The ability to be easily carried or moved. We must ensure the <b>portability</b> of pensions and healthcare.




potency	The state of being potent; a male's capacity to have sexual intercourse. <i>The unexpected <b>potency</b> of the rum punch.</i>
strength	A good or beneficial quality or attribute of a person or thing. We are now more than 100 officers below <b>strength</b> .
versatility	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. The <b>versatility</b> of the modern computer as a study aid.
vigour	Physical strength and good health. I was 79 but still full of <b>vigour</b> and vitality.

adaptability	The ability to change (or be changed) to fit changed circumstances. <i>The adaptability of cod to climate change.</i>
adaptable	Able to be modified for a new use or purpose. <i>Rats are highly <b>adaptable</b> to change.</i>
<u>adjustable</u>	Capable of being regulated. <i>Adjustable</i> interest rates.
ambulatory	A place for walking, especially an aisle or cloister in a church or monastery. <i>It has an <b>ambulatory</b> and seven chapels.</i>
android	(in science fiction) a robot with a human appearance. A space station inhabited only by <b>android</b> s.



auto	A motor vehicle with four wheels; usually propelled by an internal combustion engine. <i>The auto</i> industry.
bumper	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. We quaffed a <b>bumper</b> of ale.
contortion	A tortuous and twisted shape or position. She has been performing <b>contortion</b> internationally for twelve years.
conveyance	A legal document effecting the transfer of property in the case of an unregistered title. The wife s solicitors will submit a draft <b>conveyance</b> or transfer to the husband s solicitors.
<u>displacement</u>	The flux density of such an electric field. A fixed <b>displacement</b> gear.
flexibility	The ability to be easily modified. Players gained improved <b>flexibility</b> in their ankles.
informality	A manner that does not take forms and ceremonies seriously. <i>He enjoyed the <b>informality</b> of the occasion.</i>
maneuverable	Capable of maneuvering or changing position. A highly <b>maneuverable</b> ship.
<u>migrate</u>	(of a person) move to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions. <i>Cells that can form pigment <b>migrate</b> beneath the skin.</i>
motile	One whose prevailing mental imagery takes the form of inner feelings of action. Males produce small <b>motile</b> gametes.
motion	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>He motion</i> ed Dennis to a plush chair.
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. She made a sudden <b>move</b> towards me.
pallet	A crude or makeshift bed.
plasticity	The property of being physically malleable; the property of something that can be worked or hammered or shaped without breaking. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of plasticity is more useful.</i>
<u>pliable</u>	Easily bent; flexible. <i>Pliable</i> teenage minds.
<u>resilient</u>	Elastic; rebounds readily. Babies are generally far more <b>resilient</b> than new parents realize.



responsiveness	Responsive to stimulation. The <b>responsiveness</b> of the vehicle.
roving	Constantly moving from one area or place to another. She became a <b>roving</b> ambassador for Unicef.
<u>shift</u>	The key on the typewriter keyboard that shifts from lower case letters to upper case letters. The balance of power <b>shift</b> ed abruptly.
torsion	(in a gastropod mollusc) the spontaneous twisting of the visceral hump through 180° during larval development.
transferable	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. Balances are not <b>transferable</b> by cheque.
transit	Revolve the telescope of a surveying transit about its horizontal transverse axis in order to reverse its direction. <i>At the end of February Jupiter <b>transit</b>s the meridian.</i>
<u>versatile</u>	Having great diversity or variety. His vast and <b>versatile</b> erudition.
versatility	Ability to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities. The <b>versatility</b> of the modern computer as a study aid.
waxy	Resembling wax in consistency or appearance. Careful the floor is <b>waxy</b> .
