## Mixture as a Noun

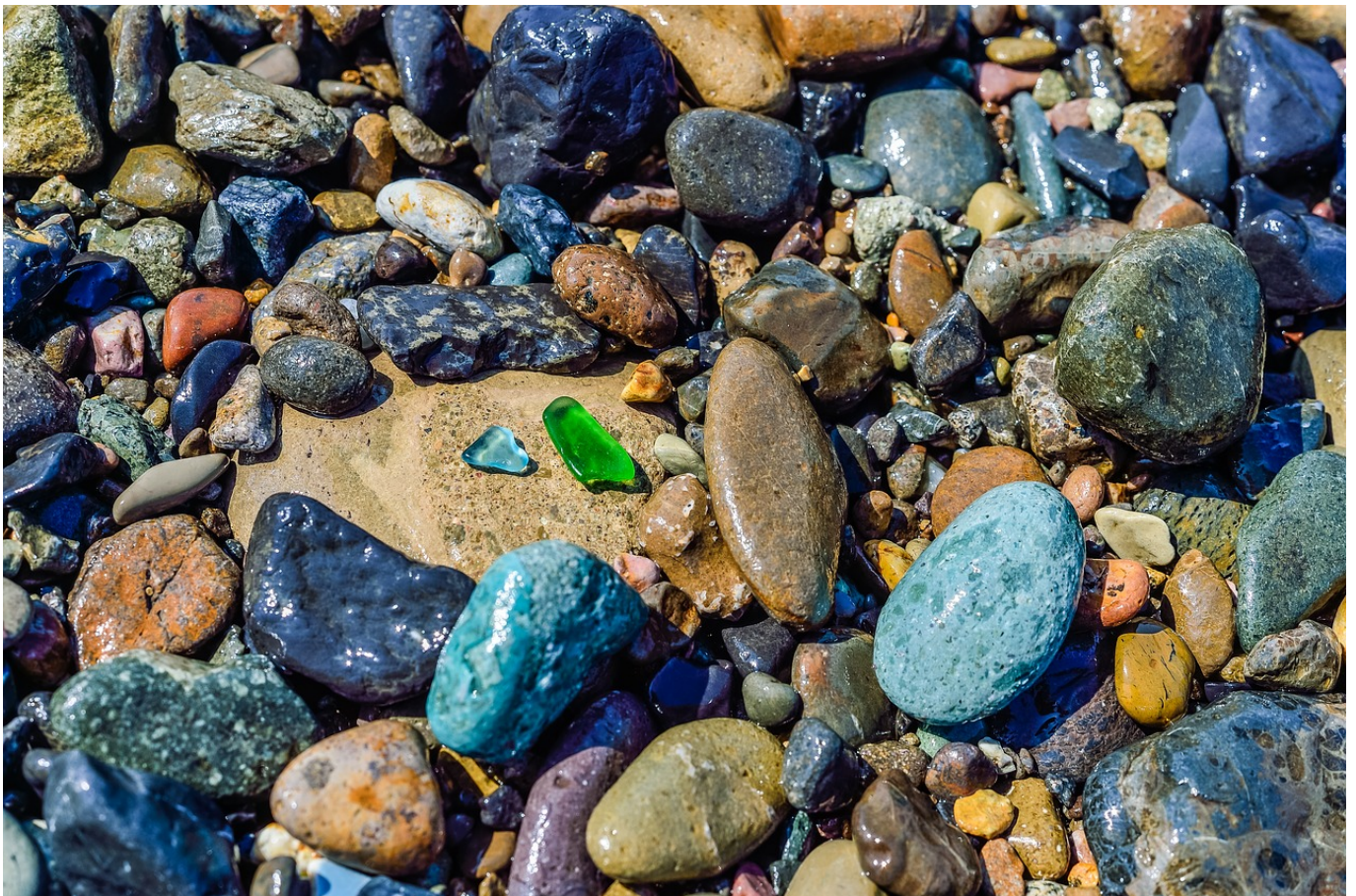
### Definitions of "Mixture" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “mixture” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The product of the random distribution of one substance through another without any chemical reaction, as distinct from a compound.*
- *(chemistry) a substance consisting of two or more substances mixed together (not in fixed proportions and not with chemical bonding).*
- *An event that combines things in a mixture.*
- *Any foodstuff made by combining different ingredients.*
- *The charge of gas or vapour mixed with air which is admitted to the cylinder of an internal combustion engine, especially as regards the ratio of fuel to air.*
- *A collection containing a variety of sorts of things.*
- *The process of mixing or being mixed.*
- *The act of mixing together.*
- *A substance consisting of two or more substances mixed together (not in fixed*

