Mist as a Noun

Definitions of "Mist" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mist” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A haze or film over the eyes, especially caused by tears, and resulting in blurred vision.*
- *A cloud of tiny water droplets suspended in the atmosphere at or near the earth's surface that limits visibility (to a lesser extent than fog; strictly, with visibility remaining above 1 km.*
- *Used in reference to something that blurs one's perceptions or memory.*
- *A thin fog with condensation near the ground.*
- *A condensed vapour settling in fine droplets on a surface.*



Synonyms of "Mist" as a noun (12 Words)

cloud	A large number of insects or birds moving together. <i>The only cloud on the horizon was the possibility of dissent by the French.</i>
cloudiness	The quality of being cloudy.
drizzle	Light rain falling in very fine drops. <i>A steady drizzle has been falling since 3 a m.</i>
fog	A state or cause of perplexity or confusion. <i>The collision occurred in thick fog.</i>
haar	A cold sea fog on the east coast of England or Scotland.
haze	A state of mental confusion. <i>The cold air has no pollution and very little haze.</i>
mistiness	Cloudiness resulting from haze or mist or vapor.
murk	Darkness or thick mist that makes it difficult to see. <i>My eyes were straining to see through the murk of the rainy evening.</i>

scotch mist A slight surface cut (especially a notch that is made to keep a tally).

smog Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants.
*The fires caused widespread **smogs**.*

spray A pesticide in suspension or solution intended for spraying.
*A fine **spray** of mud.*

vapour The process of becoming a vapor.
*Dense clouds of smoke and toxic **vapour**.*



Usage Examples of "Mist" as a noun

- *A mist rose out of the river.*
- *A breeze cooled the mist of perspiration that had dampened her temples.*
- *Sardinia's origins are lost in the mists of time.*
- *Ruth saw most of the scene through a mist of tears.*
- *The peaks were shrouded in mist.*



Mist as a Verb

Definitions of "Mist" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](https://www.oxforddictionaries.com/define/mist-verb), "mist" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Spray finely or cover with mist.*
- *(of a person's eyes) become covered with a film of tears causing blurred vision.*
- *Become covered with mist.*
- *Spray (something, especially a plant) with a fine cloud of water droplets.*
- *Make less visible or unclear.*
- *Cover or become covered with mist.*



Synonyms of "Mist" as a verb (23 Words)

becloud	Make less visible or unclear. <i>Confusion beclouds the issue.</i>
become blurred	Come into existence.
become cloudy	Come into existence.
become covered with condensation	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
become misty	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
befog	Make less visible or unclear. <i>Her brain was befogged with lack of sleep.</i>
<u>cloud</u>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>The smoke clouded above the houses.</i>
cloud over	Make less clear.
film over	Make a film or photograph of something.
<u>fog</u>	Make (a film, negative, or print) obscure or cloudy. <i>Hot steam drifted about her fogging up the window.</i>

fog over

Make less visible or unclear.

fog up

Make less visible or unclear.

haze

Obscure with a haze.

*A clump of islands very green but **hazed** in cloud and mist.*

haze over

Harass by imposing humiliating or painful tasks, as in military institutions.

mist over

Spray finely or cover with mist.

obnubilate

Darken or cover with or as if with a cloud; obscure.

*Their words **obnubilate** their intentions.*

obscure

Make obscure or unclear.

*The debate has become **obscured** by conflicting ideological perspectives.*

shower

Of a mass of small things fall or be thrown in a shower.

*He **showered** her with kisses.*

spatter

Dash a liquid upon or against.

*Passing vehicles **spattered** his shoes and trousers with mud.*

spread in droplets

Move outward.

sprinkle

Scatter or pour (small drops or particles of a substance) over an object or surface.

*He **sprinkled** his conversation with quotations.*

spritz

Spray (a liquid) in quick, short bursts.

***Spritz** water on a surface.*

steam up

Clean by means of steaming.



Usage Examples of "Mist" as a verb

- *Her eyes misted over with relief and joy.*
- *Don't mist furry-leaved plants such as African violets.*
- *The windshield misted over.*
- *The glass was beginning to mist up.*
- *The windows of the car were misted up with condensation.*



Associations of "Mist" (30 Words)

aerosol	A container holding an aerosol. <i>The organisms are spread in the aerosols generated by showers.</i>
atmospheric	Relating to or located in the atmosphere. <i>Atmospheric lighting.</i>
<u>blur</u>	Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>In front of him the page blurred.</i>
<u>churn</u>	Produce butter by churning milk or cream. <i>Vast crowds had churned the area into a sea of mud.</i>
<u>cloud</u>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>A black cloud hung over their lives.</i>
<u>cloudy</u>	(of a colour) having white as a constituent. <i>Cloudy reds and blues and greens.</i>

drizzle	Light rain falling in very fine drops. <i>Raw mushrooms thinly sliced and served with lemon a little salt and a drizzle of olive oil.</i>
droplet	A tiny drop. <i>Droplets of water.</i>
fog	Bewilder or puzzle. <i>The government has been fogging the issue.</i>
foggy	Unable to think clearly; confused. <i>She was foggy with sleep.</i>
haze	Obscure with a haze. <i>There was a thick haze on this October morning.</i>
hazy	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>Hazy memories.</i>
humid	Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor. <i>A hot and humid day.</i>
humidity	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the humidity in the low thirties.</i>
misty	Wet with mist. <i>The misty evening.</i>
moisten	Moisten with fine drops. <i>She moistened her lips with the tip of her tongue.</i>
moisture	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the moisture content varies.</i>
overcast	Sew with an overcast stitch from one section to the next. <i>Overcast books.</i>
pollutant	Waste matter that contaminates the water or air or soil. <i>Pollutant gases.</i>
pollution	The state of being polluted. <i>The level of pollution in the air is rising.</i>
precipitation	An unexpected acceleration or hastening. <i>The storm brought several inches of precipitation.</i>
propellant	Any substance that propels. <i>Rocket propellants.</i>
rain	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>He fell under the rain of blows.</i>

roil	Make (a liquid) turbid or muddy by disturbing the sediment. <i>The sea roiled below her.</i>
<u>sky</u>	The region of the atmosphere and outer space seen from the earth. <i>Dorcas had never seen so much sky.</i>
smog	Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants. <i>Exhaust emissions are mainly responsible for the smog.</i>
smoke	Cure or preserve food especially meat or fish by exposure to smoke. <i>With all that smoke there must be a fire somewhere.</i>
snow	A frozen gas resembling snow. <i>We were trudging through deep snow.</i>
<u>steam</u>	Cook food by heating it in steam from boiling water. <i>The glass keeps steaming up.</i>
<u>wet</u>	Wetness caused by water. <i>While dreaming the child wet the bed.</i>
