Synonyms of "Mobility" as a noun (11 Words)

ability to move	The quality of being able to perform; a quality that permits or facilitates achievement or accomplishment.
adaptability	The capacity to be modified for a new use or purpose. <i>This is a good example of the adaptability of listed buildings.</i>
flexibility	The quality of being adaptable or variable. <i>The government has shown flexibility in applying its policy.</i>
manoeuvrability	The quality of being maneuverable. <i>It lacked the manoeuvrability of the main aircraft.</i>
motility	A change of position that does not entail a change of location. <i>Gastrointestinal motility.</i>
movability	The quality of being movable; capable of being moved or rearranged.
portability	The ability to be easily carried or moved. <i>We must ensure the portability of pensions and healthcare.</i>

potency	The state of being potent; a male's capacity to have sexual intercourse. <i>The unexpected potency of the rum punch.</i>
strength	A good or beneficial quality or attribute of a person or thing. <i>We are now more than 100 officers below strength.</i>
versatility	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. <i>The versatility of the modern computer as a study aid.</i>
vigour	Physical strength and good health. <i>I was 79 but still full of vigour and vitality.</i>

auto	A motor vehicle with four wheels; usually propelled by an internal combustion engine. <i>The auto industry.</i>
bumper	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. <i>We quaffed a bumper of ale.</i>
contortion	A tortuous and twisted shape or position. <i>She has been performing contortion internationally for twelve years.</i>
conveyance	A legal document effecting the transfer of property in the case of an unregistered title. <i>The wife s solicitors will submit a draft conveyance or transfer to the husband s solicitors.</i>
<u>displacement</u>	The flux density of such an electric field. <i>A fixed displacement gear.</i>
flexibility	The ability to be easily modified. <i>Players gained improved flexibility in their ankles.</i>
informality	A manner that does not take forms and ceremonies seriously. <i>He enjoyed the informality of the occasion.</i>
maneuverable	Capable of maneuvering or changing position. <i>A highly maneuverable ship.</i>
<u>migrate</u>	(of a person) move to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions. <i>Cells that can form pigment migrate beneath the skin.</i>
motile	One whose prevailing mental imagery takes the form of inner feelings of action. <i>Males produce small motile gametes.</i>
motion	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>He motioned Dennis to a plush chair.</i>
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. <i>She made a sudden move towards me.</i>
pallet	A crude or makeshift bed.
plasticity	The property of being physically malleable; the property of something that can be worked or hammered or shaped without breaking. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of plasticity is more useful.</i>
<u>pliable</u>	Easily bent; flexible. <i>Pliable teenage minds.</i>
<u>resilient</u>	Elastic; rebounds readily. <i>Babies are generally far more resilient than new parents realize.</i>

responsiveness	Responsive to stimulation. <i>The responsiveness of the vehicle.</i>
roving	Constantly moving from one area or place to another. <i>She became a roving ambassador for Unicef.</i>
shift	The key on the typewriter keyboard that shifts from lower case letters to upper case letters. <i>The balance of power shifted abruptly.</i>
torsion	(in a gastropod mollusc) the spontaneous twisting of the visceral hump through 180° during larval development.
transferable	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. <i>Balances are not transferable by cheque.</i>
transit	Revolve the telescope of a surveying transit about its horizontal transverse axis in order to reverse its direction. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian.</i>
versatile	Having great diversity or variety. <i>His vast and versatile erudition.</i>
versatility	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. <i>The versatility of the modern computer as a study aid.</i>
waxy	Resembling wax in consistency or appearance. <i>Careful the floor is waxy.</i>