*proportions and not with chemical bonding.*

- *An organ stop in which each key sounds a group of small pipes of different pitches, giving a very bright tone.*
- *A substance made by mixing other substances together.*
- *A combination of different things in which the component elements are individually distinct.*
- *A person regarded as a combination of qualities and attributes.*

<b>assortment</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>A great <b>assortment</b> of cars was on display.</i>

<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>Woollen <b>combinations</b>.</i>
<b>commixture</b>	The act of mixing together.
<b>concoction</b>	An elaborate story, especially a fabricated one. <i>Her story is an improbable <b>concoction</b>.</i>
<b>confusion</b>	The mistaking of one person or thing for another. <i>There seems to be some <b>confusion</b> about which system does what.</i>
<b>conglomeration</b>	The process of forming a conglomerate. <i>A loose <b>conglomeration</b> of pieces.</i>
<b>diversity</b>	Noticeable heterogeneity. <i>Cultural <b>diversity</b> within his businesses helped generate his success.</i>
<b>farrago</b>	A motley assortment of things. <i>A <b>farrago</b> of fact and myth about Abraham Lincoln.</i>
<b>hash</b>	Purified resinous extract of the hemp plant; used as a hallucinogen. <i>A <b>hash</b> of raw tomatoes chillies and coriander.</i>
<b>hodgepodge</b>	A theory or argument made up of miscellaneous or incongruous ideas. <i>Rob s living room was a <b>hodgepodge</b> of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
<b>hotchpotch</b>	A stew (or thick soup) made with meat and vegetables. <i>A <b>hotchpotch</b> of uncoordinated services.</i>
<b>intermixture</b>	The act of mixing together. <i>Delicate shadings result from the <b>intermixture</b> of dyes.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>We are collecting <b>jumble</b> for charity.</i>
<b>medley</b>	A collection of songs or other musical items performed as a continuous piece. <i>A <b>medley</b> of Beatles songs.</i>
<b>melange</b>	A motley assortment of things. <i>A <b>melange</b> of tender vegetables and herbs.</i>

<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The economy is still in a terrible <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>miscellanea</b>	Miscellaneous items, especially literary compositions, that have been collected together. <i><b>Miscellanea</b> derived from a job lot of anthropological monographs.</i>
<b>miscellany</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>A <b>miscellany</b> of houses.</i>
<b>mishmash</b>	A confused mixture. <i>A <b>mishmash</b> of outmoded ideas.</i>
<b>mix</b>	A commercially prepared mixture of dry ingredients. <i>A gradual <b>mixture</b> of cultures.</i>
<b>mixing</b>	The act of mixing together. <i>The <b>mixing</b> of sound channels in the recording studio.</i>
<b>motley</b>	A garment made of motley especially a court jester s costume. <i>A <b>motley</b> of interacting interest groups.</i>
<b>motley collection</b>	A multicolored woolen fabric woven of mixed threads in 14th to 17th century England.
<b>pastiche</b>	A work of art that imitates the style of some previous work. <i>A <b>pastiche</b> of literary models and sources.</i>
<b>patchwork</b>	Sewing consisting of pieces of different materials sewn together in a pattern. <i>A piece of <b>patchwork</b>.</i>
<b>pot-pourri</b>	A musical composition consisting of a series of songs or other musical pieces from various sources.
<b>potpourri</b>	A jar of mixed flower petals and spices used as perfume. <i>He played a <b>potpourri</b> of tunes from Gilbert and Sullivan.</i>
<b>ragbag</b>	A woman dressed in an untidy way. <i>A <b>ragbag</b> of reforms is now being discussed.</i>
<b>salmagundi</b>	A general mixture; a miscellaneous collection. <i>It is a <b>salmagundi</b> of styles.</i>
<b>selection</b>	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>Such men decided the <b>selection</b> of candidates.</i>
<b><u>smorgasbord</u></b>	A range of open sandwiches and delicacies served as hors d'oeuvres or a buffet. <i>The album is a <b>smorgasbord</b> of different musical styles.</i>
<b>variety</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>The centre offers a <b>variety</b> of leisure activities.</i>

