotch mist** A slight surface cut (especially a notch that is made to keep a tally).

**smog** Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants.  
*The fires caused widespread **smogs**.*

**spray** A pesticide in suspension or solution intended for spraying.  
*A fine **spray** of mud.*

**vapour** The process of becoming a vapor.  
*Dense clouds of smoke and toxic **vapour**.*



## Usage Examples of "Mist" as a noun

- *A mist rose out of the river.*
- *A breeze cooled the mist of perspiration that had dampened her temples.*
- *Sardinia's origins are lost in the mists of time.*
- *Ruth saw most of the scene through a mist of tears.*
- *The peaks were shrouded in mist.*



## Mist as a Verb

### Definitions of "Mist" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "mist" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Spray finely or cover with mist.*
- *(of a person's eyes) become covered with a film of tears causing blurred vision.*
- *Become covered with mist.*
- *Spray (something, especially a plant) with a fine cloud of water droplets.*
- *Make less visible or unclear.*
- *Cover or become covered with mist.*



## Synonyms of "Mist" as a verb (23 Words)

<b>becloud</b>	Make less visible or unclear. <i>Confusion <b>beclouds</b> the issue.</i>
<b>become blurred</b>	Come into existence.
<b>become cloudy</b>	Come into existence.
<b>become covered with condensation</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>become misty</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>befog</b>	Make less visible or unclear. <i>Her brain was <b>befogged</b> with lack of sleep.</i>
<b>cloud</b>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>The smoke <b>clouded</b> above the houses.</i>
<b>cloud over</b>	Make less clear.
<b>film over</b>	Make a film or photograph of something.
<b>fog</b>	Make (a film, negative, or print) obscure or cloudy. <i>Hot steam drifted about her <b>fogging</b> up the window.</i>

<b>fog over</b>	Make less visible or unclear.
<b>fog up</b>	Make less visible or unclear.
<b><u>haze</u></b>	Obscure with a haze. <i>A clump of islands very green but <b>hazed</b> in cloud and mist.</i>
<b>haze over</b>	Harass by imposing humiliating or painful tasks, as in military institutions.
<b>mist over</b>	Spray finely or cover with mist.
<b>obnubilate</b>	Darken or cover with or as if with a cloud; obscure. <i>Their words <b>obnubilate</b> their intentions.</i>
<b><u>obscure</u></b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The debate has become <b>obscured</b> by conflicting ideological perspectives.</i>
<b>shower</b>	Of a mass of small things fall or be thrown in a shower. <i>He <b>showered</b> her with kisses.</i>
<b>spatter</b>	Dash a liquid upon or against. <i>Passing vehicles <b>spattered</b> his shoes and trousers with mud.</i>
<b>spread in droplets</b>	Move outward.
<b><u>sprinkle</u></b>	Scatter or pour (small drops or particles of a substance) over an object or surface. <i>He <b>sprinkled</b> his conversation with quotations.</i>
<b>spritz</b>	Spray (a liquid) in quick, short bursts. <i><b>Spritz</b> water on a surface.</i>
<b>steam up</b>	Clean by means of steaming.



## Usage Examples of "Mist" as a verb

- *Her eyes misted over with relief and joy.*
- *Don't mist furry-leaved plants such as African violets.*
- *The windshield misted over.*
- *The glass was beginning to mist up.*
- *The windows of the car were misted up with condensation.*



## Associations of "Mist" (30 Words)

<b>aerosol</b>	A container holding an aerosol. <i>The organisms are spread in the <b>aerosols</b> generated by showers.</i>
<b>atmospheric</b>	Relating to or located in the atmosphere. <i><b>Atmospheric</b> lighting.</i>
<b>blur</b>	Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>In front of him the page <b>blurred</b>.</i>
<b>churn</b>	Produce butter by churning milk or cream. <i>Vast crowds had <b>churned</b> the area into a sea of mud.</i>
<b>cloud</b>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>A black <b>cloud</b> hung over their lives.</i>
<b>cloudy</b>	(of a colour) having white as a constituent. <i><b>Cloudy</b> reds and blues and greens.</i>



<b>drizzle</b>	Light rain falling in very fine drops. <i>Raw mushrooms thinly sliced and served with lemon a little salt and a <b>drizzle</b> of olive oil.</i>
<b>droplet</b>	A tiny drop. <i><b>Droplets</b> of water.</i>
<b>fog</b>	Bewilder or puzzle. <i>The government has been <b>fogging</b> the issue.</i>
<b>foggy</b>	Unable to think clearly; confused. <i>She was <b>foggy</b> with sleep.</i>
<b>haze</b>	Obscure with a haze. <i>There was a thick <b>haze</b> on this October morning.</i>
<b>hazy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i><b>Hazy</b> memories.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor. <i>A hot and <b>humid</b> day.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the <b>humidity</b> in the low thirties.</i>
<b>misty</b>	Wet with mist. <i>The <b>misty</b> evening.</i>
<b>moisten</b>	Moisten with fine drops. <i>She <b>moistened</b> her lips with the tip of her tongue.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.</i>
<b>overcast</b>	Sew with an overcast stitch from one section to the next. <i><b>Overcast</b> books.</i>
<b>pollutant</b>	Waste matter that contaminates the water or air or soil. <i><b>Pollutant</b> gases.</i>
<b>pollution</b>	The state of being polluted. <i>The level of <b>pollution</b> in the air is rising.</i>
<b>precipitation</b>	An unexpected acceleration or hastening. <i>The storm brought several inches of <b>precipitation</b>.</i>
<b>propellant</b>	Any substance that propels. <i>Rocket <b>propellants</b>.</i>
<b>rain</b>	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>He fell under the <b>rain</b> of blows.</i>

- roil** Make (a liquid) turbid or muddy by disturbing the sediment.  
*The sea **roiled** below her.*
- sky The region of the atmosphere and outer space seen from the earth.  
*Dorcas had never seen so much **sky**.*
- smog** Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants.  
*Exhaust emissions are mainly responsible for the **smog**.*
- smoke** Cure or preserve food especially meat or fish by exposure to smoke.  
*With all that **smoke** there must be a fire somewhere.*
- snow** A frozen gas resembling snow.  
*We were trudging through deep **snow**.*
- steam Cook food by heating it in steam from boiling water.  
*The glass keeps **steaming** up.*
- wet Wetness caused by water.  
*While dreaming the child **wet** the bed.*
