## Synonyms of "Mobility" as a noun (11 Words)

<b>ability to move</b>	The quality of being able to perform; a quality that permits or facilitates achievement or accomplishment.
<b><a href="#">adaptability</a></b>	The capacity to be modified for a new use or purpose. <i>This is a good example of the <b>adaptability</b> of listed buildings.</i>
<b>flexibility</b>	The quality of being adaptable or variable. <i>The government has shown <b>flexibility</b> in applying its policy.</i>
<b>manoeuvrability</b>	The quality of being maneuverable. <i>It lacked the <b>manoeuvrability</b> of the main aircraft.</i>
<b>motility</b>	A change of position that does not entail a change of location. <i>Gastrointestinal <b>motility</b>.</i>
<b>movability</b>	The quality of being movable; capable of being moved or rearranged.
<b>portability</b>	The ability to be easily carried or moved. <i>We must ensure the <b>portability</b> of pensions and healthcare.</i>



<b>potency</b>	The state of being potent; a male's capacity to have sexual intercourse. <i>The unexpected <b>potency</b> of the rum punch.</i>
<b>strength</b>	A good or beneficial quality or attribute of a person or thing. <i>We are now more than 100 officers below <b>strength</b>.</i>
<b>versatility</b>	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. <i>The <b>versatility</b> of the modern computer as a study aid.</i>
<b>vigour</b>	Physical strength and good health. <i>I was 79 but still full of <b>vigour</b> and vitality.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Mobility" as a noun

- *This exercise helps retain mobility in the damaged joints.*

- adaptability** The ability to change (or be changed) to fit changed circumstances.  
*The **adaptability** of cod to climate change.*
- adaptable** Able to be modified for a new use or purpose.  
*Rats are highly **adaptable** to change.*
- adjustable** Capable of being regulated.  
***Adjustable** interest rates.*
- ambulatory** A place for walking, especially an aisle or cloister in a church or monastery.  
*It has an **ambulatory** and seven chapels.*
- android** (in science fiction) a robot with a human appearance.  
*A space station inhabited only by **androids**.*

<b>auto</b>	A motor vehicle with four wheels; usually propelled by an internal combustion engine. <i>The <b>auto</b> industry.</i>
<b>bumper</b>	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. <i>We quaffed a <b>bumper</b> of ale.</i>
<b>contortion</b>	A tortuous and twisted shape or position. <i>She has been performing <b>contortion</b> internationally for twelve years.</i>
<b>conveyance</b>	A legal document effecting the transfer of property in the case of an unregistered title. <i>The wife s solicitors will submit a draft <b>conveyance</b> or transfer to the husband s solicitors.</i>
<b>displacement</b>	The flux density of such an electric field. <i>A fixed <b>displacement</b> gear.</i>
<b>flexibility</b>	The ability to be easily modified. <i>Players gained improved <b>flexibility</b> in their ankles.</i>
<b>informality</b>	A manner that does not take forms and ceremonies seriously. <i>He enjoyed the <b>informality</b> of the occasion.</i>
<b>maneuverable</b>	Capable of maneuvering or changing position. <i>A highly <b>maneuverable</b> ship.</i>
<b>migrate</b>	(of a person) move to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions. <i>Cells that can form pigment <b>migrate</b> beneath the skin.</i>
<b>motile</b>	One whose prevailing mental imagery takes the form of inner feelings of action. <i>Males produce small <b>motile</b> gametes.</i>
<b>motion</b>	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>He <b>motioned</b> Dennis to a plush chair.</i>
<b>move</b>	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. <i>She made a sudden <b>move</b> towards me.</i>
<b>pallet</b>	A crude or makeshift bed.
<b>plasticity</b>	The property of being physically malleable; the property of something that can be worked or hammered or shaped without breaking. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of <b>plasticity</b> is more useful.</i>
<b>pliable</b>	Easily bent; flexible. <i><b>Pliable</b> teenage minds.</i>
<b>resilient</b>	Elastic; rebounds readily. <i>Babies are generally far more <b>resilient</b> than new parents realize.</i>

<b>responsiveness</b>	Responsive to stimulation. <i>The <b>responsiveness</b> of the vehicle.</i>
<b>roving</b>	Constantly moving from one area or place to another. <i>She became a <b>roving</b> ambassador for Unicef.</i>
<b>shift</b>	The key on the typewriter keyboard that shifts from lower case letters to upper case letters. <i>The balance of power <b>shifted</b> abruptly.</i>
<b>torsion</b>	(in a gastropod mollusc) the spontaneous twisting of the visceral hump through 180° during larval development.
<b>transferable</b>	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. <i>Balances are not <b>transferable</b> by cheque.</i>
<b>transit</b>	Revolve the telescope of a surveying transit about its horizontal transverse axis in order to reverse its direction. <i>At the end of February Jupiter <b>transits</b> the meridian.</i>
<b>versatile</b>	Having great diversity or variety. <i>His vast and <b>versatile</b> erudition.</i>
<b>versatility</b>	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. <i>The <b>versatility</b> of the modern computer as a study aid.</i>
<b>waxy</b>	Resembling wax in consistency or appearance. <i>Careful the floor is <b>waxy</b>.</i>