- adulterate** Render (something) poorer in quality by adding another substance.  
*The brewer is said to **adulterate** his beer.*
- alloy** Make an alloy of.  
***Alloying** tin with copper to make bronze.*
- amalgam** An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams.

- assortment** A miscellaneous collection of things or people.  
*The room was filled with an **assortment** of clothes.*

<b>blend</b>	Blend or harmonize. <i>Add the grated cheese and <b>blend</b> well.</i>
<b>blended</b>	Combined or mixed together so that the constituent parts are indistinguishable.
<b>blending</b>	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>The <b>blending</b> of the mythic and the mundane.</i>
<b>chemically</b>	In a way that relates to chemistry, or to the interactions of substances as studied in chemistry. <i>Drugs and alcohol offered a <b>chemically</b> induced sense of belonging.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>The <b>combination</b> of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
<b>commingle</b>	Mix; blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses <b>commingle</b>.</i>
<b>composite</b>	A composite constructional material. <i>The next decade may well see the introduction of more designer polymers and <b>composites</b>.</i>
<b>compound</b>	Composed of more than one part <i>compound flower heads.</i> <i>A dialect <b>compounded</b> of Spanish and Dutch.</i>
<b>conflate</b>	Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one. <i>The urban crisis <b>conflates</b> a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
<b>conjugate</b>	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i><b>Conjugate</b> the verb.</i>
<b>dilute</b>	(of a solution) having a relatively low concentration of solute. <i><b>Dilute</b> acetic acid.</i>
<b>eclectic</b>	Someone who selects according to the eclectic method. <i>Universities offering an <b>eclectic</b> mix of courses.</i>
<b>filling</b>	The act of filling something. <i>A gold <b>filling</b>.</i>
<b>hodgepodge</b>	A confused mixture; a hotchpotch. <i>Rob's living room was a <b>hodgepodge</b> of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
<b>hydrolyze</b>	Undergo hydrolysis; decompose by reacting with water.
<b>impure</b>	Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. <i>A parasite that thrives in <b>impure</b> water.</i>

<b>intermingle</b>	Mix or mingle together. <i>Riesling grapes were always <b>intermingled</b> with other varieties.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>His words <b>jumbled</b>.</i>
<b>melange</b>	A motley assortment of things. <i>A <b>melange</b> of tender vegetables and herbs.</i>
<b><u>mingle</u></b>	Mix or cause to mix together. <i>The sound of voices <b>mingled</b> with a scraping of chairs.</i>
<b>miter</b>	Bevel the edges of to make a miter joint. <i>He covered the <b>miter</b> with glue before making the joint.</i>
<b>mix</b>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>The school has a good social <b>mix</b>.</i>
<b>synthesize</b>	Combine (a number of things) into a coherent whole. <i>His operas <b>synthesize</b> music and drama in perfect harmony.</i>
<b>thinner</b>	A volatile solvent used to make paint or other solutions less viscous. <i>Dampen a clean rag with <b>thinners</b> and carefully wipe any remaining dust from the timber.</i>
<b>weld</b>	Forge an article by welding. <i><b>Weld</b> metal.</i>
